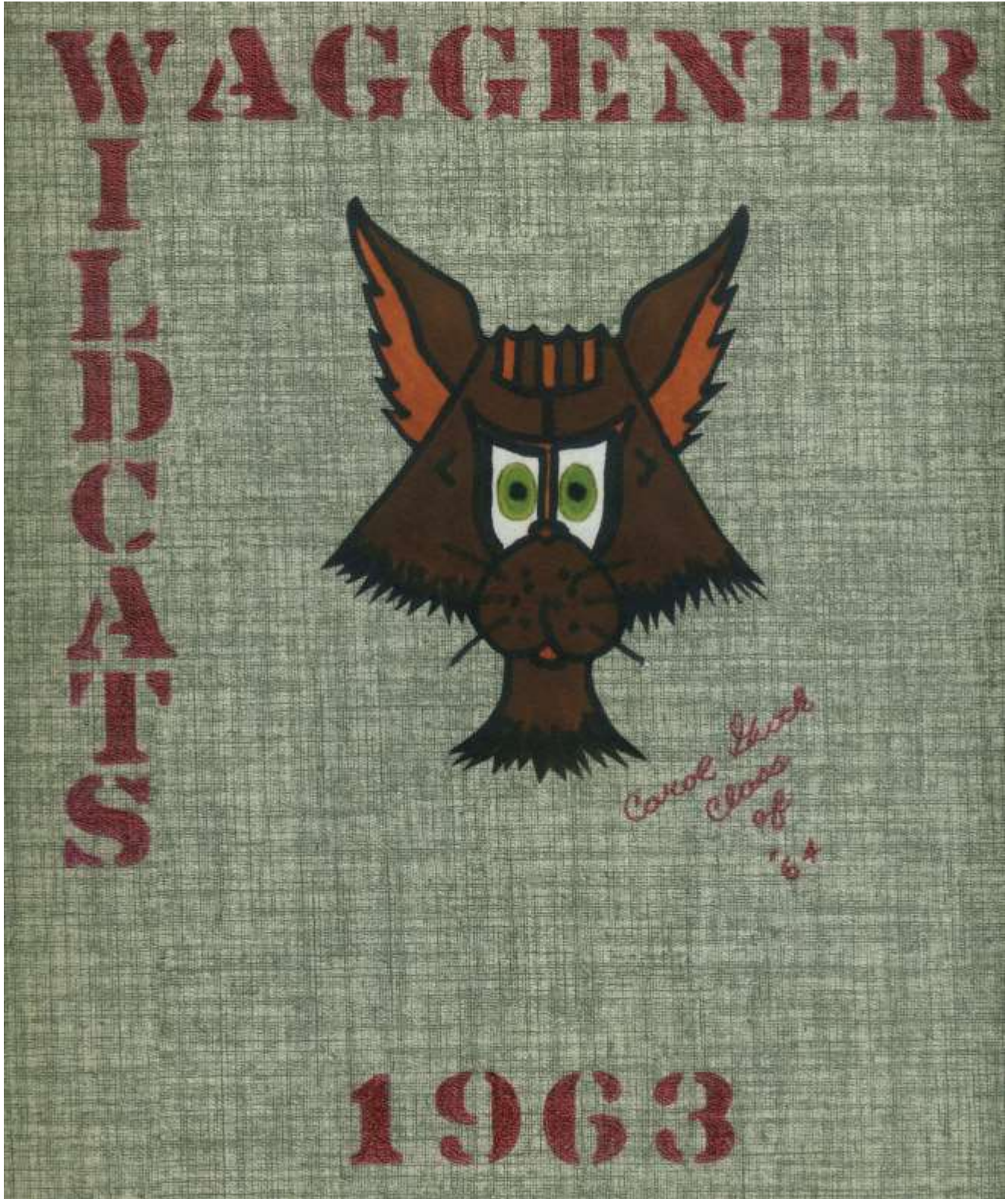

No. 1 Rating Disturbs Deim At Waggener

They may make "Everything's Comin' Up Roses" the new school song at Waggener. It looks like that kind of year for the Wildcats.

Nineteen lettermen, 18 of them seniors, give promise of depositing the county Triple-A title on Browns Lane for the first time in the short life of the school.

The depth, experience and talent of the Wildcats convinced rival county coaches that they rated the No. 1 spot in a pre-season poll.

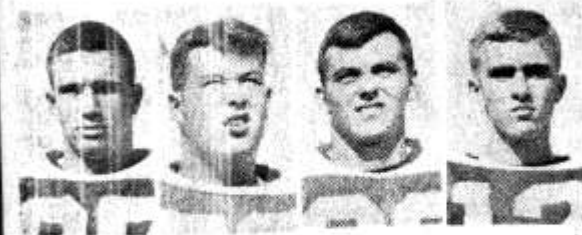
Waggener coach Marty Deim, the Shelbyville native who played at Centre, won't be pushed overboard on the Wildcats' future. "I concede that on paper we should be tough," he admitted, "but I'm not sure I like that No. 1 spot."

Ten of the Cat lettermen had experience as regulars on offense or defense last season when they won five and lost four (two of the losses were by a single point). The veteran linemen include end "Butch" Riley, tackles Richard Gatz (defense only) and Mike Mowry; guards Larry Ethridge and Richard Weller; and center Mike Rodgers. Holdover backs are quarterback Gary McGaughey, halfbacks Ben Boone and Joey Bloyd; and fullback Ted DeMunbrun (offense only).

THE WILDCATS, who will work out of the tight and split-T with some slot variations, will have fair size with a line averaging about 185 pounds. As for speed, the backs are quick rather than fleet, according to Deim.

"Butch" Riley, a six-foot 2-inch 190-pounder, rates as the best end in the state, in Deim's opinion. Other players who man key positions are McGaughey, Boone, Bloyd and Mowry. McGaughey is considered an outstanding passer.

