The tempo in Frankfort for the week of Feb. 17 to 21 picked up considerably in both branches of the Legislature. We got off to a flying start, extending some minor bills and a bank holiday bill, which would make it optional with the bank about staying open on minor holidays. This was felt to be a better system for serving the public.

Then we got three of the Louisville, or Jefferson County bills as they are usually called up there, dealing with drainage, sewers and parks. I made an effort to amend the drainage bill because I thought one feature of it was bad, and I campaigned on a promise to try to stop it. This was defeated, however; the only people voting with me being the Republicans.

Later all three of the bills were passed, so now I don't think there is any reason why we can't have good drainage, good sewers and a park system in the County. These were passed finally by the Senate on Thurstiay afternoon.

The Committee on Labor and Industry of which I am a member, took up quite a study of a bill regarding the work conditions and rest periods for women, After many hours' work by the entire committee, we brought out what we thought was a good bill, submitted it to the floor, and passed it on Thursday.

Waggener dean says St. Matthews children are 'overprivileged'

Draut thinks parents could do better job teaching value of money

Children in the St. Matthews area "are over-privileged, and parents could do a better job of teaching the value of money," Arthur Draut, Waggener boys' counsellor, told members of the St. Matthews Elementary School P.T.A. Thursday night.

"Many of them have more spending money than I do,"
Mr. Draut asserted. "When I was on the Eastern staff, a girl
broke a window by pushing a broom through it. She did it
deliberately, because another girl had bet her the broom
wouldn't go through. I told her she'd have to pay \$2.50 to
replace the glass, and she handed me a \$10 bill on the spot."

Mr. Draut was one of four speakers considering the question, "Are parents teaching responsibility, respect and religious values?" His conclusion: many of them are not.

"A lot of the children in this community don't respect private property... their own or others. As for courtesy, it's rare to hear 'yes ma'am'; a youngster with good manners is the exception. Most of them aren't really discourteous, however—just neutral."

Another speaker, the Rev. Will Van Nostrand, assistant pastor at Beargrass Christian, asserted that today's parents, "spend more time on straight teeth than straight character, and are more concerned that their children know the 'right people' than that they know the difference between right and wrong."

Noting that a recent study revealed that Waggener students spend an average of 30 hours a week watching television, Mr. Van Nostrand, assistant minister at Beargrass Christian Church, asked, "How many hours a week do these parents devote to religious instruction?"

Other symposium speakers were Miss Margaret Kirk, Child Guidance Clinic caseworker, and Mrs. Meredith Watts. The meeting closed a two-day Moral and Spiritual Values Workshop, arranged by Mrs. Charles J. Theobald.

Yesterday P.T.A. members met at St. Matthews Elementary for a study on "Self Discipline." Keynoter was Mrs. F. A. Strietelmeier, 1006 Old Cannons Lane, who gave highlights of the Ford Foundation's course, "Parenthood in a Free Nation." A skit depicting "Report Card Day" and discussion groups were also on the agenda. The conference was directed by Mrs. R. S. Dalrymple, chairman of the Parent Education Committee.

Local students have romp over weekend

A small group of Eastern and Waggener students went on a couple of romps over the weekend. Nobody was injured, but the pranks were serious enough to cause those involved a first class headache and considerable embarrassment.

The stunt pulled by Eastern students and others—removing a bronze turtle from a fountain in Cherokee Park - resulted in the arrest of 10 boys for grand lar-ceny. Damage was estimated at \$100.

The Waggener outcome was not so serious. Five boys and three girls were suspended for six weeks from all extra-curricular school activities for a series of pranks at an Oak Ridge, Tenn, botel hotel.

Waggener principal John Lowe announced Tuesday:

There will not be any more field trips out of Waggener unless there is a competent chaperone for every eight or 10 students."

On Friday at 8 a.m., 53 Waggener students in grades eight through 10 left on two Greyhound busses for Oak Ridge to tour the atomic plant there.

Accompanying them were two chaperones; Mrs. Robert Bunyan, mother of one of the students, and Edward Simpson, Waggener sci-

ence teacher.

They put up at the Jefferson Hotel, a former Army barracks.

There are conflicting reports about I not happened late Friday night, but this much is clear:

Some of the students-a small minority everyone agrees — ran about the hotel squirting other students and hotel guests in the face with water pistols. Five wall panels were kirked to panels were kicked in.

