

Waggener to seek exchange student

The Waggener High School student body will attempt to obtain a foreign exchange next year, so Paul Keith and Rusty Garth, president and vice president of the student council, informed a P. T.A. meeting there Monday night.

Following the announcement, Mrs. John Shoemaker, chairman of the Atherton High School chapter of the American Field Service, explained the work of the American Field Service and the procedure involved in procuring and maintain ing an exchange student at Atherton, where a student from Italy is now studying.

Mrs. Shoemaker said that an exchange student could be obtained through the American Field Service of New York from any one of 40 foreign countries. She said the student could study at Waggener as a junior or senior for one year beginning next year.


A home for the student must be guaranteed by April 15 to be eligible in the program next year, she added.

At present there are only two exchange students in Kentucky High Schools.

Mrs. Shoemaker said that Waggener, after one year in the program, would be eligible to submit the name of an exchange student candidate for acceptance abroad. A spokesman for the P. T. A. said a parents committee will study the program in cooperation with the Student Council and school administrators, and a permanent committee will be named at a meeting Monday night at the school to consummate final plans in organizing a Waggener chapter of the American Field Service.

Eyeing the World: Change and intensity played havoc with the international, national and local scenes this year. Bomb shelters sprang up epidemic fashion as tension over megatons and fallout mounted. A new president tried his hand at our country's reins. Smashing Republican victories ended more than a quarter-century of Democratic control of Louisville's City Hall and Jefferson Countys Courthouse.

A marked interest in the world outside Waggener was evidenced this year. Mush-rooming enthusiasm culminated in the formation of a very active World Affairs Club; questions of world-wide import formed the basis for discussions in the World Affairs Seminars and almost every social studies class. A record number of seniors studied International Relations. Up to date news was furnished daily by the Waggener World Watch broadcasts. Those of us who reached 18 took seriously the responsibilities of voters, and school elections took on a new degree of fervor.

It is one of the objectives of an educational institution to fashion well informed young citizens; Waggener in 1961-62 took great strides toward the ideal fulfillment of this goal.

As day marches boldly on, gossip grows, grasping all in its clutches and leaving very little to be said. Sometimes it seems that extra-curricular activities do their best to undermine the curricular during the school day.

As the last bell approaches its ringing time, clothes and faces become slightly tired and haggard and nerves a bit edgy, but still there is energy left waiting for the triumphal exit as school closes for the afternoon.

Noise is predominant at this freedom, perhaps a means of letting off steam, perhaps a means of concealing an inner sadness that some day all this will end.

Generation in a Hurry: Many things have been said about the generation of which we are a part; few of them are complimentary. We were immortalized this year by a national magazine as lazy, offbeat, and strictly adherent to a "nothing to excess" philosophy.

Few of our strongest critics, though, would deny one facet of us: ours is a generation that will be heard. Tired of apathy and platitudes, it has plunged itself into the sometimes slow, sometimes roller-coaster hectic search for knowledge-both of facts and of ourselves. No academic solitude can lull the youthful consciousness or coax complaisant attitudes; the twentieth century march of life outstrips the written word's half truth.

Perhaps the most noticeable part of our generation is its variety—its members may leave a Go-Kart track for a get-together culminationing in a discussion of foreign policy. It is a generation of rushing-the daily rushes in the hall or toward the bus, and the farther reaching rush to make itself part of the world and the world part of it.

The Good Life: The good life is happiness and bliss and joy and sometimes maturing sorrow. The good life is a sunny day into which you walk and discover nature's beauty. The good life is a picnic, first rollicking and energy-filled then quiet and moody as sleepy warmth covers the afternoon. The good life is swimming and tennis and golf and the old stand-by sportsmanship. The good life is reading a book under the old tree! the sun and leaves playing shadows on the words and the wind gently hurrying the turn of a page. The good life is the Ohio River and boating and sunning and wafer skiing and companionship. The good life is being with friends, for shared joy is twice the joy and shared sorrow is half the sorrow. At the climatic end the good life is a party, splendid and joyful and funny, yet sad. Whirling, dancing couples are rings of color, but are vague when compared to the friendly face you seek out and find in relaxed companionship.

All this, and more, is the good life.




