Other projects in the display included dolls showing Roman family garb, by Susan Richardson; models depicting nobility dress and hairdos, by Pat Plaga; Roman palaces and temples, complete with columns, inlaid tile floor, and fountains and baths; a slate used by the Romans for writing, consisting of a wooden board covered with wax, by Woody Cain; heavy Roman jewelry; Roman weapons (sword, crossbow, and spear) by Bob Proctor and Bill Phillips; a soldier's head surrounded by the variety of helmets he might have worn (carefully constructed of tin foil) by Dana Marmion; gladiator dolls by Mike Lynch; three beautiful dolls representing the Roman Fates, by Carolgene Wise; a huge light-up map of Italy by Bill Hains; and a circular coliseum by Jim Hannah.

There were many posters dealing with the history, geography, mythology, dress, weapons, tools, language and alphabet, sports, and homes of the ancient Romans, and even a Roman calendar for 1960.

# Language laboratory opens at Waggener

## Is financed by National Defense Education Act money, first in State

A Language Laboratory was officially opened at Waggener High School on Tuesday, and school officials believe it is the first fully-equipped language laboratory in a Kentucky high school.

Mrs. Helen Daniel, supervisor of foreign languages and English for Jefferson County Schools, said the idea for the language laboratory started during World War II when it was found the traditional high school foreign language classes were not producing people who were able to speak and understand foreign languages in a practical way.

She said the laboratory method of providing a situation in which the student can hear a native speaker and listen until he understands and can practice imitating, was devised and put into use by the army.

This language laboratory is a means to provide the foreign language learner with an instrument whereby he may practice

just as a child practices the piano or some other instrument.

She further stated that it has been proven that foreign language students with an opportunity to work in a laboratory not only learn to speak the language better and more quickly, but to understand the grammar and to be able to read it.

Mrs. Daniel said it was through the National Defense Education Act Funds that the Jefferson County Board of Education was able to finance the purchase of the laboratories, and it was through the foresight of Richard Van Hoose, superintendent of the board, and Everett Farmer, assistant superintendent for instruction, that boys and girls at Waggener will have the advantage of the most modern methods of language teaching.

The laboratory at Waggener consists of a master console with three tape recorders and a record player, through which channels the teacher can send one lesson to the entire group of pupils, or she can send four different lessons to different stations.

There are 15 sound-proof student's booths equipped with magnetic record players, on one of which the pupil can record and play back, and the other he can record only. Each booth is equipped with a pupil's microphone by which he can record on the magnetic disc, or he can speak to the teacher. She can also speak back to him.

It is also equipped with students' head phones, and he can listen to tape that is being directed to his particular station, or he can listen to the teacher speaking to him directly. The teacher can listen to anyone of the 15 pupils by tuning into his head phone.

Mrs. Daniel said "the laboratory is the best instrument we know of up to now to teach the skill of learning a language."

She said "It is not a toy. It is a place for very serious work, and doesn't take the place of the traditional class room. It is an enrichment of the regular language course."

She said the laboratory is a practice room to give students practice in hearing and speaking the foreign language and goes right along with classroom work with the tapes and records geared to the text being used.

Other members of the Board of Education attending the official opening Tuesday were Mr. Farmer, Lew Laukhuf, director of instructional administrative problems, Everett Hancock, director of administrative affairs, and Ben Krentzman, assistant to Mr. Hancock.

Waggener's principal, Earl Duncan, was on hand and also present was William Kirtley, of D. T. Davis Co., which installed the equipment.

## Waggener High must not be enlarged any more

The news that Waggener High School may be enlarged again is a shocker. In our opinion, and in the opinion of many educators, the school is already overpopulated by 700 to 800 students. With 2,436 students in the school, the principal and his staff have long since found it impossible to keep up really effective personal contacts with the students. Waggener is rapidly becoming an education factory instead of a school.

It seems to us every P.T.A. and school in this area ought to be exercised about this matter. Greathouse, Chenoweth, Wilder, Stivers, St. Matthews Elementary, and Lyndon Elementary Schools all feed into Waggener. The parents have got to realize that if something isn't done, and soon, they will see their children crammed into a giant impersonal school, with crowded classes, and with proper supervision by the administrators made impossible.

The possibility that Waggener may be enlarged again — for the fourth time if we remember correctly — stems from the fact that the County Board of Education has found it much cheaper to add onto an existing high school rather than to establish a new one. We understand that the Board is very short on building money. One Board member told us that Valley, Seneca, Butler and one or two other County high schools are worse off than Waggener, and the choices confronting the County school system are narrowing down to these two:

1. Enlarge existing high schools, or
2. Go on double sessions.

He agreed that either choice was a bad one, and either one would cheat the children of part of their education.

The State ought to be able to help us out. Gov. Combs announced Saturday he will ask the Legislature to appropriate \$271,130,530 for the next two years for Kentucky education. That is \$102,714,630 higher than appropriated by the State for the past two years. Surely in this sum there must be enough money to build some more high schools in Jefferson County, particularly when this community pays the lion's share of State taxes.

Whatever happens, we must prevent the further expansion of Waggener High. Several years ago, the County Board of Education acquired some land in Lyndon with the announced purpose of building a new junior high there. It's up to us in this community to make sure that the Board can and will keep that promise.

The Waggener High School Orchestra will present a winter concert on Thursday evening, February 25, at 7:45 p.m. Some of the highlights of the program will be Poet and Peasant Overture In Suppé, a Clarinet and Bassoon duet played by Martin Rodunz and Don Smedley, and selections from Show Boat and Carousel. The program will be played in the Waggener Auditorium under the direction of Mrs. Eleanor R. Ritchie. Admission is 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for students.

## Fake bomb report empties Waggener

County Police are investigating a "bomb scare" that took place at Waggener High School Monday.

to check of all students and teachers absent for the day. They were also given a list of all students who have been suspended from Waggener.

The school was evacuated in an orderly fashion, without panic, but principal Earl Duncan and his staff were peeved over the loss of a morning's school work.

"It's not funny when 24 hundred students are taken away from their classes and have to stand outdoors for a half hour," he said.

An eight-man County Police squad, headed by Capt. Doug Littrell, turned up at the school after a boy called the school and said a bomb had been planted in the building to go off at 11:45 a.m.

The call was taken by Mrs. Doris Thompson, a clerk at the school.

The police and members of Mr. Duncan's staff searched the school's lockers thoroughly, and inspected the building. Finding nothing, they had all the children put on their coats. At 11:20, 15 minutes before the alleged bomb was supposed to go off, the building was cleared. Shortly after 12, the children returned to their classrooms.

## A big, crowded building isn't a school

Many parents here don't want Waggener High School to be enlarged any more.