Screens were removed from several windows, and some furniture was taken out of the lobby and placed into one of the hotel rooms to accommodate some boys who wanted play cards.

Mr. Simpson did not get a wink of sleep all night, but spent the time trying to quiet the rowdy students.

The manager of the hotel, Mrs. Keyo Casey, said: "I have had hundreds of groups here, but never one like this. Their general attitude was rude and abusive and they used profanity. I would nev-er have this same group here again as guests. You expect some pranks but they went too far."

She admitted, however, that old.

most of the atudents were "very nice" and that only a small min-ority was responsible. She credited Mr. Simpson with doing his best to stop the commotion.

Mr. Simpson said that while he was "embarrassed" by the antics of some of the students, which were a "disgrace," nothing of an immoral nature took place and nobody was injured.

He said some boys did run into girls' rooms but only to reload their water pistols. He said that while there may have been whiskey and beer bottles in some of the rooms, he was convinced by his investigation that they were not brought there by Waggener students.

Mr. Lowe said he had inter-viewed personally 18 or 20 students, and four sets of parents. He also contacted some parents by phone.

As best as he can determine, the ruckus was started by two boys, about 17, from Oak Ridge, who came into the hotel, carrying beer. He said these two boys apparently kicked in the wall panels and ran down the fire escape when Mr. Simpson approached.

He said that some of the children at the school were "very an gry" at the Waggener students who misbehaved and threatened to blackball them from their organizations,

He sald, too, the parents were "disturbed." He said some arrangement will be made to pay the bill for the damage, as yet undetermined, and he is still try-ing to get all the facts about the situation, despite "conflicting reports."

He said that according to Ken-tucky law, children under 16 could be suspended by the princi-pal from school for only three

Since he did not think that was adequate punishment, he had or-dered the suspension of the five boys and three girls for six weeks from all club or sports activities at the school,

Furthermore they will be given failing marks for conduct for the six-week period, he said. All eight were 10th graders, and 15 years

School Critics, Take Heart

Many junior-grade scientists from several Kentucky cities show know-how at Monticello

FOR about 24 hours recently Monticello, in Wayne County, was the science capital of Kentucky-well, junior science, at least.

The occasion was the spring convention and competition of the Kentucky Junior Academy of Science at Wayne County High School. Quite an occasion it was, too. More than 300 delegates from 16 Kentucky high schools and junior-high schools jammed the premises with some 100 scientific exhibits.

The Kentucky Junior Academy of Science is an association of science clubs in 30 Kentucky junior—and senior—high schools. It is the child of the Kentucky Academy of Science, a scholarly association of scientists in the state. Membership in the Junior Academy now is 1,000.

Recent critics of science education in secondary schools should have been there. They would have been heartened, if not astounded, at the variety of interests, depth of knowledge and outstanding talent the teen-agers displayed.

And the odds are that many of the critics would have found themselves over their heads. The youngsters talked quite readily of scientific principles beyond the comprehension of ordinary mortals.

OR instance, when George Blanford of Louisville's St. Xavier High School started to discuss his project, "A Spectrophotometric Analysis of Indicators," it wasn't long before one of the judges, a science teacher who shall be nameless, whispered to a fellow judge:

"He has left me."

Roughly speaking, that jaw-breaking title means the young man was studying the chemical makeup of solutions by determining their variation in color. The spectrophotometer, which George built, records these color changes.

Young Blanford's entry tied with that of Charles Scudder of Atherton High, Louisville, for first place among senior-high individual projects in physical sciences, and he won first place in the discussion phase of the competition. Young Scudder's entry also was in chemistry, "Synthesis of Organic Acids," which is far beyond normal high-school chemistry level.

DON'T get the idea that chemistry dominated the show, or that Louisville schools carried off all the honors. The range of interests shown in the displays was the widest in the 24-year history of the Junior Academy.

Spread out in some 15 large rooms were exhibits in the physical and biological sciences which ranged from model sawmills, high-fidelity record players, a radiation detector, elaborate rocket systems, a miniature voicano, model airplanes and chemical layouts to a model atomic-powered village, a model of a typical farm watershed, a mathematical project, an exhibit of the effects of irradiation on plants Continued on following pages

and seeds, and an elaborate display of insects accompanied by charts showing their effects and means of controlling them.

