Last spring a committee of English teachers nominated Paula, Chris Pugh, and Helen Blaha to represent Waggener in the competition. The nation's schools nominated almost 5,800 students for the NCTE citation.

# Waggener to seek exchange student

The Waggener High School student body will attempt to obtain a foreign exchange next year, so Paul Keith and Rusty Garth, president and vice president of the student council, informed a P. T. A. meeting there Monday night.

Following the announcement, Mrs. John Shoemaker, chairman of the Atherton High School chapter of the American Field Service, explained the work of the American Field Service and the procedure involved in procuring and maintaining an exchange student at Atherton, where a student from Italy is now studying.

Mrs. Shoemaker said that an exchange student could be obtained through the American Field Service of New York from any one of 40 foreign countries. She said the student could study at Waggener as a junior or senior for one year beginning next year.

A home for the student must be guaranteed by April 15 to be eligible in the program next year, she added.

At present there are only two exchange students in Kentucky High Schools.

Mrs. Shoemaker said that Waggener, after one year in the program, would be eligible to submit the name of an exchange student candidate for acceptance abroad.

A spokesman for the P. T. A. said a parents committee will study the program in cooperation with the Student Council and school administrators, and a permanent committee will be named at a meeting Monday night at the school to consummate final plans in organizing a Waggener chapter of the American Field Service.

Mrs. Frederick Kaestner, president of Waggener P. T. A., said a parents committee will study the program in cooperation with the Student Council and school administrators, and a permanent committee will be named at a meeting Monday night.

She said anyone interested in applying for an exchange student to live in their home during the next school year should contact Arthur Draut, assistant principal at Waggener.

# Selected high school students take science

Three students from Waggener High School and two from Seneca are among 11 outstanding high school science students who are taking a college course in radioisotope technology at Ursuline College.

The class, which began last Saturday and will end in June, is being conducted on Saturdays with Dr. T. E. Kargl, assistant professor of chemistry at the college, as instructor.

The course consists of two hours of lecture and a four hour laboratory session each Saturday. It offers four semester hours of college credit.

Miss Elaine Munsey, 2509 Brighton Dr., student at Seneca, is the winner of a full tuition scholarship for the course, and Donald Sidney Teiser, 2908 Abigail Dr., also of Seneca, holds a partial scholarship.

Waggener students taking the course are Gerald A. Olson, 8603 Hols-

ton Rd., David C. Rust, 213 Brampton Rd., and Henry P. Black, II, 40 Wendover.

The chosen students have shown special promise in the field of science and plan to concentrate on scientific studies in college.

The program by Ursuline to bring more advanced science instruction to high school students has been made possible by grants of more than \$10,000 from the Atomic Energy Commission.

Additional lecture-demonstration classes will be given by Dr. Kargl beginning in March, to introduce other high school students to radioisotope technology.

This instruction will be given over a six-week period, one session per week at three high schools, one of which will be Sacred Heart Academy, campus laboratory school.

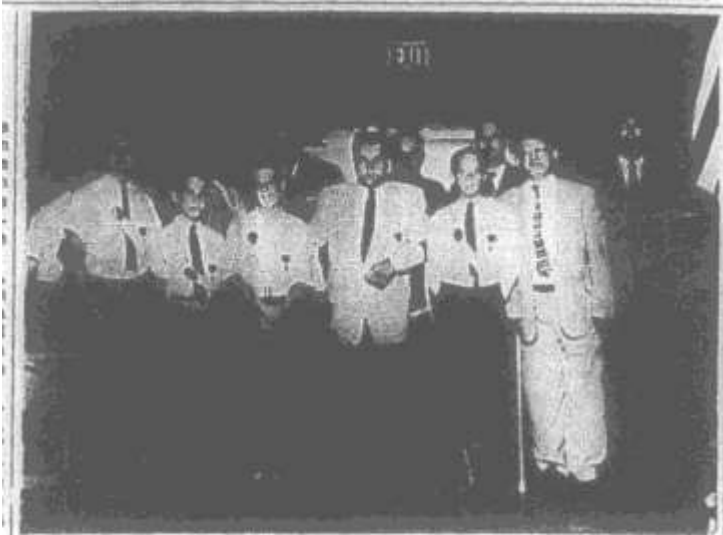

Waggener, which is now divided into junior and senior high, is operating on the 2-4 plan with the 7th and 8th grades composing the junior division and the 9th through 12th grades in the senior division. Junior high enrollment is 737. Senior high enrollment is 1623.