The County Board of Education replies that it can't afford to establish new high schools, because it is much cheaper to enlarge existing schools. For instance, an addition planned for Seneca High will bring the building's overall price down to a per-pupil cost of about \$765. The per-pupil cost of the original building was almost \$1,400.

"This is a graphic answer to complaints that our high schools are becoming too large," said Rucker Todd, chairman of the County School Board.

Maybe. And maybe saving money on buildings will result in shortchanging the children on their education. We still think parents here must do everything possible to prevent the further enlargement of Waggener. A big, overcrowded building is no place to educate high school and junior high school students.

# Large schools, more taxes or double sessions seen here

## Officials say no money available for school to relieve Waggener

Larger high schools — or double sessions — or more taxes.

These are the alternatives facing the Jefferson County School system, according to Hucker Todd, a member of the Jefferson County School Board.

Mr. Todd and school superintendent Richard Van Hoose addressed a crowd of about 150 parents and teachers the evening of March 29 at Silvers School.

Mr. Todd held out little hope that the size of Waggener High School could be kept down, or that a new junior high school could be built on Westport Road to relieve Waggener, under present circumstances.

"We don't have the money," he said.

He said that in the next five years, the Jefferson County School system would increase in size by 21,000 pupils — 11,000 in the secondary schools (grades 7-12) and 10,000 in the elementary schools. This would be an increase of roughly 50 per cent.

The cheapest way to provide classrooms for the 11,000 increase in the secondary schools, other than double sessions, would be to make the high schools larger, he said.

The minimum cost for providing classrooms for the entire 21,000 is set at \$14,520,000.

He said that after serving three years on the School Board, he was convinced that the County School system, including the building program, was being run as inexpensively as possible. The implication was that no significant economies could be effected.

He said that the County Schools could expect to get \$1.8 million a year more from the State out of sales tax revenues. But he said this money in all probability would be used to raise teachers' salaries.

He said salary raises for teachers would be an absolute necessity, for it would be necessary to hire about 1,000 more of them to take care of the expected increase of 21,000 students.

He said Jefferson County was competing for the services of good teachers with Indiana, Illinois and Ohio, where starting salaries range from \$5,000 to \$5,500.

"We're like ostriches with our heads in the sand if we think they won't cross the river for \$1,000 a year more," he said.

Then he added, "I'd rather have my child go to school in a barn with a good teacher, rather than in a fancy building with an inadequate teacher." At this, the audience applauded.

He said double sessions would be "tragic" and would mean "the destruction of many of the things we're trying to do in our high schools." So the Board will pursue a second alternative, enlarging high schools, which is cheaper than building new ones.

He cited these figures:

Establishing a new high school for 1,710 pupils costs \$1,022 per pupil. Adding facilities to accommodate 420 more costs only \$485 per pupil.

The cost goes up to \$768 per pupil if 420 more are added, because basic facilities such as cafeterias must be enlarged.

But the cost goes back down to \$303 per pupil for the third and final addition of 360 pupils. This brings the average down to \$827 per pupil.

"If we have a high school of 2,556 pupils and enlarge it to ac-

commodate 300 more we save. He said he realized that large high schools were "unfortunate," because they made relations between the administration, the children, the teachers and the parents "impersonal."

"But we don't have our alternatives," he said. "The only alternatives we have are two evils — larger schools or double sessions."

He said Waggener High, designed for 2,410 students, now has 2,434. Next year it will have 2,618. The following year it will have 2,782, which will mean it will need 14 more classrooms.

He said that by the 1965-66 school year, there would be 3,200 pupils in the present Waggener district.

Eastern High, designed for 1,750, now has 1,813 he said. Next year it will have 1,933 and the following year it will have 1,969.

He said the school board had no plans for enlarging Waggener this Fall. He said the Board had not yet decided whether or not to expand Waggener in the Fall of 1961.

He said the Board had purchased ground on Westport Road to build a junior high to relieve Waggener, but "we have yet to have the dollars to build it."

He said that while he represents the St. Matthews-East End area on the Board, he would not like to see this district get new school buildings at the expense of the other districts in the County.

"I don't think we ought to do anything in one district we can't do throughout all the districts," he said.

He said the only way the present County School tax rate of \$2 per \$100 property valuation could be raised, under the law, was by referendum. He said he thought it would be extremely difficult to get the people to vote an increase this Fall in view of the sales tax and the occupational tax passed by the recent session of the Kentucky Legislature.

He added, however, the Board might try this year if there was "a surge of popular support" for it. "Without more money, there's no reasonable chance to restrict the size" of County high schools, he said.

Mr. Van Hoose said the County could get no more money from the State, and he thought it would not be wise to depend on getting any Federal money.

Mr. Todd said that a raise of 50 cents in the present County School tax would provide \$2.5 million a year for new school buildings.

Most of the people present raised their hands when they were asked if they favored putting the question of a tax hike on the ballot this Fall.

But Mr. Van Hoose cautioned them that while groups like themselves were in favor, and that there were similar groups all over the County, "we can't carry the rest" when it comes to a vote.

He reminded them that beginning in 1931, there have been four referendums on a tax raise. Only one — in 1937, a 50-cent hike for school buildings — has been passed.

He and Mr. Todd both made a firm promise that if a 50-cent hike were approved by the people, the School Board would build new buildings instead of enlarging the existing ones.

# Russians walk out at MUNAF

The Russian delegation staged a surprise walkout at the Mock United Nations Assembly at Frankfort. The surprise protest movement came towards the end of the first annual such Assembly for Kentucky High School students.

Waggener's delegation, headed by Owen Edelen, remained staunchly neutral in the heated debates as a representative of India. Members of the delegation included: Jan Dee Brodka, Lucille Lapsley, Mike Dew, Mel Borland, Jinny McMichael, reporter, and Anne Crockett, sponsor.

Several schools in the state sent delegations representing the following countries: The United States, Canada, India, Poland, Russia, the United Kingdom, the Union of South Africa, France, Hungary, Nationalist China, Cuba, and Haiti.

The assembly had a President, Secretary General, and Parliamentary Advisor as in the real UN. The sponsor was Mr. Ralph Horn. Mr. Carroll Hubbard, a graduate of Eastern High, explained the United Nations. The Mayor of Frankfort was present at the opening assembly in the House of Representatives to provide the Welcome Address to the fifty-some delegates, reporters, and sponsors.

The morning discussion centered on the South African crisis, but in the end the bill for action was rescinded, making for a wasted morning.

The afternoon session brought passage of a bill for disarmament, with a commission to check against infraction. It was at this point the Russian delegation (Seneca High) and the satellite countries of Poland and Hungary walked out.

The remainder of the assembly began discussion on the Cuban situation. Russia, realizing there was still a quorum present, re-entered.

