Language laboratory opens at Waggener

Is financed by National Defense Education Act money, first in State

A Language Laboratory was officially opened at Waggener High School on Tuesday, and school officials believe it is the first fully-equipped language laboratory in a Kentucky high school.

Mrs. Holen Daniel, supervisor and or some other instrument, of foreign languages and English for Jefferson County Schools, said the idea for the language laboratory started during World War 11 when it was found the traditional high school foreign language classes were not producing people who were able to speak and understand foreign languages in a practical way.

She said the laboratory method of providing a situation in which the student can hear a native speaker and listen until he understands and can practice imitating, was devised and put into use by the army.

This language laboratory is a means to provide the foreign language learner with an instrument whereby he may practice just as a child practices the pl-. . . .

She further stated that it has been proven that foreign language students with an opportunity to work in a laboratory not only learn to speak the language better and more quickly, but to understand the grammer and to be able to read it.

Mrs. Daniel said il was through the National Defense Education Act Funds that the Jefferson County Board of Education was able to finance the purchase of the laboratorics, and it was through the foresight of Richard Van Hoose, superintendent of the board, and Everett Farmer, assistant superintendent for instruction, that boys and girls at Waggener will have the advantage of the most modern methods of language teaching.

The laboratory at Waggener consists of a master console with three tape recorders and a rec-ord player, through which channels the teacher can send one lesson to the entire group of pupils, or she can send four dif-ferent lessons to different stations.

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There are 15 sound-proof sludent's booths equipped with magnetic record players, on one of which the pupil can record and play back, and the other he can record only. Each booth is equipped with a pupil's micro-phone by which he can record on the magnetic disc, or he can speak to the teacher. She can also speak back to him.

It is also equipped with stu-dents' head phones, and he can listen to tape that is being directed to his particular station, or he can listen to the teacher speaking to him directly. The teacher can listen to anyone of the 15 pupils by tuning into his head phone.

Mrs. Daniel said "the laboratory is the best instrument we know of up to now to teach the skill of learning a language.

She said "It is not a toy. It is a place for very serious work, and doesn't take the place of the tradillonal class room. It is an enrichment of the regular language course,"

She said the laboratory is a practice room to give students practice in hearing and speaking the foreign language and goes right along with classroom work with the tapes and records geared to the text being used.

Other members of the Board of Education attending the of-ficial opening Tuesday were Mr. Farmer, Lew Laukhuf, director of instructional administrative problems, Everett Hancock, di-rector of administrative affairs, and Ben Krentzman, assistant to Mr. Hancock.

Waggener's principal, Earl Duncan, was on hand and also present was William Kirtley, of D. T. Davis Co., which installed the equipment,

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Waggener High must not be enlarged any more

The news that Waggener High School may be enlarged again is a shocker. In our opinion, and in the opinion of many educators, the school is already overpopulated by 700 to 800 students. With 2,436 students in the school, the principal and his staff have long since found it impossible to keep up really effective personal contacts with the students. Waggener is rapidly becoming an education factory instead of a school.

It seems to us every P.T.A. and school in this area ought to be exercised about this matter. Greathouse, Chenoweth, Wilder, Stivers, St. Matthews Elementary, and Lyndon Ele-mentary Schools all feed into Waggener. The parents have got to realize that if something isn't done, and soon, they will see their children crammed into a giant impersonal school, with crowded classes, and with proper supervision by the administrators made impossible.

The possibility that Waggener may be enlarged again for the fourth time if we remember correctly - stems from the fact that the County Board of Education has found it much cheaper to add onto an existing high school rather than to establish a new one. We understand that the Board is very short on building money. One Board member told us that Valley, Seneca, Butler and one or two other County high schools are worse off than Waggener, and the choices confronting the County school system are narrowing down to these two:


1. Enlarge existing high schools, or

2. Go on double sessions.

He agreed that either choice was a had one, and either one would cheat the children of part of their education.

The State ought to be able to help us out. Gov. Combs announced Saturday he will ask the Legislature to appropriate \$271,130,530 for the next two years for Kentucky education. That is \$102,714,630 higher than appropriated by the State for the past two years. Surely in this sum there must be enough money to build some more high schools in Jefferson County, particularly when this community pays the lion's share of State taxes.

Whatever happens, we must prevent the further expan-sion of Waggener High. Several years ago, the County Board of Education acquired some land in Lyndon with the announced purpose of building a new junior high there. It's up to us in this community to make sure that the Board can and will keep that promise.

A big, crowded building isn't a school

Many parents here don't want Waggener High School to be enlarged any more.

The County Board of Education replies that it can't afford to establish new high schools, because it is much cheap-er to enlarge existing schools. For instance, an addition planned for Seneca High will bring the building's overall price down to a per-pupil cost of about \$765. The per-pupil cost of the original building was almost \$1,400.

"This is a graphic answer to complaints that our high schools are becoming too large," said Rucker Todd, chair-man of the County School Board.