Kirksville Junior High School and Model High School of Richmond had themselves a field day in the juniorhigh competition. Between them they won nine of 15 possible awards. Waggener High of Louisville managed to get one first-place award from them.

Oddly (or is it?) there's a connection between the two prize-winning science clubs. The sponsor of the Model High club is Mrs. J. L. Whitlock, a science teacher. This is her first year at Model High. Last year and for a number of preceding years, Mrs. Whitlock was the sponsor of the club at Kirksville Junior High. Kirksville winners were her students last year.

St. Xavier's scientists managed to come out on top of the senior-high competition by the skin of their teeth. They won one top award alone, shared one with Atherton High and took a second place. The second place was the margin over Atherton, which won one top award by itself and shared the one with St. Xavier. Wayne County High and Breekinridge Training School of Morehead also won top awards.

"The quality of this exhibition is

the finest the Junior Academy probably has ever seen," said Robert Boyer of the University of Kentucky chemistry department, the guiding spirit of the organization. "Each year we have found a great improvement. Each year we see more interest in science."

Evidence of Boyer's contention lies in the recent resurgence of the organization. In 1940, the group bloomed with 35 clubs, but by 1954 its strength had faded to 15 clubs. In 1958 its 24 clubs represented only 500 members. That individual membership has doubled, while six clubs were being added in two years.

Boyer added that while a great deal of scientific talent is being exhibited in the clubs affiliated with the Junior Academy, the students are by no means all heading for careers in science.

"But I feel it is just as important for us to inspire interest in and understanding of science among young people who eventually will go into other fields. Enlightened as they will be, they can give just the support scientists will need in the future."

The best illustration of Boyer's observation is in the president of the Kentucky Junior Academy, Don Sloan of Wayne County High. Science with young Sloan is strictly a hobby. He is headed for the ministry. HARRY SHAW

Will crowd students in until \$158,000 addition is completed

The \$158,000 addition to Waggener High School won't be ready in time for the opening of school, but there will no double sessions according to principal John B. Lowe.

"The new addition will not be ready, due to the coment strike," he said. "We are attempting to crowd all students into the old addition as a temporary measure, rather than put them on double sessions."

He said the addition would be finished four to six weeks after the strike is over. The strike unded Tuesday.

He urged parents and students to cooperate with the following temporary measures:

lowing temporary measures:

1. The small cafeteria will be used for the three television classes taught during the morning periods. The classes are English II, American History, and General Science.

The two visual aid rooms will be made regular classrooms.
 The two reading rooms near

the library will become regular classrooms.

4. The large cafeteria will be used for the Study Hall all periods except lunchtime, when it will be moved to the gym. Study halls are normally in the reading

rooms.

5. All health and physical education classes will become strictly physical education and will be held authide. ("Let's hope for good weather," said Mr. Lowe.). The rooms used for teaching will be used for other classes until the new addition is completed. After wards the school will make up the health classes missed.

6. The Home Economic living room will be used as a regular classroom.

 The Mechanical Drawing class will be moved into the new shop building and the Mechanical Drawing room used for other classes.

8. Two or three floating teachers will be used to teach in rooms that are available when other teachers are keeping Study Hall or having their plan-

9. An attempt will be made to find another spot for the orchestra so the room now used by the orchestra can be used for other classes. The orchestra teacher, Mrs. Eleanor Ritchie, spends only three periods in Waggener. The rest of the day she teaches in elementary schools.

The school will have a limited number of textbooks available. Textbooks are furnished by the state in grades 7 and 8. All others must purchase their books.

Any student who attended Waggener last year and who carned an additional credit (or made up a credit) in summer school this year is urged to contact assistant principal Earl Duncan before the upening of school so the student's schedule can be adjusted. Waggener addition to be ready in September

The new addition which was started last spring at Waggener High School is expected to be completed by the opening of school in September, according to John L. Ramsey, assistant superintendent of County schools.

And the enrollment, which was 1.394 when school closed in spring, is expected to be 1,840.

The new addition, which is located west of the east-west wing of the main building, includes 15 general classrooms. These rooms are being constructed so that they can be opened into educational reception rooms to accommodate approximately 125 to seven through 11. 150 students in receiving educational television.







