






An unforgettable experience was taking biology under Mr. Simpson and Mrs. Evans. Mrs. Pardon came to Waggener and began the first special math course in Kentucky. Susie Cooke, Patsy Gay, and Linda Miller were the sophomore varsity cheerleaders. Representing us on the junior varsity squad were Bunny Laffoon and Lou Thompson. We were proud to have Susie Cooke elected Miss Waggener by the entire student body, and Carol Waford selected basketball queen. Fred Davis was chosen treasurer of the Student Council.

Our junior year proved to be the best yet. We elected as our officers: Fred Davis, president; Susie Cooke, vice-president; Sarah Lloyd, secretary; and Les Snyder, treasurer. The Cocoa Ruins came to life along with the sockhops as our money making projects. All our efforts were great successes due to the untiring contributions of Mrs. Lapsley. Our much enjoyed class functions were the skating party and the picnic at Hogan's Fountain. We were finally eligible for the Beta Club, and some of us were tapped for the National Honor Society and Quill and Scroll. Waggener became part of the Youth Speaks Program with Beth Moeller leading our class. Steve Porter was efficient in his position as vice-president of the Student Council. Once again we were well represented in the cheerleading department by Linda Miller, Susie Cooke, and Bunny Laffoon. Our class was not united and we looked forward to our senior year with anticipation and some apprehension.

To become president of the Senior Class was a job coveted by many, but this position went to Fred Davis, a hard-working boy who had proved himself capable the preceding year. Accompany him to complete the leading staff were vice-president. Jim May; secretary, Sarah Lloyd; and treasurer, Susie Cooke.

Our two main money making projects, the Senior Play and the Vaudeville were huge successes. With so many students being given an opportunity to participate, the class became more united.

The Christmas season was a memorable one splashed with parties and other gala activities. It was a great relief after suffering through the College Boards earlier that month. Many were making hopeful plans for college and a steady stream of catalogues and bulletins arrived in homes. The year was wonderful and we began to realize what would be ahead in the final semester of our high school career.



While there is an intense rivalry between the county's two large high schools in this area, a spokesman said that the trouble had been overly emphasized for which she blamed "the newspapers."

The incetting was called by the school PTA's Committee on Parent Education, which is sponsoring four study series this year.
Mrs. James W. May, PTA president, told the group that the committee had had one previous
meeting on the "WaggenerSeneca affair", where it was decided that student behavior following athletic events should be discussed by the students and parents.

She said that all the problems of a large urban high school could not be solved in one night, but the explained that good can come from the meeting. "If we go into it with the right attitudes, re-membering that there is a very delicate line drawn between 'airing a situation', which is right and emocratic, and 'stirring it up' group noted that students string which is wrong."

While there was no specific over-all program suggested for over-all program suggested for the school, the group which dis-cussed athletics said that the school's general sports program was not at fault but rather that it should be expanded to include more students. At one point it suggested that a gym period be compulsory for all students, but said Principal Earl Duncan estimated that two additional gyms would be required for such a program. An intramural program, the group theorized, would relax tensions and expend energy, improve posture and help phys-ically weak students. The group also said it thought the school's band program should be available to more students with talent rather than be confined just to there students enrolled in music.

The group on athletics said that the students' pep rally yells had been misinterpreted; it thought being was bad behavior and that adults set the behavior pattern for students at athletic events,

It was pointed out that one

students were not resentful to-ward Seneca students but that they (Waggener) just didn't like Seneca as a school. This, the group said, was jealousy.

A group reporting on social life in school said that Waggener does not sponsor planned sock hops but there are some 46 ac-tivity groups which do sponsor soc hop activity, It said that school sponsored dances are always under supervision, both at the school and away.

The group said there are clubs in which all students can find an interest but it noted that some students don't have the initiative to join an activity group, which it blamed in part on Waggener being a large school.

It was suggested that help be provided students, particularly those in junior high, on getting acquainted, It also noted that the community is not school centered but rather its social life is pri-

As for those activities outside of the achool, it was noted that the social clubs are good for students, but that there are more clubs for girls than for boys. It was said that some 50 to 60 per-cent of the boys do not belong to any club.

This group said there should be some common ground for all schools and suggested that this might be accomplished through a student council. It said that a time restriction on students' night

To another charge that mothers might be doing too many chores for their daughters. Sherrie retorted that all teenagers do not have that advantage. She admit-ted that if she for some cause over-slept her mother might iron a blouse for her at 7:30 a.m. but Sherrie said she most always ironed her own blouse.

As to financial problems, Sher-

rie again came to the defense of her group. She said that many teenagers make their own spending money, by working for it, and again cited her own case in

and again cited her own case in making the point.

One mother thought that the teenagers should be given more responsibility in taking care of their personal needs while at hume in order to prepare them. for college life.

This group also brought out that there is too much pressure on students to make good grades in order to be popular; it was noted that cheating is more flagrant than is realized at the school, and at least one parent thought that the students have too much home work. Some fault was found with the present grading system. The parents largely admitted that much of the pressure to be socially accepted is attributed to themselves, in that the parents at the standards. 