The Wildcats may have picked up some extra votes for first after they edged Valley 7-0 in the Jamboree last night at Fairgrounds Stadium.

Exposition Bowl Gets Waggener

Waggener will play an opponent yet to be selected on a date not yet set in the Exposition Bowl.

The selection of the county high school to play in the football game at Fairgrounds Stadium was announced yesterday by Ray Wimberg, chairman of the team selection committee.

"We think we have a fine representative in Waggener which should be one of the strongest teams in the county," Wimberg said. The committee would like to pair Manual, the No. 1 favorite for the state championship, against Marty Deim's Wildcats. However, the Reds will have to revise their schedule to accept an invitation.

October 11 seems the most likely date for the bowl game since the Stadium already is booked for the Trinity-St. Xavier game on October 4th, the other date under consideration.

904 Primed For Grid Openers

SEPT. 6, 1963

For 904 youngsters the weekend will be Christmas, Fourth of July and their birthdays all rolled into one big ball of wax—their first high school football game of 1963.

Nine City schools—all but Manual—and the entire company of a dozen Jefferson County entries joins in Louisville's first big round of prep play. All games tonight are at 8 p.m.

Flaget, a rival to Manual's ambitions for a Kentucky Triple-A schoolboy crown, kicks off tonight against Shawnee at Shawnee Field. Male, a dark horse in the race, opposes DeSales at Maxwell Field while Trinity tangles with Central at Trinity Field.

State champion St. Xavier opens tomorrow at Owensboro

while Bishop David, which made a premature appearance last week, duels Shelbyville tomorrow night at Shively.

A repeat of last year's playoff for the county championship will be unfolded at Seneca tonight where the Redskins battle Valley. The Vikings won the playoff and barely lost to St. X. 7-6 for the state championship.

Waggener, the favorite to succeed Valley, lifts off in a home game with Fairdale. Westport, one of two new faces in county warfare, is at Southern; Western, the other freshman entry, is at Carrollton.

The lone city-county match comes off at Eastern where Atherton is the competition. In other county tests, none of which count in Triple-A standings, it will be Pleasure Ridge

Park at Fern Creek and Durrett at Butler. (WINN will broadcast the Durrett-Butler game at 8 p.m.)

AILMENTS of their starting quarterbacks cause concern to Flaget's Paulie Miller and DeSales' Gil Sturtzel. The Colt signal-caller, Johnny Spoelker, was benched most of the week with an infected throat. Flaget quarterback Dick Conely is favoring an injured ankle and tackle Bob Cox is troubled with a sore knee. Braves halfback Pat Riggs is in the hospital for observation after complaining of cramps.

Shawnee's George Sauer also is improvising around injuries to halfback Jack Coffee (a twisted knee) and to transfer quarterback Jerry Hillard, out for six weeks with a broken collarbone.

Sturtzel is worried about halfback Phil Charmoli whose shoulder is acting up again. The Colts will open with 10 seniors and junior tackle Norb Metzmeier.

Male has its casualties also in guard Dale Womack, bothered by a bruised shoulder and back, and guard Don Wiggington, out three to four weeks with a broken hand.

Flaget is favored in the "West Side Story" that will determine the championships of lower Market Street. The Braves, barely escaped with their lives last year in a 13-12 squeaker. Shawnee has never beaten its neighbor and until last season never got closer than three touchdowns.

A breakdown on city and county squads show that Bishop David has the most lettermen with 25 and Waggener the most seniors with the same number.

Pass Defense Tempers Waggener's Glee

Waggener football coach Marty Deim today felt like a man who discovered a mountain of gold, then stubbed his toe on a rock walking to the top.

The rock in this case is pass defense.

Deim's Wildcats showed a potent offense and good defense against running last night in beating Fairdale 39-18 in the opener for both teams at Waggener Field.

But Waggener defensive backs had a difficult time keeping up with the Fairdale pass receivers. Two of the losing Bulldogs' touchdowns came on aerials.

"Our pass defense was terrible," said Deim, who planned to huddle tomorrow with his assistant coaches to work on the problem.

"WE HAD WORKED more on it than anything, but the boys didn't seem to be sure of their assignments."

Otherwise, Deim was pleased. "I thought our backs looked quick. They popped through there and ran well," he said. "I thought our line blocking looked good, too."

All of Waggener's starting backs played well. Fullback Ted DeMunbrun scored two touchdowns and was leading gainer with 89 yards in 10 carries.

Halfback Ben Boone had 61 yards in seven tries and caught a Gary McGaughey 50-yard pass for a touchdown. Halfback Joey Bloyd picked up 79 yards in five carries and had a 35-yard T.D. run.

Quarterback McGaughey ran six times for 43 yards and hit on two of five passes for 65 yards.

WAGGENER HAD the ball six times in the first half, scoring four touchdowns. Longest run was 45 yards by DeMunbrun to set up a touchdown as the Wildcats took a 26-12 lead. Both of Fairdale's scores came on Joe Bowman passes, to Dave Goben and Bob Owens.

Fairdale's running game picked up in the second half, but Waggener added two more touchdowns to stay out of danger. Guard Dick Weller recovered a fumble to set up one Waggener touchdown and also made a pass interception.

County Region favorite Waggener and Seneca's No. 2 ranked Redskins turned in one-sided football victories last night as county teams opened district firing.

Waggener walloped Fern Creek 33-6 and Seneca massacred Westport 46-0. In other county games, all of which count in district standings, Valley downed Western 14-0, Fairdale trimmed Butler 14-7, and Southern and Pleasure Ridge Park played to a scoreless tie.

Taking the high school games one at a time:

Gary McGaughey and Ted DeMunbrun scored two touchdowns apiece to pace the Wildcats, who were chosen in a pre-season poll of coaches as most likely to take the Region title.

Both McGaughey markers came on plunges of one yard, while DeMunbrun's were on runs of seven and four yards. Ben Boone ran five for another and Butch Riley kicked three extra-points.

The Tigers got a second-quarter tally on a short pass from Marty Adams to David Williams.