Maybe. And maybe saving money on buildings will result in shortchanging the children on their education. We still think parents here must do everything possible to prevent the further enlargement of Waggener. A big, over-crowded building is no place to educate high school and junior high school students.



Threat to Waggener and all our schools

Waggener High will not have to go to double sessions next year. That's the good news from the County Board of Education, only it's not good news at all when you go into it a bit.

Waggener can gvoid double sessions by going through "numerous readjustments and some remodelling," according to the County School superintendent, Richard Van Hoose. What that means is that the teacher work load will be increased, the shop will be partitioned, and the audio-visual rooms will be converted to classrooms. In short, the school will be partially torn up. At that, Waggener will be better off than four other schools, which will have double sessions next year.

This is terrible news. The County School system is running out of building money and even if it had any, Waggener would get no relief, as it is obvious that the doublesession schools must get first priority on any building money. To us it seems only a question of time until Waggener is on double sessions, for in the years to come, there will be no audio-visual rooms and shops to convert and partition, and there is no evidence whatsoever that the high school population here will do anything but increase just as it has steadily and quickly the past 10 years. The Census Bureau figures show that the population of Jefferson County outĸ side Louisville has increased 95 per cent since the last census 11 in 1950.

The parents, children, teachers and administrators of n gi the Jefferson County School system are faced with a problem b of the first magnitude. It is a problem that cannot and should w not be solved by the State or the Federal government. It is OL a local problem and it must be met on a local basis. Our school children must have the necessary facilities to obtain a first-class education, and it is up to our community leadw ers to come up with a solution. Ja in



Students Have Opportunities To Exchange Ideas With Scientists

On alternate Saturdays, thirtyone high school juniors and seniors scurry off to the Jefferson County Science Seminar to spend two hours discussing phases of advanced science and mathematics. These discussions are led by scientists from nearby industrial - research laboratories and by university professors. At other times during the week, these students work with their scientist-advisors on projects in biology, electronics, chemistry, meteorology, and other branches of science beyond the usual high school level.

Some of the specific projects are the design, testing, and construction of a fuel cell; hydroponics; photosynthesis — record effect of light rays on plants; solar batteries; and measurement of the amount of proteinbound iodine in dog's blood.

These seminars are sponsored by your Jefferson County Board of Education with the very able assistance of the Louisville Engineering and Scientific Societies Council. The Council has been helpful in securing seminar leaders and individual project advisers.



By our freshman year, a few clubs had been organized and the various athletic teams were playing in Junior varsity competition. This was our first year as the oldest class, and thus the long journey ahead started.

When we returned to Waggener the next fall, we elected class officers for the first time. They were Charles Brown, president; Bobby Leason, vice president; Pam Ferguson, secretary; Mary Carol Coons, treasurer; and Denny Garber, sergeant-at-arms. This was an important year as the Student Council and the Waggener chapter of the Beta Club were organized, the journalism class took over the publication of the CHIT-CHAT, and our first annual, THE LAIR, was published.

We started our junior year by electing these competent officers: Perry Wood, president; Steve Graef, vice president; Peggy Leahy, secretary; and Kit Georgehead, treasurer. In November, after much work by two separate casts, our senior play, EVERY FAMILY HAS ONE, was presented. It was a tremendous success and played to a full house both nights. Another skating party was held just for the seniors and the senior vaude-ville was our second money-making project.

Several of our class members were privileged to attend the University of Louisville as Carnegie Scholars after their junior year. A further scholastic honor claimed by Waggener was the announcement that fourteen of our seniors had become National Merit Semifinalists. As the year went on everyone was filling out college application blanks and worrying about their college board scores. The general question was, "Have you been accepted yet?"

No one will ever forget the honors brought to us by our athletes during the senior year. Our football team, only in its second year of varsity competition, was the unofficial county champion. The basketball team won the Jefferson County Invitational Tournament and was recognized as the county champion. The swim team with a 7-3 record claimed second place in the State Meet, 88-86, and the track, golf, and tennis teams all did good jobs in their respective fields.

As plans are made for the prom and graduation, there is a feeling of great excite-ment among the class members. But along with this there Is also a strange feeling of sadness as we realize that the year we have been looking forward to for so long has gone by so fast. Just as we, the first graduating class of Waggener, have left an impression on the school, it too has left an impression on each one of us to last forever. So as we go our separate ways, let us never forget the memories which our years at Waggener High School, the best years of our lives, have given us.

St. Matthews high school student tells of Bahama adventure in marine biology by TOM OOLE

Thursday, Sept. 8, 1960

Members of the Bahama Adventure in Marine Biology left Mlami on Aug. 11 at mldnight on the Caribbean Star, ė a 104-foot, twin diesel ship. The adventure lasted for ten k days. h

The trip cost \$200; however, 1 was able to obtain a work-scholarship which enabled me to participate at a reduced price. For my part-passage, 1 worked at filling air-compressors, help-ing in the dining room and collecting dirty linens and replacing them with clean ones.