Student's generally for classroom TV, by Retta Johnston

Educational television is here to stay—that is the one sure thing about it. However there are many other aspects of it that are not so certain. What size class is the most effective? How much of a class period should be conducted "through the waves?" What precisely is the role of the classroom teacher in his "follow up?" What is to be done about the students who are above or below the level of the TV classes?

The success of educational TV has been established—by the Ford Foundations study of its ETV program, by nationwide statistics for which the yardstick is an achievement test given to the TV classes and to "control classes" which follow the same program of study in a conventional class, and by the testimonies of teachers and mentors in the field of education.

But, because this success is too often viewed by the public only in the light of statistics and statements from the higher echelons, it seems essential to o to those who are most directly affected by the program—its local administrators, teachers, and students.

Waggener stands as a fairly typical participant in the ETV program. It has been on the program for the past four years and at present five classes, averaging about 220 students, are conducted with the aid of TV.

The procedure for a class is briefly this—in a large room in a wing of Waggener, part of which is blocked off as office space for participating teachers and aids, the students assemble and turn their desks toward one of the seven TV sets. After the 25 minute program the teacher, using a microphone, follows us with a period of questions and answers, individual reports, group discussion or group projects which lasts from 20 to 30 minutes. This large class procedure is known as the Stoddard Plan.

Many less recently constructed schools, such as eastern, do not have space that was planned for this use and have had to improvise by using their auditoriums and cafeterias.

The general consensus of those interviewed at Waggener is that these large classes are the main disadvantage of their program but as this program admittedly originated as an "economy move" the classes will continue until adequate facilities and teachers are available. This problem was echoed by administrators at Eastern and apparently it is acute throughout Jefferson County.

These large classes bring in criticism from parents, teachers and students that the program lacks "personal relationships" and "individual attention."

"When the classes get down to groups of 50," says Lauren Boyen who teaches a 10th grade English class of 230 students at Wagener, "I will have no objection to our program."

Mr. Boyen compensates for this lack of personal relationship joking with the students, encouraging them to have conference with him, and encouraging them to hand in written compositions. Mr. Boyen teaches two other classes and has a total of 313 students. (The maximum load is 150.)

As to the actual teaching that TV lecture is done on the TV, many advantages were cited by teachers and students at Waggener. The main ones were these: The TV exposes students to audio and visual material that is not accessible to the ordinary class. For example, the camera can magnify a part of the heart and simultaneously the sound of its beat can be intensified. The program can run experiments, show movies, and the props that the average classroom could not possibly do. And, as one teacher said, "it puts each student on the front row."

Secondly, the TV teachers are superior teachers. This was generally agreed on by students and teachers interviewed at Waggener. (A daily lesson is usually the full load of a TV teacher and a whole summer is devoted to the preparation of a class.)

And, thirdly, a great deal of extraneous material is eliminated and therefore each period demands much more concentrated attention from the student. Mr. Vernon Odell who teachers an American History class, feels this is one of the most important advantages of ETV and says improved attention is very noticeable in his class.

The classroom teacher plans his class periods with a weekly outline of the TV classes. The TV teacher, the classroom teacher, and the student follow a textbook. The classroom teacher makes up tests and grades them. (The aides grade objective tests.) The TV teacher meets regularly with the TV teacher to vice their criticisms and make suggestions.

The importance of using the TV lecture only as a source of information which does not interfere with the teachers method and choice of material was pointed out by Mr. Boyen.

For those students who, are above or below the level of the TV class, the classroom teachers at Waggener hold a weekly 25 minute period of aid. And, in many cases, there are completely separate classes for these students.

Students at Waggener had this to say about ETV: Rhonda and Rhoda Lusk, twins who live at 8626 Whipps Bend Road are in accord about the TV program. They both feel it has improved their concentration and that they have learned a lot in their class. Rhonda added that she feels it "covers more detail" and she said, "if you get behind, you just get a conference slip."

"You learn to take notes and I think they have a better quality of teachers," says Billie Kays Gillette of 304 Merriman Road. Billie Kay has had three TV classes—English, Science and Math. "In science, there is a definite advantage to seeing things illustrated," she says and she likes the way the material is presented in the English class.

Judy Johnson of 404 Macon says she would like a little more individual attention. "I can pass in here but there just isn't enough time for each student," she says.

Local teacher helped to pilot merit pay project

A Waggener High School faculty member was project chairman for the recent Jefferson County Merit-Pay plan for school teachers which won recognition recently at the southeast regional Conference of Classroom Teachers at Miami beach, Florida.

The teacher is Mrs. Ruth A. Payton, who is teaching her first year at Waggener and who has served in county schools for some 20 years. She is teaching in the 7th grade advance programs.

She and her co-workers just returned recently from Miami Beach with a certificate of merit given by the National Education Association. They also are due to receive a plaque from the association.