The atmosphere of a real UN assembly was present with the factions, tensions, caucassing, and "deals". Exact Parliamentary procedure was of prime importance. The Cuban delegation was complete with sunglasses and samples of "Cuban sugar".

The United States came in for its share of criticism in the course of events. Defeated were two bills: one demanding a United Nations boycott of the US for six months for its deplorable action in Cuba; another for a commission to investigate the US's serious segregation problem.

At 3:15 the care-worn world diplomats adjourned until next year.

## Threat to Waggener and all our schools

Waggener High will not have to go to double sessions next year. That's the good news from the County Board of Education, only it's not good news at all when you go into it a bit.

Waggener can avoid double sessions by going through "numerous readjustments and some remodelling," according to the County School superintendent, Richard Van Hoose. What that means is that the teacher work load will be increased, the shop will be partitioned, and the audio-visual rooms will be converted to classrooms. In short, the school will be partially torn up. At that, Waggener will be better off than four other schools, which will have double sessions next year.

This is terrible news. The County School system is running out of building money and even if it had any, Waggener would get no relief, as it is obvious that the double-session schools must get first priority on any building money. To us it seems only a question of time until Waggener is on double sessions, for in the years to come, there will be no audio-visual rooms and shops to convert and partition, and there is no evidence whatsoever that the high school population here will do anything but increase just as it has steadily and quickly the past 10 years. The Census Bureau figures show that the population of Jefferson County outside Louisville has increased 95 per cent since the last census in 1950.

The parents, children, teachers and administrators of the Jefferson County School system are faced with a problem of the first magnitude. It is a problem that cannot and should not be solved by the State or the Federal government. It is a local problem and it must be met on a local basis. Our school children must have the necessary facilities to obtain a first-class education, and it is up to our community leaders to come up with a solution.

# Thousands see 1st Waggener graduation

## Pride, sentiment, humor mark 2 1/2-hour occasion

Pride, sentiment and humor marked Waggener High's first graduation ceremony Saturday evening in the east wing of Freedom Hall at the Fairgrounds.

And although it was a sweltering night, the crowd estimated variously at 2,000 to 4,500 people, stayed glued to their seats for the full ceremony, which lasted nearly 2 1/2 hours.

The 224 graduates never looked better as they filed up the aisle in their caps and gowns of crimson to take their seats. Some of them grinned, some of them looked dignified, some were proud and nervous, but neither then nor later did any of them appear to be crying—a common sight at so many graduations. There was a surfeit of cheer, breezy air about the whole occasion, except for a couple of brief moments.

One of them came when the Carol Curry award was announced. The award was in memory of the late Miss Curry, who would have been a member of the first Waggener graduating class but for her untimely death this year.

Bob Shane, president of the National Honor Society at Waggener, presented the award to Jean Carol Swann, a friend of Miss Curry's, "as a memento to Carol . . . to the most outstanding senior girl at Waggener during the year."

There was another sentimental moment when Owen Pillans on behalf of the St. Matthews Rotary Club presented a trophy for "outstanding citizenship" to Jim Thompson. The award was called the James Nolan award.

In honor of the former Mayor of St. Matthews, who "gave many years of unselfish time and set a good example for the youth of the community," said Mr. Pillans.

A roar of applause went up when former principal John A. Lowe was introduced. Mr. Lowe, Waggener's first principal, served from 1954 to 1959.

Another roar went up when Mrs. William Micox gave the P.T.A. award to Peggy Leahy and Perry Wood. The cups, given in honor of Mr. Lowe, were given to "the boy and girl who contributed so much to Waggener in their time there in many ways." Mrs. Micox gave both winners a kiss.

Robert Ling got a tremendous round of applause for winning the Balfour Award for loyalty, scholarship and achievement.

David Amy, Waggener boys' counselor, who announced the awards and scholarships, said they amounted to \$30,000 for the first year, and if renewed could ultimately go as high as \$100,000.

It was an historic occasion for Waggener in more ways than one. The senior class for the first time in public sang the school song, and it was written by two of the seniors, Bobby Lam and Jeanette Caswell. Also among the graduating seniors was Glen Wagner, who designed the senior ring. He was given the Beta Club cup.

There was a moment of tremendous collective pride when Lt. Gov. Wilson Wyatt praised the high caliber of the class. He noted that 82 per cent of the graduates were going to college or would otherwise continue in school.

"I doubt that any school anywhere can eclipse this record," said Mr. Wyatt. He gave the Commencement address.

In a speech laced with jokes and quotations from Teynbee, Poulbeck and Shakespeare, he told the graduates, "This is the time for greatness, not just in leadership but for living."

He said the Waggener generation would go down in history as greater pioneers than the sex of Magellan or Columbus or Daniel Boone. He said that more inventions and changes would come about in the next 40 years than in all of previous recorded history.

He said that the three forces changing civilization were the population explosion, the scientific revolution, and the battle for the minds of men.

In this battle, he said, the United States is the leader of the

He asserted that the right "attitude" was far more important in future life than "mental capacity," and called on them to help avert World War III by re-dedicating themselves to "the simple truths of the spirit."

He quoted Teynbee's dictum that this age would be remembered as the one which believed civilization could be brought to everyone in the world. "It's a great age to be alive,"

in a more prosaic vein he said that next year the Jefferson County School system would receive \$10 million from the State, an increase of 50 per cent over last year, and that teachers' salaries had been increased by \$1 million a week over last year.

The processional and recreational were led by Julian Derry; the invocation given by Rev. H. Sheppard Munson; the choral interlude by the Waggener Choir led by Mrs. Bernice Ely; the introduction of School Board members by Sidney Baxter; the introduction of Mr. Wyatt by Arthur Drake; the presentation of awards by David Amy; the awarding of diplomas by principal Earl S. Duncan; and the benediction by Rev. Kavanaugh A. Lee.

On hand for the occasion was County School superintendent Richard Van Home, whose daughter, Marie, was among the graduates. With him were his assistants, James Everett Farmer and Jack Dawson, and O. L. Sheldis, chairman of the guidance program for the County School system.