Waggener's hard-charging Wildcats proved their potential power while clawing Fairdale's Bulldogs for a 39-18 victory.

The Wildcats of coach Marty Deim, picked to pace the County standings this year, showed their intentions early by spurning to three quick touchdowns in the first period for a 20-0 margin.

Thereafter the game was played on fairly even terms.

Quarterback Gary McGaughey sparked the triumph, completing his first pass of the season for 50 yards to Ben Boone for a touchdown. It came between scoring plays of Ted DeMunbrun's two-yard plunge and a 35-yard trip by Joey Bloyd for the Wildcats' 20-0 lead.

From then on, the Wildcats couldn't be headed off.

Two Waggener touchdowns in two minutes proved too much for Fern Creek as the Creekers bowed 33-6 to the visiting Wildcats last night.

Halfback Ben Boone set up the first one, returning a Tiger kick-off 75 yards to the Fern Creek seven. From there, fullback Ted DeMunbrun, who was outstanding all night, scored.

On the following kickoff, Waggener took over on a Fern Creek fumble and marched 30 yards in five plays, with Ben Boone scoring from the 10.

Gary McGaughey and DeMunbrun each added third-period touchdowns to insure the victory, Fern Creek's only score was made by "Tell City" Williams, on a five-yard run.

Waggener coach Marty Deim and coach Earl Browning of Fern Creek both felt Boone's kickoff runback was the turning point of the game. While Deim was only "satisfied" with his Wildcats, Browning was quite impressed.

"Waggener is good. They have a quick backfield and an effective line," commented Browning after the game.

Seneca High's quick-hitting Redskins are unbeaten, untied and unscored on after three football games.

But Seneca coach Ron Cain was quick to add today, "Also untested."

"We'll be tested next Friday at Waggener," he said. "Waggener has speed, size and a lot of experience. However, we think with a big enough effort they can be had."

The clash of traditional rivals could decide the county championship. Waggener also is undefeated after beating Butler 27-0 last night.

Seneca whipped visiting Western 59-0 in the biggest runaway yet for the Redskins. Previously they had beaten Valley 39-0 and Westport 46-0.

**Waggener
 Coach Not
 Pleased**

For the third consecutive week Waggener won a convincing victory over a county team but still failed to impress its coach, Marty Deim. The Wildcats rapped Butler 27-0 at Butler last night.

"We didn't play well," said Deim. "We weren't mentally ready, partly because of a rumor of suspension." (Waggener was put on probation yesterday until December 1 by the Kentucky High School Athletic Association because of a jayvee violation).

Waggener delivered the knockout punch in the second period with three quick touchdowns, two by halfback Ben Boone on runs of 10 and eight yards, and another by halfback Joey Bloyd.

Midway in the fourth quarter, fullback Ted DeMunbrun added six more on a one-yard plunge. "Butch" Riley kicked three of four extra-points and barely missed a 15-yard field goal.

Coach Milan Perpich felt his Butler Bears lost to an "outstanding" Waggener team. "They outpowered and out-knocked us, especially in the last minutes of the second half. But we're progressing," he noted optimistically.

Lexington, Ky., Sept. 20—Waggener High School has been placed on probation until December 1, the Kentucky High School Athletic Association announced today.

The penalty, announced by commissioner Ted Sanford, resulted from the Waggener junior varsity football team being withdrawn from a game with the Thomas Jefferson jayvee before the game was over. Th Waggener jayvee coach, Vernon O'Dell, will be relieved of his duties for 30 days, Sanford added.

O'Dell removed his team from the game, played September 13, with six minutes left. He said he did it as a protective measure for his player because of possible injury.

Waggener principal Ear Duncan said he has not been officially notified of the action by Sanford and therefore has made no plans about replacing O'Dell.

Top Guns To Stage Shootout As Waggener, Seneca Clash

"Shootout on Browns' Lane."

That's the way the Seneca-Waggener showdown Friday night at Waggener shapes up, with four of the county's top guns corralled in the same arena.

Seneca's Bob Wester will be the marked man in the duel that may decide the Triple-A champion in the county. The pride of the Redskins leads all AAA scorers with 62 points, while Waggener's Ted DeMunbrun is a distant second with 30. Seneca's Les Schott, the "Jeff" of the Indians' "Mutt-and-Jeff" scoring tandem, is third at 27 and Waggener's Ben Boone, Jr., fourth at 25.

Wester, a husky 186-pounder, already is within 16 points of the season total compiled by the 1962 county scoring champion, Larry Stringer of Valley.

"There's been a tremendous change in Bob," his coach, Ron Cain, commented today. "Last year he was a looker—this year he's a leader. He's an explosive type runner with an excellent change of pace and fine balance. Speed? Well, he'll run 40 yards in five seconds flat—and that's plenty good enough."

SENECA HASN'T been pushed in three games and is averaging almost a point a minute. The Redskins are the only Triple-A team still unscored on. Waggener likewise is unbeaten in three starts and the Wildcats, pre-season choice in the county race, have had more formidable opposition.

While the county title may be up for grabs on Brown's Lane, a trend may show in the city skirmishing when Flaget and Male square off Friday at Manual Stadium. The rivals are tied for first place with two wins apiece after the Braves knocked off Trinity 33-7 Saturday.

The Purples' problem will be how to contain Mike Hansford,

the Hasenour Trophy leader with 35 points. The classy running halfback has an 11-point edge on Manual's George Robinson while Trinity's Tom Sipes is third at 21.

Flaget fullback John McReynolds, kept out of the Trinity game because of a bruised shoulder, should be ready for Friday's contest, coach Paulie Miller said.

Flaget and Male are all even after 16 meetings; each has seven wins while two games were tied. The Purples won last season, 28-13.

Seneca Coach Recalls Boone, Now He'd Like To Forget Him

Two years ago as junior varsity football coach at Waggener High, Ron Cain had a pony-sized halfback named Ben Boone.

