This is one of many sections that contain information, photos, newspaper articles, internet items, etc. of the St. Matthews area. Many of the items came from Al Ring's personal collections but many people have helped and I have tried to give credit where I can.

The purpose of this "collection" was to create the history of St. Matthews, Kentucky. Being retired I now have time to do many of the things I have always wanted, this project is just one of them.

All graphics have been improved to make the resolution as good as possible, but the reader should remember that many came from copies of old newspaper articles and photos. Credit to the source of the photos, etc. is provided whenever it was available. We realize that many items are not identified and regret that we weren't able to provide this information. As far as the newspaper articles that are not identified, 99% of them would have to be from one of three possible sources. The Courier-Journal, The Louisville Times or one of the Voice publications. The Orville J. Stivers elementary school had its first issue of **The Inkwell**, (school newspaper) November 3, 1953. Deon Dever of Mr. Nielsen's class was the winner of a contest to name the newspaper. The school newspaper continued until 1975.

We have included here all the copies from November 3, 1953 until May 16, 1958.

The issues from 1953/54, 1956/57, and 1957/58 were in a bound book and copying them was extremely hard. Some letters on the edges and top and bottoms of pages may be missing, but the vast majority of information is there and most articles will be understood by the reader.




"He survives in our hearts—in the growing knowledge of our children, in the affection of good throughout the world—... first in war, first in peace, first in the hearts of his countrymen."



On November 8 the voters of Jefferson County will have the opportunity to vote whether or not to increase the school tax rate by fifty cents. This would cost the average St. Matthews home owner about twenty-five dollars more per year than he is now paying.

To do a good job of educating our children, we must have good schools, books and other supplies, and most important, we must have good teach-

Our school officials say that an increase in the school tax is necessary to raise enough money to take care of the needs of the school children of Jefferson County.

The population of Jefferson County has grown so rapidly that it is impossible to provide these things with the money that we now have.

Many classrooms in the county are over-crowded. We know that we cannot do our best work in a crowded classroom, and the teacher does not have time to give each child the help he needs.

In our school, here at Stivers, we have been forced to use our audiovisual room and our music room for classrooms. If the enrollment increases as it has been doing, we will be forced to use our library as a classroom. We do not want double sessions as they have had at Valley Elementary School.

Many of our teachers have left Jefferson County for other states where the salaries are better. If we are going to keep good teachers, we must pay them as much as they can get in other states.

We want to keep our schools at least as good as they are now. To do this we must have more money. Other ways of getting the money have been suggested, but according to the Kentucky Law, this tax is the only way that is open to us now.

Won't you please vote for the school tax to help our schools, which of course will help our whole community.





The reason for this point system is that if the patrolman gets 2,700 points he may receive a bronze medal. Then if he gets 2,700 the second year he receives a silver medal. To get these the patrolman must have served at least 7 months on the patrol each year.





Here are a few of the things we did these past few weeks before christmas. This year, as always, we have a large tree in the main entrance of our hall. Every class had a part in decorating it.


Santa Claus visited our school on Tuesday, December 18, at 9:30, with a treat for everyone. We enjoyed his visit.

There are four sets of encyclopedies in the school, one for the fourth, one for the fifth, and one for the sixth grade, and one stays in the library.




The horse is one of the most intelligent of animals. The average length of life for a horse is fifteen years.



Plastics