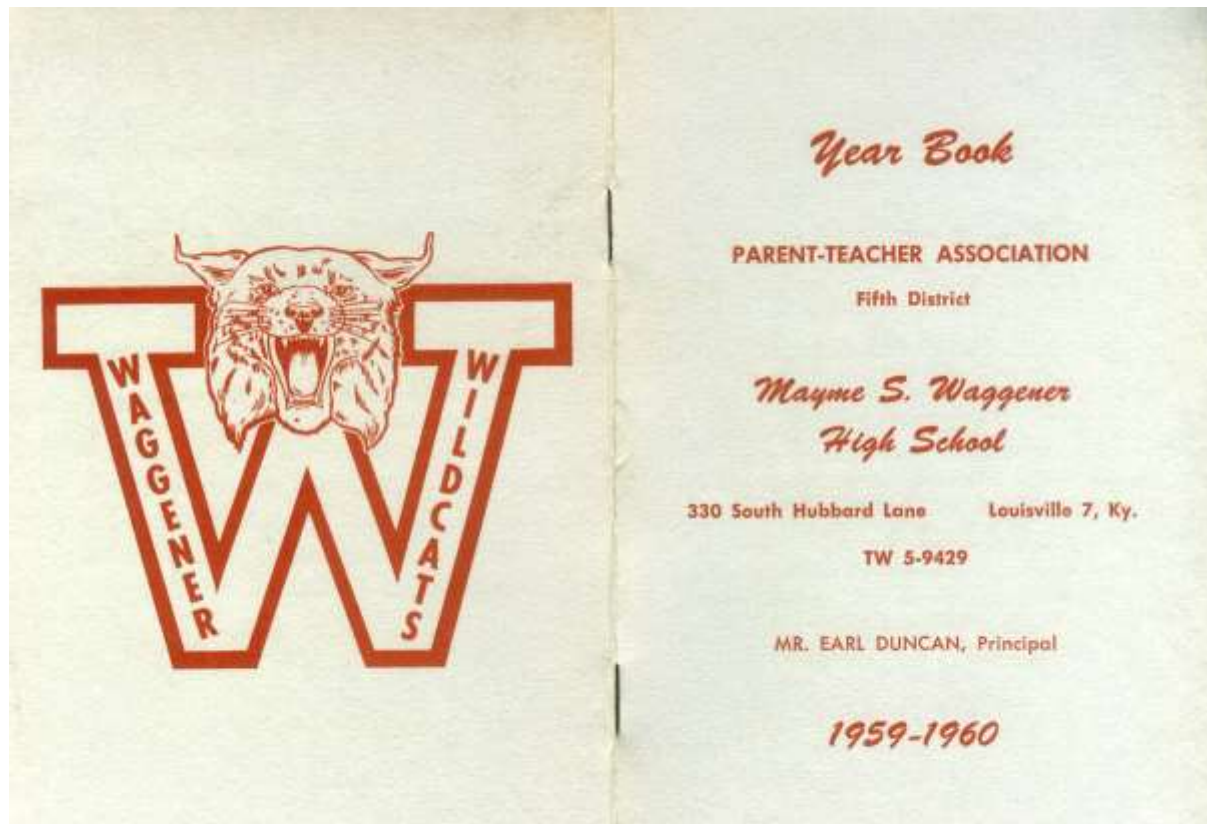

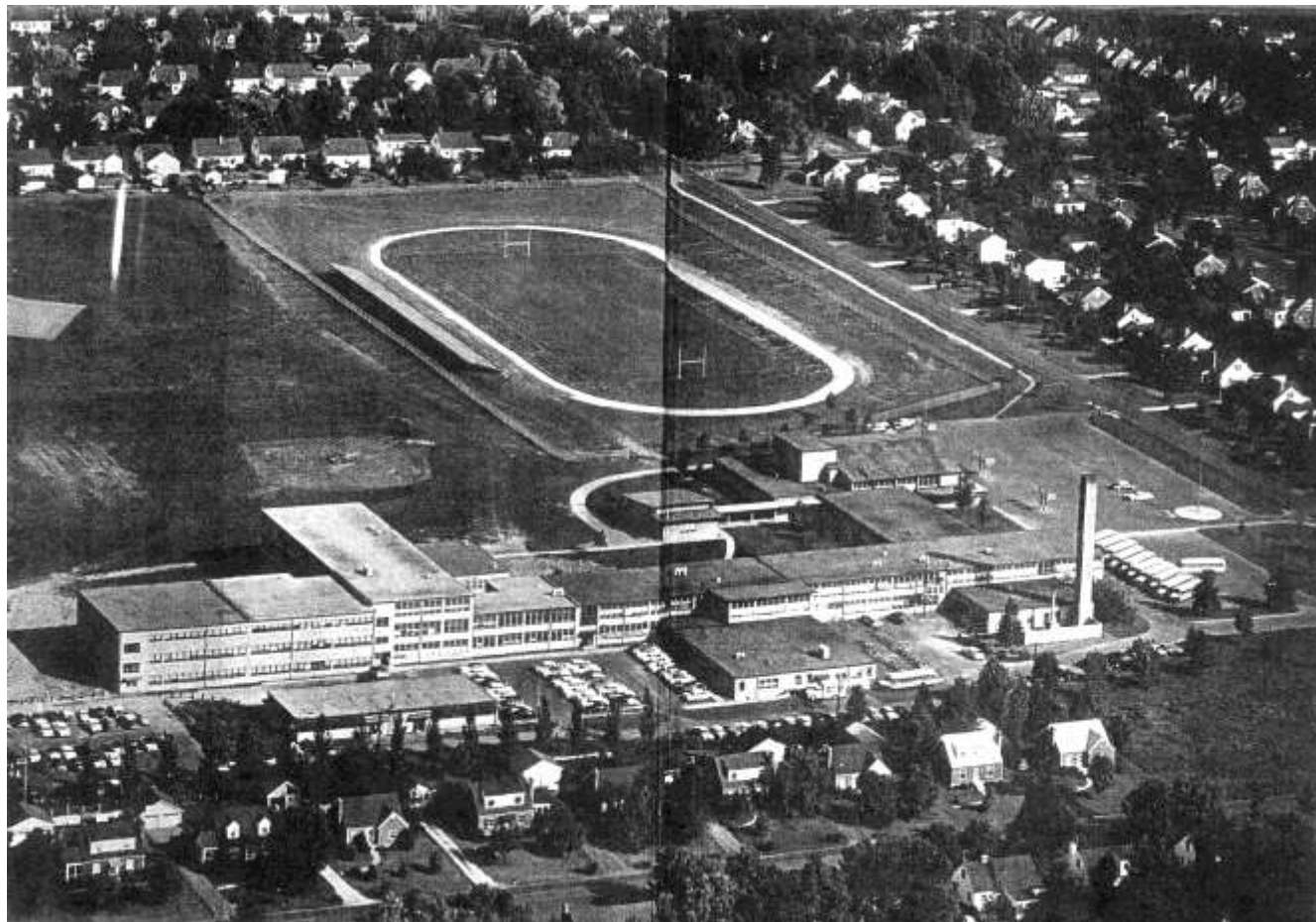

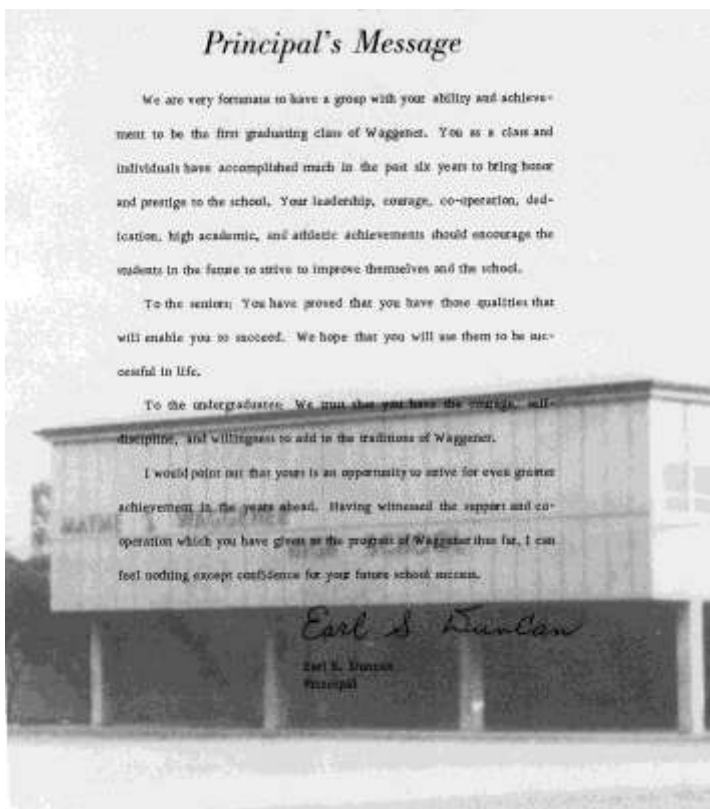
To the seniors: You have proved that you have those qualities that will enable you to succeed. We hope that you will use them to be successful in life.

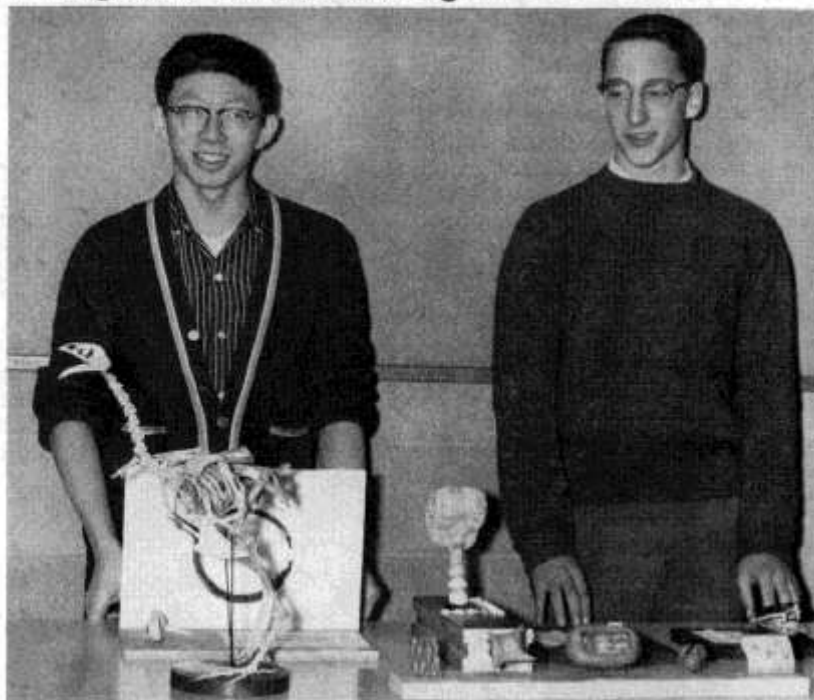

**Students Have Opportunities To Exchange Ideas With Scientists**

On alternate Saturdays, thirty-one high school juniors and seniors scurry off to the Jefferson County Science Seminar to spend two hours discussing phases of advanced science and mathematics. These discussions are led by scientists from nearby industrial - research laboratories and by university professors. At other times during the week, these students work with their scientist-advisors on projects in biology, electronics, chemistry, meteorology, and other branches of science beyond the usual high school level.