We arrived at Bimini Bay about daybreak on Aug. 12 after running aground and bending both of our props. As a result only one of them was in work-ing condition. After eating breakfast some of us went over to the Lerner Marine Laboratory to watch them feed the sharks, rays, "cuda, etc.

There we also saw a photogra-pher of "Danger Is My Business" taking pictures of sharks for one of his TV shows,

Upon leaving Lerner Labora-tory each one of us obtained a partner and we snorkled around Bimini Island. My partner and I saw two six-fool 'cuda which chased us up into shallow water. Also we ran into rays, skates and sharks that morning. After snorkeling around the Island I had to return to the boat because was on a work scholarship and I had to set up for lunch.

During lunch we left Bimini s for different diving waters. We p arrived at our destination around B 2 p.m., which was a reef called d Gun Cay (pronounced "KEY", p There I went spear fishing with my buddy. my buddy.

I hit two fair-sized Groupers. However, the barbs on my spear and did not open, and the fish wig-gled free and took refuge be-neath rock shelves.

I dove to the shelf and looked si in, but couldn't see anything. Afp ter my eyes got used to the dark pI still couldn't locate them and I e had to move on.

Since to my dismay, I couldn't see the fish, I had to leave him there wounded.

A wounded fish often attracts

A wounded fish often attracts barracuda and one was reportedly pestering some of the divers. (A 'cuda usually follows a diver at close range from behind, which is enough to make any diver unensy. If you ever had one follow you, you can readily appreciate why divers don't like them. However, they seldom attack a human.)

All night we traveled reaching Andros Reef the morning of Aug. 13. This one is the second largest reef in the world, the first being the Great Barrier Reef off of Australia. We did our diving near Morgan's Bluff, named after the famous Englishman.

All that morning we spear-fished and I killed a parrot fish. After dragging it a quarter mile back to the boal, I was told that its meat was paisonous, if 1 threw it back in the water it would attract sharks, so it had to be kept in the stern as we did all the garbage until we were sailing, and then threw it overboard,

In the afternoon my buddy and I went Scuba diving for the first time during the trip. We swam away from the boat until we noticed that a squall was blowing in, so we decided to head back as we were a good mile and a half from the boat,

Within ten minutes my partner was out of air so he surfaced. Shortly after I was out of air so we both swam on the surface. It was getting increasingly dark, the wages got higher, and the shore-bound tide stronger.

The night of Aug. 14 we traveled for two hours and then anchored at Andros Reef at Long Cay. There we explored an old freighter week and found much debris on the bottom of the reef.

During lunch we moved to Goulden Cay. Here I used my Scuba to help Dr. Storr, who is professor of Biology at the University of Buffalo, collect sponge specimens for research for a book which he is writing.

There was three fect of water in the forecastle and the waves splashed over the bow. Half of the passengers got seasick. We limped into Nassua at 10:30 the next morning Aug. 16. Because of the storm we stayed in Nas-sua another day and not many people objected. Nassua is a fine place as long as one has an inin the forecastle and the waves place as long as one has an in-exhaustable supply of money. (I was already out.) .

We sailed at 2 p.m. on Aug. 17 to Hog Island. Here I had sharktrouble again. I was hunting and my buddy was taking under-water pictures. When he ran out of film he returned to the boat to replenish his supply for more pictures.

I did not go with him because I had seen two nice Groupers. I waited until one came out of a cave then I dove and speared him. He promptly swam under a rock taking my spear with him.

I was out of air so I had to surface, as it is illegal to spearfish while wearing an aqua-lung in the Bahamas. As I surfaced, a six-foot nurse shark and two smaller ones arrived on the scene. All three circled me two or three times slowly.

Unfortunately I was not wearing my knife, my spear was be-low inside a fish and my buddy wasn't in sight. After the big one returned twice more, I was re-lieved to find out that he wasn't hungry.

That afternoon we dove in Green Cay, There we explored the bottom.

. The following day, Aug. 18, we explored the reef which was probably the most beautiful we

had experienced on the trip. Here we saw a ray five feet in diameter and a few sand sharks sleeping on the bottom. Sharks must keep moving if they don't want to sink to the bottom, for they have no swim

bladders as other fish do. The cook caught a small shark that evening, so we had Dr. Storr dusect it.

The next day, Aug. 19, at Sandy Cay the reef was almost as beautiful as Winding Cay reef. Ginnt purple sea fans swayed with the waves 30 feet below the surface. Bentuifully - colored surface. coral, yellow elk-horne coral almost grew to the surface.

Many stag-horn coral covered the rocks which formed huge canyons in which many splendidly - colored small fishes daried from rock to rock, while the large Grouper and Snapers inside the protective lurked

Giant black sea urchins were stretching their sharp poisonous spines in the everlasting search

for food. (They eat away pock-ets in the rocks in which they hide from their enemies and also from their prey.)

Gigantic green brain coral grew from the sandy bottom sometimes 25 fe et in diameter providing hiding places for the tasty lobsters and also for hordes of small tropical fishes and even moray cels.

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