Earl S. Duncan heads the school as principal of both the junior and the senior high. John Corey and Arthur Draut are assistant principals of the senior high while Sidney Baxter is assistant principal in charge of the junior high.

Another change at Waggener is the addition of an exchange student, Masako Sato from Sapporo, Japan, who is staying at the home of Howard A. Hansen, 225 Sequoya Road. Masako, who is taking American history, English IV, American government, algebra, and typing, says that English is her hardest subject because she has so much listening and reading.

Masako is quickly becoming Americanized, but admits that American teenagers are very different from Japanese teenagers, especially in their manners. She thinks she will enjoy her year in Louisville arranged

through the American Field Service and the Waggener Student Council and Key Club.

For the first time in its history the Chit - Chat was awarded the George Gallup Award by the Quill and Scroll Society for extraordinary improvement and exceptional service to the school and community. The Gallup Award is the highest award given to a few papers in this country that fall into the grade "A" classification.

The lights were purchased at a price of \$13,450 through the help of the student body, the parents, the Booster Club, headed by Mr. Jim Helm, and other interested patrons.

A dedication ceremony will be held tomorrow night during the half-time of the Waggener vs. Valley game. As Mr. Duncan noted, the lights will eliminate the conflict between the athletic and scholastic programs, which will prove to be a definite advantage over the years.

The Waggener High Girl's Drill Corps will make its first appearance of the season tomorrow evening at the game.

The corps, lead by Miss Shirley Wilson and sponsored by Miss Ann Crockett and Mrs. Grace Evans, is made up of 45 members. This includes four majorettes, who will appear in the new uniforms this year, four drummers and the marchers.

The girls have been practicing and preparing for their many activities since before school started. Besides marching

during the half-time of all home football games and several basketball games, the corps will perform in the Fire Prevention Parade on October 8, and various other activities during the year.

## Two juniors selected for foreign exchange program

Jan Heckenkamp and Leslie Mills, juniors, are the first Waggener students selected to participate in the American Field Service foreign exchange program, Mr. Arthur Draut, assistant principal, announced.

This program is the same program by which Waggener received Mako Sato as an exchange student. Mr. Draut stated "In this program when we receive a foreign student, then we can send one of our own abroad for the summer." The American students just go abroad for one summer because "We generally don't have anyone at our school fluent enough in a foreign language to go for an entire year," commented Mr. Draut.

To be eligible for acceptance into the program, a student had to be a junior, had to have a 3.4 average or better, and had to have had at least two years of a foreign language. Nineteen juniors wrote a paper on why they wanted to represent Waggener in the program.

Mr. Draut stated, "There were many fine, strong candidates who were applying." A committee of five couples, parents of present and alumni students, and Mr. Draut screened the applicants. After having personal interviews, they selected Jan and Leslie.

The American Field Service now will try to find suitable families for the girls. They will try to match their economic, family, and social situa-

tions as closely as possible. The girls will not know what country they will go until the families are selected. The American Field Service will notify the girls of the results in January.

"I think we're going to have a real good freshman class," said Robin Boden, freshman class president. Robin continued, "I can't say it'll be the best class ever, but we'll try to make it that."

Other class officers are Steve Spickard; vice president; Doug DeMoss, secretary; and David Douglas, treasurer. So far, plans for this year

The second and sixth period chorus classes combined sang: "Earth Rejoice," "As Lately We Watched," and "Today In Bethlehem."