Some of the specific projects are the design, testing, and construction of a fuel cell; hydroponics; photosynthesis — record effect of light rays on plants; solar batteries; and measurement of the amount of protein-bound iodine in dog's blood.

These seminars are sponsored by your Jefferson County Board of Education with the very able assistance of the Louisville En-

gineering and Scientific Societies Council. The Council has been helpful in securing seminar leaders and individual project advisers.

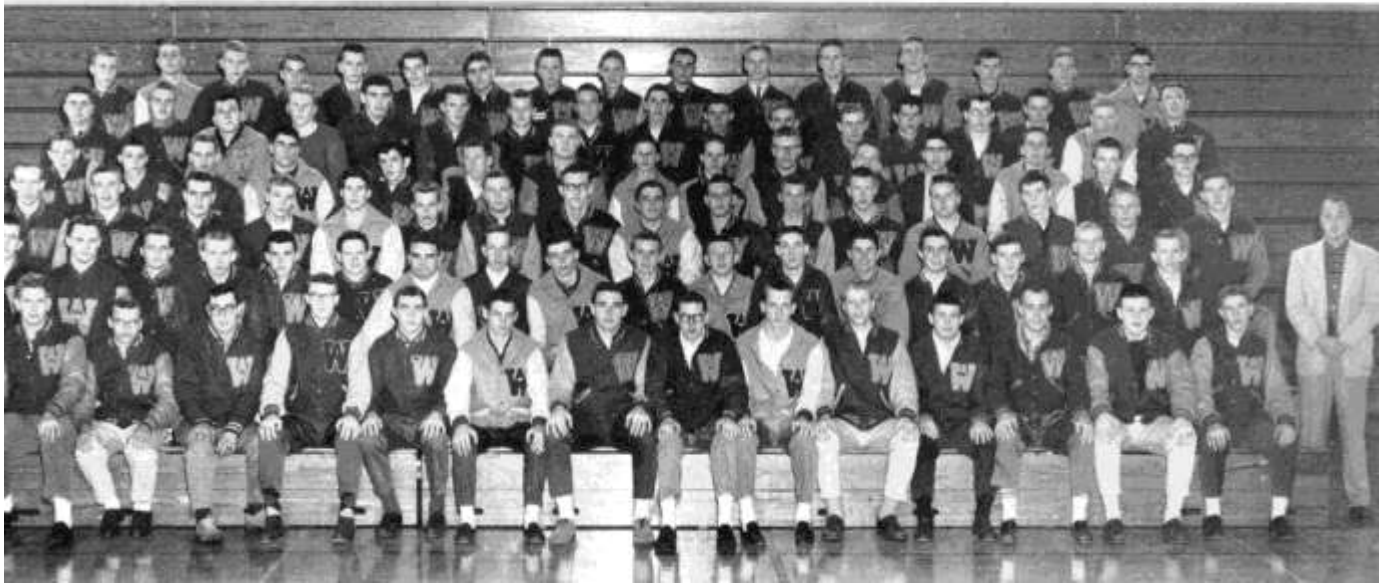

Seniors at last! Yes, this is the year we have been waiting for since we first entered Waggener. We, "The Class of 1960, have watched Waggener grow and have grown with it. Being the top class since our freshman year, we have had no one's footsteps to guide us and no traditions to follow. We are the ones who have imprinted the footsteps and begun the traditions.