Today as head coach at Seneca Cain probably wishes he had persuaded Boone to give up the game.

Now a senior and a regular halfback on the Waggener varsity, Boone had one of those games a player dreams about as the Wildcats whipped county rival Seneca 34-6 before about 7,500 fans at Waggener last night.

Boone scored three touchdowns, gained 68 yards in 13 carries, caught three passes for 38 yards and his speed was a constant irritation to the Seneca defense.

"It was by far his best game," said his proud father, Ben Boone, the team physician. Dr. Boone played at Male High in 1936 and '37.

BRILLIANT as he was, young Boone had to share honors with his backfield teammates.

Quarterback Gary McGaughey was leading ground gainer for Waggener with 70 yards in 14 carries, scored a touchdown and passed for 122 yards for a total offense of 192 yards. He hit on seven of nine passes.

Fullback Ted DeMunbrun was the short yardage power man with 51 yards in 13 tries and halfback Joey Bloyd had 29 in seven carries.

Waggener linemen continually opened up running room for the backs and the Wildcat defense, headed by linebacker Mike Rodgers, held Seneca to 96 yards on the ground.

Only star fullback Bob West-

ter was able to gain consistently. He was the team's workhorse with 84 yards in 17 tries and scored the Redskins' only touchdown from a yard out.

WAGGENER got a big lift by converting two early Seneca fumbles, both by Wester, into touchdowns.

"They're good players, but those fumbles hurt," said Cain,

who added that Waggener didn't show anything he didn't expect.

Waggener coach Marty Deim confirmed that he didn't try anything new.

"We just wanted to play our kind of game," he beamed. "We had scouted them twice and we thought we could throw against their three-deep defense, which we did."

WESTER fumbled the opening kickoff last night and end Butch Riley recovered for Waggener on the Seneca 37. Boone went over from the one-foot line.

Wester fumbled again on the next kickoff. Mike Karem recovered on the Seneca 25 and Boone dashed 23 yards for the touchdown.

Seneca drove to the Waggener 12 before losing the ball on downs. Waggener controlled the ball the second quarter, moving 88 yards to make it 21-0.

After a scoreless third period, Waggener drove 86 yards for a T.D. early in the final quarter. A 30-yard run by McGaughey was the key play. Bloyd ran 12 yards for the tally.

Seneca got its touchdown after the next kickoff, moving from its 35. A 26-yard pass from Ed Baldrige to Charlie Metzger put the ball into Waggener territory and Wester did the heavy work the rest of the way.

Waggener put together another long drive, from its own 37, for the final marker, Boone sprinting 6 yards for the T.D.

Waggener now is in fine shape to win the county Eastern Division triple-A championship. Waggener plays at Atherton Friday night and Seneca is at home against Pleasure Ridge Park.

Waggener Stuns Seneca

Wildcats Upset Form Charts By Running Up A 34-6 Rout

Waggener and Seneca tied into each other last night in a high school football game that had all the earmarks of a close one. But Waggener turned it into a 34-6 rout.

Capitalizing on two first-quarter fumbles by hard-hitting Bob Wester, Waggener—led by quarterback Gary McGaughey and halfback Ben Boone—struck for two quick touchdowns and then sealed Seneca's doom with another in the second quarter. That gave the fired-up Wildcats of Coach Marty Deim a 21-0 lead at half-time.

Coach Deim said his team played a "mighty good game, by far its best of the season." The Wildcats couldn't have picked a better time to do it. The smashing victory vaulted Waggener into the driver's seat in the Class AAA, County championship race. And it was achieved before an overflow crowd of 7,500—the largest to ever attend a football game at Waggener Field.

Wester Fumbles Twice

Waggener is still unbeaten after four games and now has a 2-0 won-lost record in the Eastern District. The defeat was a severe blow to Seneca, which entered the fray undefeated, untied and unscored on in three contests. The Redskins now have a 1-1 record in Eastern competition.

Wester, the County's leading scorer, fumbled the opening kickoff. End Butch Riley recovered on the Seneca 37 yard line and seven plays later Boone blasted into the end zone from the one-foot line and the rout was on.

Wester, who did almost everything for the Redskins, again let the ball get away

from him on the ensuing kickoff.

Statistics Favor Waggener

This time, George Barrows recovered for Waggener on the Seneca 25. McGaughey, who did a dandy job running, passing and directing the offense, picked up two yards. Boone then went the last 23 on a left-end sweep and Waggener was in front 14-0 with 6:16 left to be played in the first quarter.

The Wildcats held off a Seneca assault on the 13 yard line late in the first quarter and moved 87 yards to their third touchdown. McGaughey going over from the 2.

Halfback Joey Bloyd swept right end for 12 yards for the Wildcats' fourth touchdown in the fourth quarter. And, after Wester blasted over from the one for Seneca's only six-pointer, Boone contributed his third touchdown with a six-yard sprint.

Riley took care of the extra-point kicking chores, converting four of five attempts.

Statistics also showed that Waggener was far superior. The running of McGaughey, Boone, Bloyd and Ted DeMunbrun battered the Seneca defense for 209 yards. Seneca, on the other hand, netted only 96. And Webster, a workhorse, accumulated 66 carrying the leather 16 times.

Waggener's aerial game clicked on seven of nine attempts for 130 yards. Seneca's picked up only 44 yards on three successes in eight tries.

Browning Says McGaughey Gives Waggener Edge

"Right now, I'd say Waggener is two touchdowns better than Eastern, with Gary McGaughey being the big difference."

That's how Fern Creek High football coach Earl Browning compares the two teams which are tied for the East District lead in the County Region of Class AAA.

And Browning should have a good idea on how the teams stack up. His Tigers lost to both of them, to Waggener 33-6 and Eastern 21-0.

"Both have good teams," said Browning, "but Waggener's offense is harder to stop. Waggener's backs—McGaughey, Ben Boone, Ted DeMunbrum, Joey Bloyd—have more quickness and are shiftier. If they get past the line of scrimmage, they're gone."