The junior high orchestra and band also provided special music.

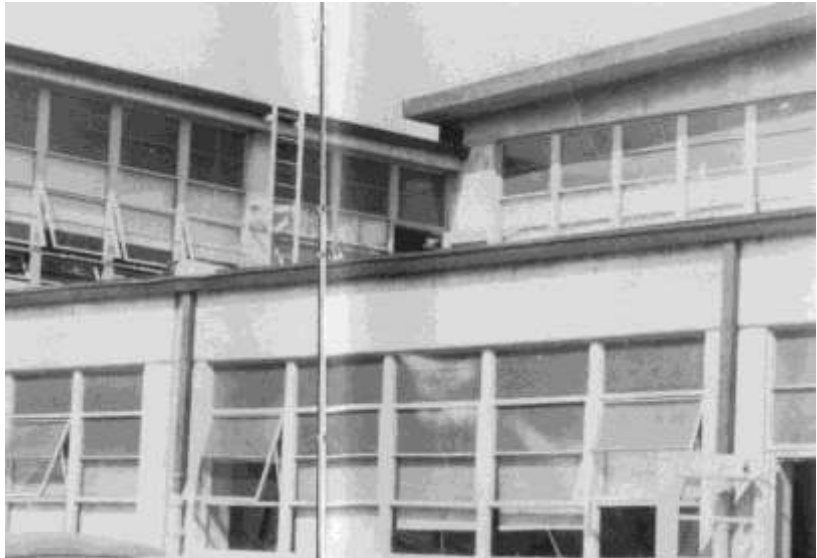

Groups, perhaps gangs, form, unified by similar thought, and defy-defy anything for the sake of individuality. These groups develop, including only a selected few, but each soul can find its place in the maze.

Each group participates in the race for supremacy—each favors and overpowers one, maybe a few, activities. Each inherits culture, the basis for a human system.

Altogether, St. Matthews is the core, the center, the culture, the environment of these groups . . . us.

Bomb shelters sprang up epidemic fashion as tension over megatons and fallout mounted. A new president tried his hand at our country's reins. Smashing Republican victories ended more than a quarter-century of Democratic control of Louisville's City Hall and Jefferson Countys Courthouse.

A marked interest in the world outside Waggener was evidenced this year. Mush-rooming enthusiasm culminated in the formation of a very active World Affairs Club; questions of world-wide import formed the basis for discussions in the World Affairs Seminars and almost every social studies class. A record number of seniors studied International Relations. Up to date news was furnished daily by the Waggener World Watch broadcasts. Those of us who reached 18 took seriously the responsibilities of voters, and school elections took on a new degree of fervor.

It is one of the objectives of an educational institution to fashion well informed young citizens; Waggener in 1961-62 took great strides toward the ideal fulfillment of this goal.

**The Proverbial Salt Mine:** Five days a week, nine months a year, students trudge to seemingly endless school. Though the starting of the days work is a little slow and sleep-laden, the arrival at school awakens the groggy mind and another wonderful day has begun.

The excitement aroused by the frantic cries of those not having their homework, the joyous glee in conversations concerning last nights telephone call, the catch in a voice when a certain name is mentioned, reaches an uproarious peak. As day marches boldly on, gossip grows, grasping all in its clutches and leaving very little to be said. Sometimes it seems that extra-curricular activities do their best to undermine the curricular during the school day.

As the last bell approaches its ringing time, clothes and faces become slightly tired and haggard and nerves a bit edgy, but still there is energy left waiting for the triumphal exit as school closes for the afternoon.

Noise is predominant at this freedom, perhaps a means of letting off steam, perhaps a means of concealing an inner sadness that some day all this will end.

**Generation in a Hurry:** Many things have been said about the generation of which we are a part; few of them are complimentary. We were immortalized this year by a national magazine as lazy, offbeat, and strictly adherent to a "nothing to excess" philosophy.