By our freshman year, a few clubs had been organized and the various athletic teams were playing in Junior varsity competition. This was our first year as the oldest class, and thus the long journey ahead started.

When we returned to Waggener the next fall, we elected class officers for the first time. They were Charles Brown, president; Bobby Leason, vice president; Pam Ferguson, secretary; Mary Carol Coons, treasurer; and Denny Garber, sergeant-at-arms. This was an important year as the Student Council and the Waggener chapter of the Beta Club were organized, the journalism class took over the publication of the CHIT-CHAT, and our first annual, THE LAIR, was published.

We started our junior year by electing these competent officers: Perry Wood, president; Steve Graef, vice president; Peggy Leahy, secretary; and Kit Georgehead, treasurer. An executive board was elected to represent each homeroom. As the year proceeded our class grew closer together and the class spirit which was developing helped to increase our school spirit. Our main money-raising projects were the sponsoring of sock-hops after football and basketball games and a roller skating party. A junior class picnic was held in the spring.

On the athletic field this proved to be a very big year, for it was our first year of varsity competition. The swim team brought honors to the school after finishing second in Class A in the State Meet. The football, basketball, baseball, track, golf, and tennis teams also did an excellent job of representing the school. During this year G. A. A. was organized to promote an athletic program for the girls.

In February, twenty-four juniors were honored by being tapped for the National Honor Society. The Quill & Scroll was another honorary organization brought to Waggener. Members of our class also participated in the State Speech Festival and Youth Speaks.

We were sorry to lose Mr. John B. Lowe, our principal since Waggener's doors opened. His difficult position was ably filled by the former assistant principal, Mr. Earl Duncan.

Not long after we returned to Waggener to begin our long awaited senior year, we received our class rings which everyone very proudly displayed. Next we elected officers to lead us in our last year at Waggener. Perry Wood was re-elected president with a unanimous vote and the following were elected to support him: Steve Graef, vice president (re-elected); Gayle Reichmuth, secretary; and Bill Moeller, treasurer.

In November, after much work by two separate casts, our senior play, EVERY FAMILY HAS ONE, was presented. It was a tremendous success and played to a full house both nights. Another skating party was held just for the seniors and the senior vaudeville was our second money-making project.

Several of our class members were privileged to attend the University of Louisville as Carnegie Scholars after their junior year. A further scholastic honor claimed by Waggener was the announcement that fourteen of our seniors had become National Merit Semifinalists. As the year went on everyone was filling out college application blanks and worrying about their college board scores. The general question was, "Have you been accepted yet?"

No one will ever forget the honors brought to us by our athletes during the senior year. Our football team, only in its second year of varsity competition, was the unofficial county champion. The basketball team won the Jefferson County Invitational Tournament and was recognized as the county champion. The swim team with a 7-3 record claimed second place in the State Meet, 88-86, and the track, golf, and tennis teams all did good jobs in their respective fields.

As plans are made for the prom and graduation, there is a feeling of great excitement among the class members. But along with this there is also a strange feeling of sadness as we realize that the year we have been looking forward to for so long has gone by so fast. Just as we, the first graduating class of Waggener, have left an impression on the school, it too has left an impression on each one of us to last forever. So as we go our separate ways, let us never forget the memories which our years at Waggener High School, the best years of our lives, have given us.

The trip cost \$200; however, I was able to obtain a work-scholarship which enabled me to participate at a reduced price. For my part-passage, I worked at filling air-compressors, helping in the dining room and collecting dirty linens and replacing them with clean ones.

We arrived at Bimini Bay about daybreak on Aug. 12 after running aground and bending both of our props. As a result only one of them was in working condition. After eating breakfast some of us went over to the Lerner Marine Laboratory to watch them feed the sharks, rays, 'cuda, etc.

There we also saw a photographer of "Danger Is My Business" taking pictures of sharks for one of his TV shows.

Upon leaving Lerner Laboratory each one of us obtained a partner and we snorkled around Bimini Island. My partner and I saw two six-foot 'cuda which chased us up into shallow water. Also we ran into rays, skates and sharks that morning. After snorkelling around the Island I had to return to the boat because I was on a work scholarship and I had to set up for lunch.

During lunch we left Bimini for different diving waters. We arrived at our destination around 2 p.m., which was a reef called Gun Cay (pronounced "KEY"). There I went spear fishing with my buddy.

I hit two fair-sized Groupers. However, the barbs on my spear did not open, and the fish wiggled free and took refuge beneath rock shelves.

I dove to the shelf and looked in, but couldn't see anything. After my eyes got used to the dark I still couldn't locate them and I had to move on.

Since to my dismay, I couldn't see the fish, I had to leave him there wounded.

A wounded fish often attracts barracuda and one was reportedly pestering some of the divers. (A 'cuda usually follows a diver at close range from behind, which is enough to make any diver uneasy. If you ever had one follow you, you can readily appreciate why divers don't like them. However, they seldom attack a human.)

All night we traveled reaching Andros Reef the morning of Aug. 13. This one is the second largest reef in the world, the first being the Great Barrier Reef off of Australia. We did our diving near Morgan's Bluff, named after the famous Englishman.

All that morning we spear-fished and I killed a parrot fish. After dragging it a quarter mile back to the boat, I was told that its meat was poisonous. If I threw it back in the water it would attract sharks, so it had to be kept in the stern as we did all the garbage until we were sailing, and then threw it overboard.

In the afternoon my buddy and I went Scuba diving for the first time during the trip. We swam away from the boat until we noticed that a squall was blowing in, so we decided to head back as we were a good mile and a half from the boat.

Within ten minutes my partner was out of air so he surfaced. Shortly after I was out of air so we both swam on the surface. It was getting increasingly dark, the waves got higher, and the shore-bound tide stronger.

The night of Aug. 14 we traveled for two hours and then anchored at Andros Reef at Long Cay. There we explored an old freighter wreck and found much debris on the bottom of the reef.

During lunch we moved to Goulden Cay. Here I used my Scuba to help Dr. Storr, who is professor of Biology at the University of Buffalo, collect sponge specimens for research for a book which he is writing.

Since a storm was breaking, a

part of the hurricane that hit the East Coast, we headed for Nassua which had a well-protected port. Since running aground at Bimini we could use only one diesel engine as the other propeller was bent beyond repair.