Browning calls Eastern's backs "more of the power type." "Jerry Marksbury hurt us more than Bob Baltzell, but both are runners who can pass well, too. And Eastern has a better pass receiver than Butch Riley (of Waggener). He's Shannon Holloway."

Still, Browning says "McGaughey is the difference. He's a real fine quarterback, who can run and pass. The one place Eastern might hurt Waggener is in passing, but I definitely give Waggener the edge overall. It has a much quicker line."

Waggener and Eastern, now both with 2-0 won-lost records in the district, don't meet until October 25. But the district and possible County championship may hinge on the outcome.

Lexington Lafayette and Louisville Male, both undefeated, held a close one-two ranking in the Associated Press Kentucky high school football poll announced today.

Lafayette received 128 points from the ballots of a panel of top sportswriters and sportscasters while Male had 123.

Owensboro was a distant third with 86.

Seven voters placed Lafayette, 60-0 victor over Lily last Friday night, at the top. Five thought Male was the best.

Corbin and Caldwell County ranked fourth and fifth, received one first place vote each.

ROUNDING OUT the top 10, in order, are Highlands, Flaget, Manual, Paducah Tilghman and Murray.

Seneca, ranked eighth last week, dropped out of the top 10 after its 34-6 loss to Waggener. Murray is the newcomer to the top 10.

Owensboro, ranked No. 1 for the first two weeks of the poll, was mentioned on all but one ballot this week, but failed for the first time this season to get a first place vote.

Waggener and Eastern, two of the three Class AAA high school football teams still unbeaten and untied, try to protect their glossy records tonight.

Waggener visits Atherton in search of its fifth straight win. Eastern will try to match that record when it entertains Fairdale in the top game matching two County teams.

Both games are scheduled for 8 o'clock.

(Radio station WINN will broadcast the Durrett-Valley football game, beginning at 7:45 tonight.)

Male High, the state's No. 1 ranked team and sporting a 4-0 won-lost record, is idle this weekend.

Manual, though, will be in action, playing Central tonight at Manual Stadium. The big goal of coach Tom Harper's Crimson's will be to hang the first City Region defeat on Central.

Shawnee is the only other City team active. It meets a Providence (Ind.) team that just last week defeated Trinity 18-13. The game is at Shawnee's field.

Besides the Fairdale-Eastern affair, five other games match County Region teams. Yet, none count toward determining the East or West District champion because they all pair teams from different districts.

In those County games:

Seneca, after losing to Waggener last week for its first loss in four starts, tries to rebound against unbeaten, but twice tied Pleasure Ridge Park at Seneca; Valley is at home against Durrett; Southern travels to Fern Creek and Butler plays at Westport.

The Fairdale-Eastern tussle could be a preview of the County Region's championship game. Eastern is tied for the East District lead with Waggener. Both have 2-0 district

records. Fairdale's 2-0 mark is best in the West District.

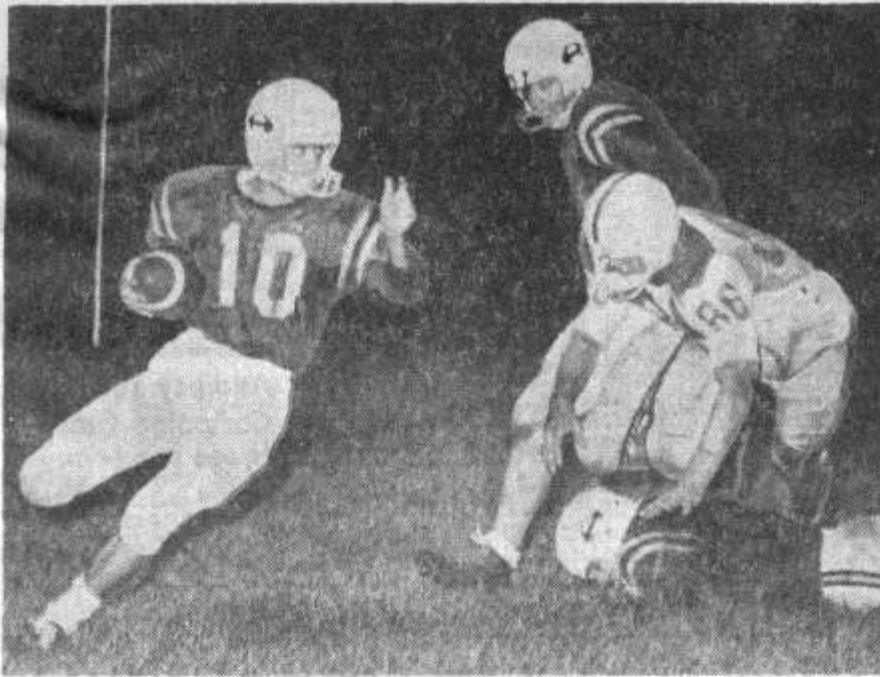
All of the above games begin at 8 o'clock as does Aquinas Prep's date at Greensburg for a contest which counts in the Class A, Second Region standings.

In two day games:

Kentucky Military Institute and Western are home against state teams. At Lyndon, K.M.I. engages Franklin County at 2:30 p.m. in a Class AA, Second Region tilt. Western takes on Henry County at 1:30 on the Shively school's field.

Comparing the top three games, Manual—ranked 10th in The Courier-Journal's Lit-ratings—is favored by only 28 points over 16th-rated Central. Manual may be without guard Mike Harvell, whose foot injury kept him out of last week's Atherton game.

Versatility Of McGaughey Saves Waggener Streak

Waggener's Gary McGaughey is that rarity among high school quarterbacks, a good passer who also can drive opposing teams crazy with his running.

Because of his versatility Waggener today remained among the state's unbeaten, untied football teams.