Few of our strongest critics, though, would deny one facet of us: ours is a generation that will be heard. Tired of apathy and platitudes, it has plunged itself into the sometimes slow, sometimes roller-coaster hectic search for knowledge—both of facts and of ourselves. No academic solitude can lull the youthful consciousness or coax complaisant attitudes; the twentieth century march of life outstrips the written word's half truth.

Perhaps the most noticeable part of our generation is its variety—its members may leave a Go-Kart track for a get-together culmination in a discussion of foreign policy. It is a generation of rushing—the daily rushes in the hall or toward the bus, and the farther reaching rush to make itself part of the world and the world part of it.

**The Good Life:** The good life is happiness and bliss and joy and sometimes maturing sorrow. The good life is a sunny day into which you walk and discover nature's beauty. The good life is a picnic, first rollicking and energy-filled then quiet and moody as sleepy warmth covers the afternoon. The good life is swimming and tennis and golf and the old stand-by sportsmanship. The good life is reading a book under the old tree! the sun and leaves playing shadows on the words and the wind gently hurrying the turn of a page. The good life is the Ohio River and boating and sunning and wafer skiing and companionship. The good life is being with friends, for shared joy is twice the joy and shared sorrow is half the sorrow. At the climatic end the good life is a party, splendid and joyful and funny, yet sad. Whirling, dancing couples are rings of color, but are vague when compared to the friendly face you seek out and find in relaxed companionship.

All this, and more, is the good life.

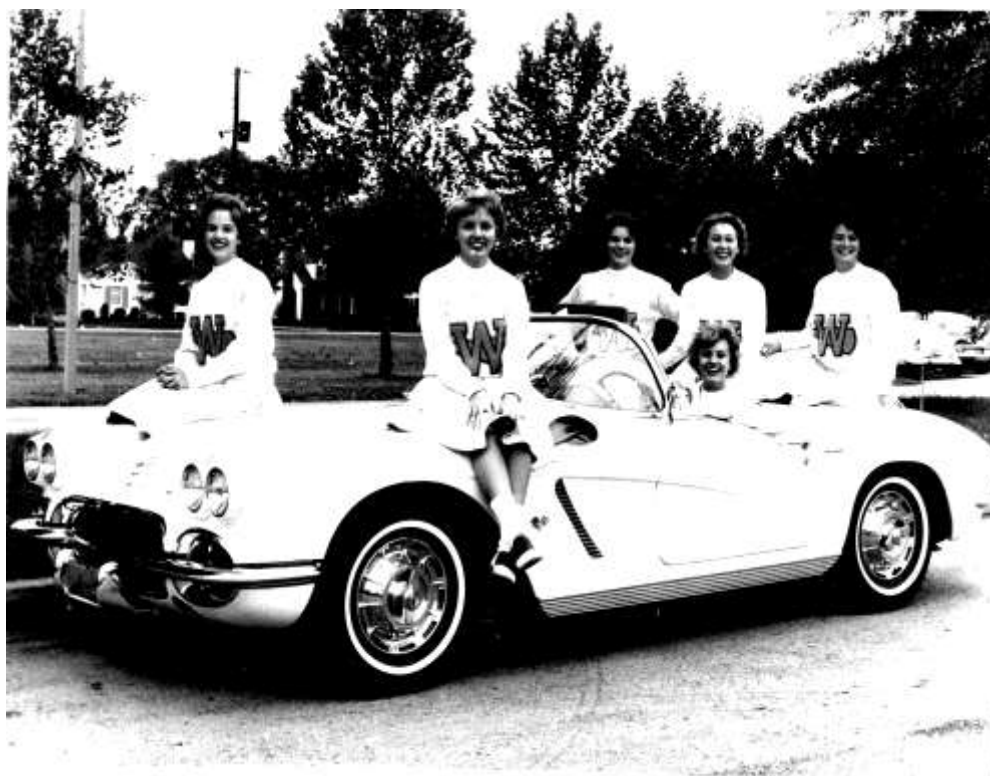