Overtime without pay — Waggener chemistry students don't mind staying after school

Waggener High teacher Emory Harris, Jr. doesn't mind working overtime without pay. He's determined his chemistry classes will get all the education he can give them, no matter how many hours he has to work.

Schools out a 3 p.m. but he stays almost every day to 4:30 or 5:30 and is back in school on Saturday morning, keeping the lab open for his students. And they have responded beautifully. "It's hard to believe," he said, "but my students ask me to give them more homework."

The basic problem throughout Waggener, which this year for the first time has a junior class, is that of organization. In the chemistry department, the problem is even tougher, because this is the first year the school has had chemistry classes.

Mr. Harris teaches five classes of college board chemistry which means an accelerated pace of study. His colleague, Mrs. Ethel Kurtz, teaches two additional classes. Together they comprise the whole chemistry department.

Mr. Harris is therefore faced with the problem of trying to teach chemistry to 131 students without having any advanced students around to act as laboratory assistants.

"It's impossible for one person to watch over 26 or 27 chemistry students," he said. "I have to use some of my students as lab assistants. I don't have any advanced students, so the only thing I do is to pick out the willing students, ask them to stay over, and have a preview of the next day's experiments on they nigh before."

He decided early in the game that if he organized the chemistry department alone, he'd be the only one who knew where everything was, and the procedure for getting things done. He met this problem by the simple, but not easy, process of using hi students to help in the organizing.

"Now they know where everything is and how things work," he said. "At best, it's a bit slower that way, but now that it's moving, it's a lot more efficient."

Anyway he admits; his students to learn something about organization. "Knowledge of organization is lacking in our schools," he said. "Take the matter of class notes, for one example.

"In the lower grades, students don't have to take notes. It's all laid out in the text books. But in the higher grades, it gets more complicated, and they can't learn it all out of their text books. We must bring them new information and teach them how to interpret the facts. They must learn to take notes and to organize them."

That is especially true in the filed of science he said. "Science is ever-changing. A lot of the stuff I learned in school is passé now. Which brings him to about the only gripe he has against out educational set-up.

"It's a shame Kentucky law won't let us use the newest educations (of science books)," he said. "We must use books from an authorized list, which is changed only every four yeas. If local school officials want, they should have the privilege of buying the latest texts. All the latest information should be available to students."

Lately he's had a little skilled help. Acting as an official assistant two or three days a week has been John Burckle, a 20-year-old University of Louisville sophomore.

His after-school classes serve two purposes: to train his lab assistants, and to allow his students to make up classes and experiments they have missed. This Fall, some of his students who are members of the football team had to skip Friday class to play a game. After the game, they showered and came to the chemistry lab to make up the class.

But most of the students staying late are lab assistants. All 15 of them are generally present for the Wednesday session.

The 28-year-old native of Jefferson County is not married. "I couldn't spend this much time over here if I were married," he said.

His life now is a little quieter than it has been. After graduating from eastern Kentucky State College in 1952 with a Bachelor of Science degree in chemistry, he was an officer in the U.S. Navy for four years.

"I was lucky," he said. "I got a trip around the world." He went to the Panama Canal, San Diego, Perl Harbor, Ceylon, Midway, Japan, Hong Kong, Singapore, Rio de Janeiro, Formosa, and South Africa.

So far, he's discouraged his students from doing any projects—original work that is. "I want them to get a good background first, so they can tackle something important. I don't want them doing projects simply for the sake of projects."

The after—school session will be used mainly for these projects in the coming months.

"Were having a Spring Science Fair at the school," he said.



Now Teacher Needs Glamour — Trio on school TV find the job is not just lecturing

English teacher, she is one of the staff of three (the other two are men) who present 15 weekly 35-minute TV programs for classrooms.

The three star performers on Louisville's new educational television station—Channel 15— are playing dual roles.

First of all, they are schoolteachers to 7,315 pupils in this area. Secondly, they are pupils themselves as they learn the techniques of television show business in order to do a more effective job.

The three—John Dickey, Raymond Layne and Mrs. C. Kenneth Peters—plan their own programs, write their own scripts, select visual aids and other props, and then each stages and performs in five 25-minute shows weekly, a total of 15.

As a result, they have found that each 25-minute period of television teaching requires 10 to 15 hours of daily preparation. They believe and hope

that this make-ready time can be reduced as they gain experience. But right now, television teaching is long on hard work and short on glamour.