There was three feet of water in the fore-castle and the waves splashed over the bow. Half of the passengers got seasick. We limped into Nassua at 10:30 the next morning, Aug. 16. Because of the storm we stayed in Nassua another day and not many people objected. Nassua is a fine place as long as one has an inexhaustible supply of money. (I was already out.)

We sailed at 2 p.m. on Aug. 17 to Hog Island. Here I had shark-trouble again. I was hunting and my buddy was taking underwater pictures. When he ran out of film he returned to the boat to replenish his supply for more pictures.

I did not go with him because I had seen two nice Groupers. I waited until one came out of a cave then I dove and speared him. He promptly swam under a rock taking my spear with him.

I was out of air so I had to surface, as it is illegal to spear-fish while wearing an aqua-lung in the Bahamas. As I surfaced, a six-foot nurse shark and two smaller ones arrived on the scene. All three circled me two or three times slowly.

Unfortunately I was not wearing my knife, my spear was below inside a fish and my buddy wasn't in sight. After the big one returned twice more, I was relieved to find out that he wasn't hungry.

That afternoon we dove in Green Cay. There we explored the bottom.

The following day, Aug. 18, we explored the reef which was probably the most beautiful we had experienced on the trip. Here we saw a ray five feet in diameter and a few sand sharks sleeping on the bottom.

Sharks must keep moving if they don't want to sink to the bottom, for they have no swim bladders as other fish do. The cook caught a small shark that evening, so we had Dr. Storr dissect it.

The next day, Aug. 19, at Sandy Cay the reef was almost as beautiful as Winding Cay reef. Giant purple sea fans swayed with the waves 30 feet below the surface. Beautifully-colored coral, yellow elk-horn coral almost grew to the surface.

Many stag-horn coral covered the rocks which formed huge canyons in which many splendidly-colored small fishes darted from rock to rock, while the large Grouper and Snappers lurked inside the protective

shelves of rock.

Giant black sea urchins were stretching their sharp poisonous spines in the everlasting search

for food. (They eat away pockets in the rocks in which they hide from their enemies and also from their prey.)

Gigantic green brain coral grew from the sandy bottom sometimes 25 feet in diameter providing hiding places for the tasty lobsters and also for hordes of small tropical fishes and even moray eels.

On Aug. 20, we anchored over Gorda Cay which, as we found out later, was a spear-fishing heaven. We all went out with high hopes of spearing a large grouper.

As luck would have it, I speared the first fish, which weighed 25 to 30 pounds—the biggest so far. Half an hour later, Jerry Grofe, a headshrinker from Philadelphia, killed a mangrove snapper which very well could have been a world's record, but we couldn't weigh it.

So Jerry dressed it and froze it. When we got back to Bimini, it weighed 57 pounds dressed.

At lunch Dr. Storr told us that a few years ago he dove off Gorda Cay when he and several

partners were hunting for silver bars from a sunken Spanish galleon. He found one bar among the ballast which was worth \$200,000; there is only one other like it in the world and that is in Spain.

Now everyone had treasure fever. So, for the rest of the day some of the divers hunted for the sunken ship but to no avail.

I still wanted a big Grouper. After hunting for about 30 minutes my gun broke, as I was swimming over to a rock which looked like a likely place for the "Big One". Sure enough, there he was—you wouldn't believe this—under the shelf looking at me broadside not more than 10 inches from me. He weighed at least 50 pounds and was at least four feet long.

The next morning on Aug. 21 we checked out of the Bahamas at Bimini and headed for home. This brought to an end one of the most exciting experiences I have ever had and probably ever will have.

If anyone asked me where I would go if I could go back to any one place, I would say, without thinking, Gorda Cay to get that big Grouper still under that rock.

# Waggener is crowded. <sup>ADV.</sup> At the situation overall looks good

Waggener High School is crowded—there's no question about that—but the teachers and the students apparently aren't letting it get them down.

A two-hour visit by a representative of *The Voice* Monday laid to rest fears that the present enrollment of about 2,610 might be more than the school could handle.

Our man's conclusion — "Things are a little tight. They couldn't stand any more increase in enrollment. But apparently they're getting by all right."

The chief difficulty seems to be the lunch period, and principal Earl Duncan, though optimistic, made no attempt to play down this problem.

To handle all the children, the relatively small cafeteria and lunchroom must start feeding them just after 10:30 and continue to almost 1 p. m.

Mr. Duncan thinks it's unfortunate that some children have to be fed so early, and he admits that if Waggener's enrollment gets any larger, the problem will get out of hand.

He expressed confidence that by next year, the County Board of Education will build a new junior high on a 37-acre tract it owns on Westport Road, just west of the State Reception Center, to relieve Waggener.

County School superintendent Richard Van Hoose told *The Voice*:

"We're giving it our consideration, just as we have since the purchase of the property."

That was about three years ago. Mr. Van Hoose said he had hoped to have the school built by this September, but the project had been side-tracked for lack of funds.

"I wish we could be more specific but I can't at the moment, we're working on it. I hope it won't be too long before we know something definite."

*The Voice* talked to several teachers and students about the lunchroom situation.

One student had complained that she'd spent 23 minutes of

her 25-minute lunch period on Thursday, the first day, waiting in line.

But other students said they never had to wait more than five or 10 minutes. One football player said he remembered that last year, it took some time to get through the line at first, but things settled down and moved more smoothly as the year wore on.

"It's crowded the first few days," one teacher said. "But everything will settle down, and the lines will move faster. It's a question of getting used to the routine."

She said the students were brought to the lunchroom in shifts by their teachers. They were supposed to have only 20 minutes for lunch, but because the situation was a bit crowded, the teachers generally gave the students an additional five minutes.

The classroom situation is strained. Two audio visual rooms have been converted into four classrooms, as have been two shop rooms.

As a result of losing the audio vision rooms, the school has mounted the projectors on carts, and these are taken from classroom to classroom as needed.

And the large number of home rooms — 85 in all — has forced the school to set up substations on the first, second and third floors to receive attendance reports. A student from each room delivers the attendance report to the substations. Office girls pick them up and take them to the principal's office.

This method keeps the office from being jammed every morning with 85 students delivering reports.

There was some confusion and milling around in the halls Monday as students waited to get into the administrative offices.

"A lot of this confusion is caused by the good calibre of students we have," said John T. Corey, boys' counsellor. "They've been doing a lot of thinking during the summer and talking over the curriculum with their parents. Now they want to change their schedules. A slow

student doesn't care about his schedule. He figures he just has to go to school, so he takes what he is given."

"I feel hopeful that the new junior high will start next year," Mr. Duncan said. "The prediction is that there'll be 3,300 students in the Waggener district next year."

He said the school couldn't handle that many, in his opinion, and that relief would be needed.

He said it would be hard this year, but he felt he and his staff could keep up.