McGaughey's passes didn't click consistently last night in a 19-12 victory at Atherton, but here's what he did:

✓ Ran the opening kickoff of the second half back 84 yards to the Atherton 8 to set up Waggener's first touchdown.

✓ Dashed 20 yards for a touchdown which enabled the Wildcats to take a 13-12 lead.

✓ Scored the final T.D. on a 76-yard sprint.

"Atherton was the best team we've played," said Waggener coach Marty Deim, whose Wildcats have won five straight.

"We didn't play very well.

It was a typical letdown after Seneca (beaten 34-6 last week by Waggener). But I don't take anything away from Atherton. They really hit us."

Deim added that the Wildcats "showed some courage" coming back in the second half to overcome a 12-0 Atherton lead. It was the first time Waggener had been behind this season.

ATHERTON clearly outplayed Waggener in the first half, moving 81 yards to score the first time it had the ball. The second time in possession the keyed-up Rebels drove 78 yards with Rick Embry running 16 yards to score on the first play of the second quarter.

Waggener put together a 67-yard march which died on the 4 and went to the locker room trailing 12-0.

McGaughey's runback of the second-half kickoff set up a 5-yard Ben Boone-to-Chuck Wood T.D. pass. Butch Riley kicked the important point. On the next kickoff Waggener tried an on-side kick with Wildcat fullback Ted DeMunbrun recovering the ball on the Atherton 42.

A 15-yard penalty helped move the ball to the 20 from where McGaughey made a beautiful, twisting run for the touchdown. Atherton made one other threat, driving from its 4 before being stopped on the Waggener 10 with 3:35 to play.

Then came McGaughey's 76-yard sprint at a time when Waggener appeared to be trying only to use up the remaining time.

Waggener is at Westport next Friday while Atherton, now with an 0-5 record, is at Trinity.

Waggener Rallies To Nip Atherton; Shawnee Squeaks

Winless Atherton, a stout-hearted crew that's much better than its record indicates, lost out to a second-half Waggener comeback last night 19-12 on the Rebels' field.

It was the fifth victory for unbeaten Waggener, but the Wildcats were pushed to the limit. Quarterback Gary Mc-

Gaughey scored twice, including a 76-yard sprint in the final period, to put the game out of reach.

Atherton, which dominated the statistics, drove 61 yards in nine plays to score after the opening kickoff. Richard Nash passed 30 yards to Eddie Hagan at the one, and Eddie

Hutcherson scored for a 6-0 lead.

In the second period, Nash's 12-yard keeper highlighted a 13-play, 70-yard march. Rick Embry scored on a 16-yard run. Atherton led 12-0 at the half.

McGaughey returned the second-half kickoff 83 yards to

the seven to set up Joey Bloyd's third-down touchdown pass of five yards to Chuck Wood.

Waggener tried an onside kick, recovered at the 42 and in three plays—aided by a 15-yard penalty—tied the score 12-12. McGaughey dashed 20 yards for the touchdown and Butch Riley converted to push the Wildcats in front 13-12.

In the fourth period, Atherton drove 89 yards to the 10 where the Rebels lost the ball on downs. Moments later, McGaughey broke loose on his 76-yard scoring run.

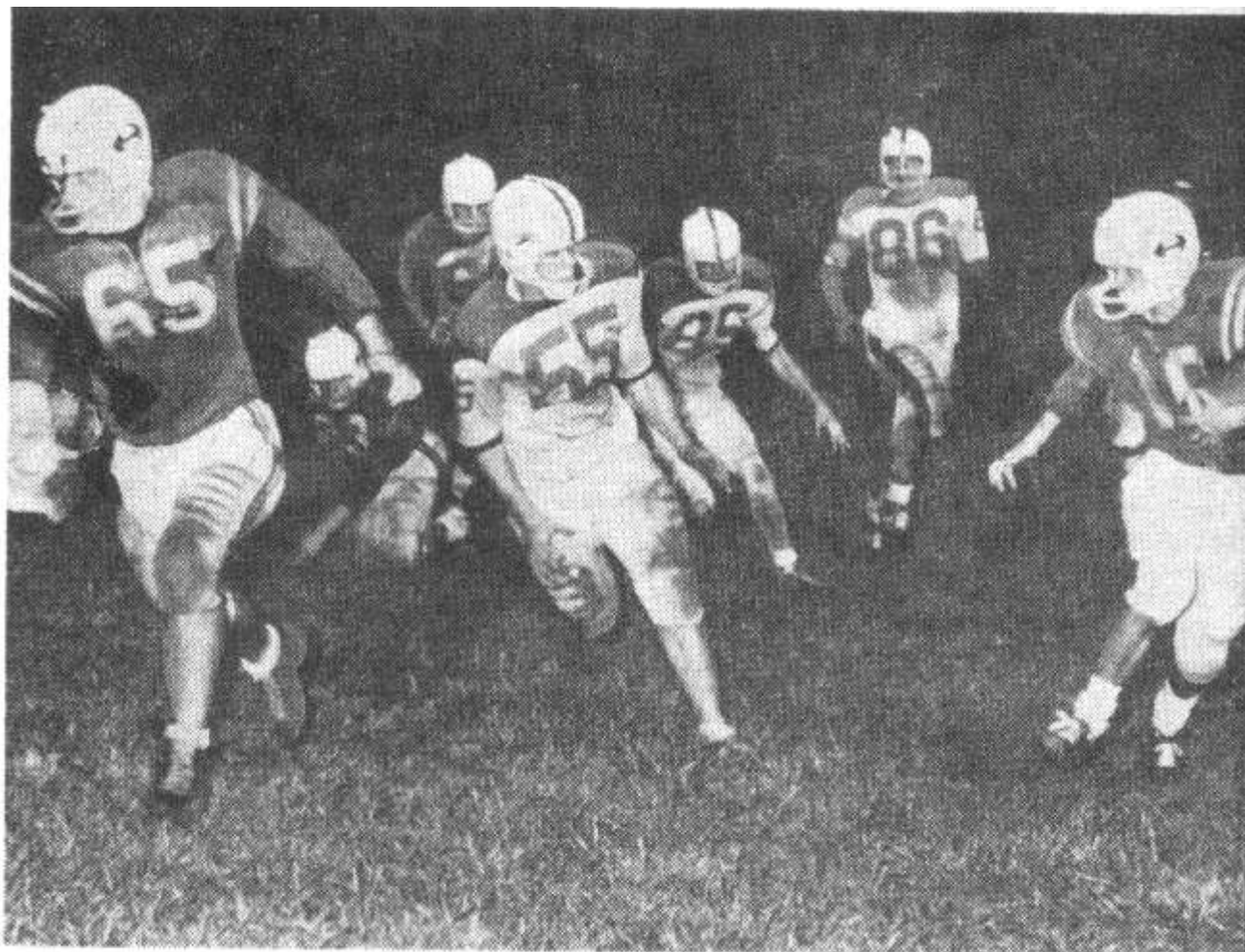
Ted DeMunbrun plunged over from the one for the first Wildcat touchdown and Ben Boone added the last on a similar burst. Boone kicked for all four extra points.