This grim fact is further complicated by the knowledge that the pupils taking the courses in 18 junior-and senior-high schools are accustomed to some glamour and excitement on TV.

Mrs. Peters, who teaches 10th Grade English, says:

"We're faced with the problem of looking our best every morning. In regular classrooms, the pupils will forgive you for looking a little sloppy now and then. But they won't forgive the television teacher."

Dickey, who is teaching 11th Grade American history, says he is convinced a television teacher needs to put forth a little extra effort to hold attention. With this in mind, he occasionally will sing an appropriate song, accompanying himself on his tiple, a sort of miniature guitar.

"Many songs are directly related to some historic event," Dickey said. "Others express the feelings of the people at various times in our history."

As teacher of Ninth Grade general science, Layne has little trouble finding three-dimensional props to pep up his lectures. Students see all kinds of scientific devices and exhibits.

Layne intends to give his pupils a chance to show their own exhibits on TV. If, for example, he assigns the pupils to collect and mount different types of minerals in a box, he will arrange for those doing the best job to come in to the studio.

The three teachers and a staff of three maintain offices at George D. Prentice Elementary School, 525 S. Sixth. The staffers are Mrs. Roy Cobb, producer-coordinator; Mrs. Maurice Settle, secretary, and Mrs. Carrier Dickey, artist.

All are agreed on one thing: the planning, research and effort behind each 25-minute instruction period should result in a higher quality of instruction.

Of the 7,315 pupils taking a course over the new TV station (WFPK, Channel 15), 5,875 are in the Jefferson County school system; 1,170 in Southern Indiana schools, and 270 in the Louisville school system. These school systems together from the Kentuckiana Educational Television Council, with Richard VanHoose, superintendent of Jefferson County schools, as chairman.


The Jefferson County system has had the most experience with teaching by television. Last year, three of its elementary schools were on a closed-circuit hookup with a studio at Hawthorne School. This year, that experiment has been expanded to include five schools.

Now, however, most attention is focused on the Channel 15 experiment in open-circuit television teaching. Any person whose television set is equipped to receive the ultra-high-frequency (U.H.F.) station, can "attend" these TV classes Mondays through Fridays. General science is on the air from 8:35 to 9 a.m.; history from 9:35 to 10 a.m., and English from 10:35 to 11 a.m. Sets not equipped may be converted to U.H.F.

The Fund for The Advancement of Education, which is paying about half the cost of television teaching, recently announced that Kentuckiana experiment in public schools here is the third largest in the nation.





Construction of Waggener's stadium starts this Spring

Construction of the new Waggener High football stadium should start "this Spring," says Claude Sexton.

Hi is president of the Waggener High School Development Association, now in the middle of a campaign to raise \$50,000 to build athletic facilities at the school. About 20 percent has been raised.

"We expect to start construction as soon as the field is graded," he said. "That should be this Spring. The Board of Education is laying drainage tile now, and will grade it when weather permits. There'll be football games there next Fall."

Mr. Sexton confesses that the drive did not open at an ideal time. It was started in November, and just naturally bogged down during the Christmas holidays.

One of the predominant figures in St. Matthews education for a decade will be gone after this school year.

John Lowe, principal of Waggener High, has been named assistant director of pupil personnel for the Jefferson County School system. He will be succeeded by ancistant principal Earl Duncan

Mr. Lowe organized both Eastern and V. aggener High Schools. When Eastern was built in 1949, it had only a seventh, eighth and ninth grade, and Mr. Lowe was in charge. The next year, it became a fullfledged high school and he was assistant principal under Jack Daw-

He was transferred to Waggener as principal when the achool was opened in the Fall of 1954. Waggener has added a grade each year, until now it has grades seven through 11. Mr. Lowe won't around for the first graduating class in 1960.

He said he resigned for reasons of health and to increase and broaden his school experience.

Insiders say he was mentally and physically tired after 10 years of struggle to organize two of the largest and best high schools in the County. Eastern has almost 1,500 students. Waggener this year has 1.868 students and expects 2,-388 next year.

He and his successor have been together nine years, Mr. Duncan served four years at Eustern as teacher and coach, and helped build the Engles into one of the basketball powerhouses of the State.

There will also be Marching Fundamentals for high school and junior high bandsmen, and String Ensemble for advanced violinists, violists, cellists, and string bassos.