"I'm not worried about the staff as much as I am about the facilities," he said. "The library is too small and the lunchroom too small."

How about the bookstore?

"It'll be crowded the first few weeks until everyone gets the necessary books and equipment, but then it'll be okay. We've got machines in the hall to dispense paper and pencils, so there's no need for anyone to come to the bookstore once he gets his original supplies."

Then he came to the crucial point:

"I think we're crowded, but I doubt seriously that any youngster will suffer as far as education is concerned."

He noted several improvements in the curriculum this year. One of them was brought about by crowded conditions.

"We had to take much of the science out of the core," he said, "so we could have the science room for teaching science. If we hadn't done so, we would have had to teach other core classes there. Now the science program will be stronger, because all the teachers teaching science will be science majors, instead of core teachers."

And while the gym was crowded, the physical education program, formerly extended to only the eighth and ninth grades, is now being broadened to cover the seventh grade.

"We're also giving eighth-grade superior students instruction in ninth-grade science and

algebra," he said. "They'll get an extra year of science and math before graduating.

"We've set up two classes in eighth-grade personal typing. Before, only the 11th and 12th grades took typing.

"This will strengthen our spelling and English programs. Typing improves the spelling of students, and by typing their papers, the students will enable the teachers to grade their papers quicker. It will help the quality of the entire English department.

"We also have for the first time in this area a creative

writing class in the seventh grade. One weakness of the youngsters is that they have many good ideas but can't express them in writing."

His conclusion was, "We have the best program and the best curriculum ever at Waggener this year."

He said the Waggener staff now includes 101 full-time teachers and one part-time, seven ad-

ministrators, and five television aides.

About 1,250 students in grades seven through 11 are in the five television classes.

He's sold on the television classes, despite their size. The television teacher, he said, concentrates on only one subject, and is an expert in his field. "He has time to do research and he doesn't have to grade papers," he said.

# At last—it's official we get school to aid Waggener, Eastern

It's finally official. St. Matthews will have a new junior high school by next September.

The school will be eventually a high school and will relieve Waggener and Eastern High Schools.

Word that the school would be built has been drifting around St. Matthews for weeks. Waggener Principal Earl Duncan said flatly that the school would be built and open by next year, and his statement was reported in the Sept. 15 *Voice*.

County School superintendent Richard Van Hoose declined to say at that time, however.

But this week he told *The Voice* the school, costing about \$1.8 million, will be built on a 46-acre

site on Westport Road, just west of the State Reception Center.

At first it will handle seventh, eighth and ninth graders, but eventually will handle grades seven through 12.

"Right now Waggener has 2,597 students," Mr. Van Hoose said. "We had estimated 2,002. So our estimates are pretty accurate. Waggener would grow normally in the next four or five years up to 3,300 if we didn't do anything about it."

He said the new school will open in September of next year with "something like 800 or 900 students," some from Waggener and some from Eastern.

Neither a name nor a principal for the new school has been selected.

Mr. Van Hoose said the County School Board started to build the school "a couple of years ago," but ran out of money. Instead, an addition to Waggener, costing \$400 to \$500 thousand, was built.

"This building will be bigger initially than other junior highs we've built," he said. "We are trying to provide for future growth." He said building a larger building in the first place is cheaper than building additions later.

Plans are to air-condition the building so it can be used for summer school classes.

He said the County School Board had no plans to shift schools to a 12-month schedule. "The community isn't ready for it," he said. When and if it does become ready, he and his staff are ready to administer it, he said.

Some 150 persons can attest to the talents of 15-year-old Diana Carr as a dedicated worker for

a cause in which she has an abiding interest and for which she has unwavering purpose.

This Waggener High sophomore has, on her own initiative, enrolled more than 150 people in the Lions Club Eye Bank and Clinic. This agency has been established at U of L Medical School by the Lions to restore sight where possible and perform research to find cures for and means to prevent blindness.

Since last spring Diana has been talking to people about the eye bank and signing them up as eye donors.

How did she become interested? When her family signed registration cards after Mrs. Carr heard Mr. Karl Daubert tell of the eye bank at the Westport Gardens Homemakers Club. As program chairman for Waggener's Health Career Club, Diana got Mr. Daubert to speak at Waggener. And by then her convictions led her on a personal campaign to enroll eye donors.

How does she convince her listeners? "I don't know," she replies, "I just talk about the eye bank." Actually, she communicates a sincerity and enthusiasm that can scarcely be denied.

Today Diana doesn't know the exact total of pledges she has secured. "At this point, I don't count anymore," she says. She

will continue her campaign, however, that eventually there will be a reserve in the eye bank to upon as needed.

Self-possessed, Miss Carr is more interested in talking about the eye bank than about her activities. She spoke of the 40 successful operations to date, corneal transplantations and vitreous implantations, as they are called. She stressed the waiting list of 400 persons for whom these types of operations would mean the difference between dark and light. She mentioned the new freezing process developed to preserve the eye until needed, but remarked ruefully that the demand has so exceeded the supply that there is no "balance" in the bank.

Several interests are listed by Diana in addition to the eye bank. For example, she became a member of the Waggener drill team this year, and considers it her main activity. She has added the duties of vice president to her program chairman chores in the Health Career Club, an organization of students interested in careers in the medical field; she also belongs to the Good News Club, a Christian organization. She plans to rejoin the Spanish Club should one materialize this year.

Diana lives at 3915 Staebler Ave. with her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. John Carr. Her one sister, Mary Beth, is now Mrs. David Rubsch.

Diana's wish is for publicity for the eye bank rather than for her efforts. "The office to call," she says, "if you want to register is in the Medical School at 101 West Chestnut, and the phone number is JU 4-9934."

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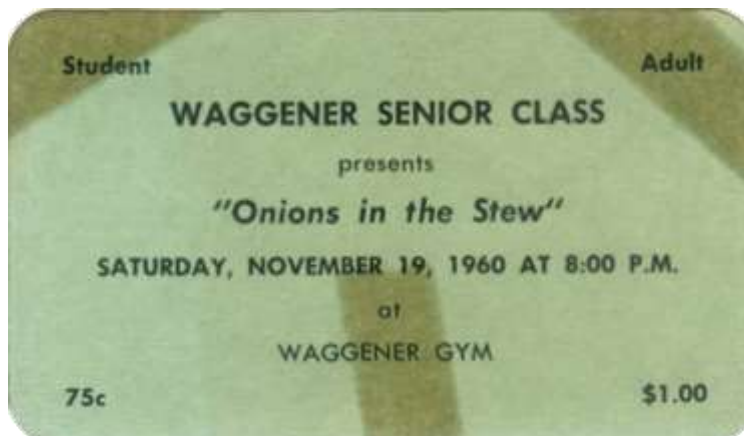