Compared to 1962 when neither the county nor the city produced an unbeaten team, there's a boom on in perfect records this year.

City leader Male and county co-leaders Waggener and Eastern all head into the dwindling days of the season with unscarred hides. The county front-runners will be put to the test again tonight but Male observes a weekend truce in football warfare here.

WAGGENER, which has sailed through five county opponents and Atherton, visits Pleasure Ridge. The Wildcats

have yet to lose to Pleasure Ridge in three tries.

Eastern, which also owns five county decisions and a victory over much abused Atherton, is at home against Valley. In other county duels Durrett meets Southern in a homecoming affair at Fairgrounds Stadium, Fairdale is at Fern Creek, and Seneca is at Butler. All county games are at 8 p.m.

A light city program finds winless Trinity skirmishing Manual at Manual Stadium, Central at Shawnee and Bishop David at Atherton.

EASTERN, which bowed to Valley 32-0 last year but is

ahead 7-5 in the 12-year series, was the most recent county school to post a perfect mark. Emmet Goranflo's 1960 Eagles were 9-0 in his final season as coach. Honors in the city belong to Flaget which went 11-0 on the strong arm of Ricky Norton in 1961.

Seventh-ranked Manual is a big favorite to hand a young Trinity squad its seventh straight loss without a victory. They play at Manual Stadium.

Atherton, which beat Trinity last week for its first win in six starts, hopes to make it two in a row against Bishop David at Atherton Stadium. Bishop David has won two straight games for a 3-4 record.

Shawnee, bolstered by the return of end-halfback Jack Coffee, is at home against a speedy Central team that has divided its two previous City games.

All three City contests begin at 8, and count in the standings, but none involves a championship contender.

Male High, the City leader with a 4-0 record, is idle this weekend and Flaget (4-1) plays tomorrow night.

In two other daylight games:

Shepherdsville goes to Aquinas Prep for a 4 p.m. engagement and Country Day takes on Frankfort at 3:30 p.m. in Seneca Park. Both games are in Class A's Second Region.

Waggener and Eastern are big favorites in the Litratings. Waggener is ranked 18 better than Pleasure Ridge Park and Eastern 25.4 better than Valley.

The role of underdog isn't

what bothers Pleasure Ridge Park coach Jim Gatewood. He says, "The secret to Waggener's success is its balance. It's a hard team to defense."

"Everybody talks about Gary McGaughey (quarterback) being the difference, but those halfbacks (Ben Boone and Joey Bloyd) are real fast. And Boone can pass, too," explained Gatewood.

Fullback Ted DeMunbrun also has impressed Gatewood. "Those four backs can do everything. If you stop them running, then McGaughey or Boone can pass to end Butch Riley."

Waggener Backs Belt Pleasure Ridge 33-13

Waggener, with its football showdown with Eastern six days off, pushed its classy backfield into high gear last night in a 33-13 victory over Pleasure Ridge Park.

Each of the Wildcats' four talented backs scored as coach Marty Deim's County Region favorites registered their seventh triumph without a defeat.

The victory also set up next Friday's home game with Eastern as a "battle of the unbeaten" for the East District championship. Eastern beat Valley 27-0 last night for its seventh win.

DeMunbrun Stars

Fullback Ted DeMunbrun took scoring honors with two touchdowns, on runs of one and five yards. Halfbacks Ben Boone and Joey Bloyd also got six-pointers, both coming on three-yard dashes.

Quarterback Gary McGaughey wasn't to be denied either.

The speedy senior picked up a fumbled lateral after a completed Pleasure Ridge Park pass and rambled 50 yards to score. That play ended the first half and gave Waggener a 10-0 lead.

Pleasure Ridge Park, losing its second game as against three wins and two ties, couldn't muster a first down in the opening half, but Mike Collier's passing got the Panthers' offense clicking in the last 24 minutes.

Although fullback Dave Ackerson tallied both Panther touchdowns on two-yard runs,

it was Collier's passing that set up the scores.

During Pleasure Ridge Park's 84-yard drive in the third period, Collier completed four passes for 72 yards. Included were two diving catches, one for 25 yards by end Tom Estes and another for 38 yards by Glenn Higdon.

A 48-yard aerial to end Richard Thompson ignited the Panthers' final touchdown which came with 53 seconds left.

McGaughey Can Pass

Deim appeared pleased at his team's efforts. "We played better than usual. We hadn't been sharp lately, but we showed a lot of quickness in this game. We didn't spring anyone loose for a long gain, but we did grind out a lot of yardage."

That the Wildcats did. Their four touchdown drives were, in order, 65 yards in 11 plays, 78 in 15, 69 in 12 and 56 in eight.

Waggener, too, showed a fine passing game. McGaughey completed his first five and wound up with a six-for-eight mark. Four were to end Butch Riley for 40 yards.