One school going up, two being enlarged

September completion date set for Taylor, Waggener, Eastern

Construction is bring done on these County schools in the St. Matthews are and is expected to be completed by the time school opens Sept. 7, according to Sam Alexander, assistant superintendent for business affairs for Jefferson County Schools.

There is to be one completely new school, the Zachary Taylor Elementary School on Hounz Lane and Westport Road. A three-floor addition is going up at the Waggener High School on Hubbards Lane, and shower and dressing rooms are being built at Eastern High School at Middletown.

The new Zachary Taylor School is being built to accommodate up to 720 pupils, and is expected to cost around \$450,435. It has 38.500 square feet of space and is being constructed so that an addition of eight rooms may be added, four on either wing of the building. Mrs. Elizabeth Vaughn, who served the past three years as principal at Bailard School, has been named principal of the new school.

The new building will have 26 rowns, 24 regular classrooms, a library and an all-purpose room. There is also an administrative office and cafeteria. It is on 10 acres of ground which will also include a parking lot, playground and ball diamond.

The building is of concrete and brick. The general construction will cost \$296,000, plumbing and heating, \$88,127, electrical work, \$31,068, and sight improvement, \$35,240. The cost per pupil will be \$532.30, and \$10.76 per square foot of construction.

Wehr Constructors is doing the general construction work, C. J. Hoehler. plumbing and heating; R. J. Hetfernan, electrical; and the Highland Co., the right improvement. Hartstern, Louis, and Henry is doing the architectural work for all three buildings.

The building, which is of concrete, is at the south side of the main school building, about 200 feet to the rear of the klitchen and custodians offices. Eventually there is to be a covered walkway connecting it to the main build-

The building, which envers 5,733 square feet of space, is costing a total of \$91,161. This represents \$15.76 per square foot. The general construction and sight work done by the H. R. John Construction Co., is costing \$54,797. Raymond M. Meyer is doing the plumbing and heating at \$27,720, and McClain Electrical Co. the electrical work at \$8,644.

The new addition at Waggener will have nine regular classrooms, a mechanical drawing room, an art room, a language laboratory for the leaching of foreign languages, two typing rooms a shorthand room, and a bookkeeping room. The building is of concrete and is being done at a cost of \$168.575. It is 70 by 79 feet and has three floors, with \$53 square feet per floor, which will be about 16.590 square feet of space.

It is being built at a cost of \$427.13 per pupil and \$9.12 per square foot. The general construction work is expected to cost \$121.914. plumbing and heating. \$14.621. electrical work, \$17.230, and sight improvement, \$14.810.

The Platoff Construction Co., is doing the general construction; George E. Blanford, plumbing and heating; H. J. Heffernan, electrical; and Louisville Asphalt Co., sight improvement.

A television room is also being constructed at Waggener to accompdate up to 200 pupils in the TV receiving classes. This is a 62-by-62 square building with 3,844 square feet of space, and is being built at a cost of \$64,979.78.

The new shower and dressing rooms at Eastern High School is the first phase, or the beginning, of a plan which will eventually secula in a symmetrium at Lagran.

Lowe's career here ends after 10 years

The predominant figure in St. Matthews education the past 10 years has been John B. Lowe. His tenure of service here coincides almost exactly with The Voice's,

Mr. Lowe helped organize the new Eastern High School back in 1949, and when it opened as a full-fledged high school in 1950, he became assistant principal un-der Jack Dawson.

After five years, he came to the new Waggener Junior High School, organized it, and carried

School, organized it, and carried it up to this year, when it be-came a high school.

The 10 years took their toll, because Mr. Lowe never had a quiet situation here. Organizing two of the largest high schools in the history of Jefferson Country, and trying to keep them func-tioning with a semblance of smoothness as they grew almost beyond any man's control, was almost too much.

Concern for his health this Spring finally forced him to ask for a new assignment. The Coun-Beard of Education complied with his wishes, named him assis-tant director of pupil personnel, and assigned his assistant, Earl Duncan, to take over as princi-pal of Waggener High.

Firm, patient and energetic, Mr. Lowe set a high standard for St. Matthews education. During his 10 years here he strove con-stantly to maintain a balanced life in his schools.

The demands of athletics were weighed against the need for a high standard of learning; the wishes of purents and pupils were balanced against the re-quirements of the school and the faculty. The result has been grutifying.