"Waggener's got a fine

team," said Panther coach Jim Gatewood. "They'll really hit you." As for Eastern, Deim would only say: "It's a big one, I just hope we're ready."

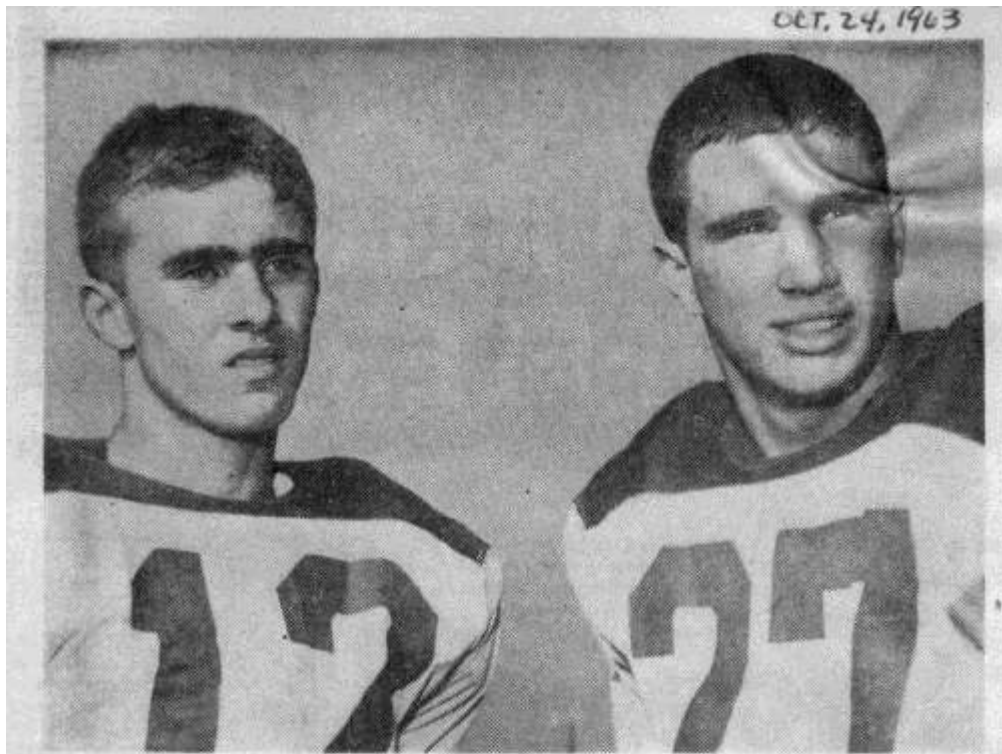

Waggener's McGaughey, Boone Seek Biggest Prize

While they are not likely to try it, Waggener's Gary McGaughey and Ben Boone probably could work their plays blindfolded. They know each other that well.

The Wildcat backs have been teammates since Little League days nine years ago and it has been a profitable partnership in the way of championships. They hope to snare their biggest prize yet when Waggener duels Eastern tomorrow night at Waggener in a game that probably will determine the county champion (game time is 8 p.m.).

McGaughey, who has quarterbacked the Wildcats to seven straight wins, has been playing football almost half of his young life. He started in the St. Matthews Little League at the age of nine and is in his third year as a varsity starter at Waggener.

McGaughey is a quiet, serious type, but he often blows his own horn—he plays trumpet in the school orchestra. Only 5 feet, 11 inches and 150 pounds, he is small as quarterbacks go but he has made himself into one of the top players in the state.

AN EXCELLENT passer, McGaughey is averaging around 60 percent on completions this season. He has thrown only two touchdown passes but Waggener seldom needs to pass because of its explosive running attack.

Gary, who can run 100 yards in 10.6 seconds and 40 yards in 4.8 in football gear, has scored 49 points and is second high scorer for the Wildcats. Boone has 61. Together they have accounted for more than half of Waggener's 213 points.

Although he hasn't settled on a career yet, McGaughey hopes to play college football and has had offers from Navy,

Virginia Tech, Brigham Young, Indiana and Oklahoma State. (A Vanderbilt scout told him, "If we knew how to use a small quarterback, we'd certainly like to have you.").

Another McGaughey is on the way to the Waggener varsity. Steven, 13, is a seventh grader who was named the most valuable lineman in a Little League last year. The father, Harry, a St. Matthews hardwood flooring dealer, hasn't missed seeing Gary play a game in eight years.

"The accuse me and Dr. Ben Boone of getting there at lunchtime for those night games," he laughed.

DR. BOONE will be remembered as the Male halfback who almost personally beat Manuel 25-20 for Wally Butts' 1937 Purple team. Boone played that Thanksgiving Day with his right arm strapped to his side because of a dislocation.

Waggener Attack Given Edge

From a coach's point of view, it's a question of whether the O's (Waggener) can whip the X's (Eastern).

Doodling coaches use O's to designate the offense and X's the defense when illustrating football plays. And tonight's Waggener-Eastern duel, a contest of teams with perfect records, shapes up as an X-O equation with Waggener's high-powered offense matched against Eastern's unbending defense.

The winner of the 8 p.m. East District skirmish at Waggener Field, which will be played to an overflow crowd, figures to be the county Triple-A champion. There's still a matter of a playoff with the West District titlist but that is regarded as something of a formality on the basis of season records.

Marty Deim's Wildcats, undefeated in seven games, are slight favorites over Eastern which also has polished off seven straight opponents. The

explosive backfield combination of quarterback Gary McGaughey, halfbacks Ben Boone and Joey Bloyd and fullback Ted DeMunbrun has averaged better than 30 points per game. The Eastern defense has given up a paltry average of 3.7 per game.

Undefeated Waggener, Eastern Meet Tonight For East Crown

Arch-rivals Waggener and Eastern face "the moment of truth" tonight when the two unbeaten and untied high school football teams clash at Waggener's field.

Riding on the outcome of this game is not only the East District championship, but the role of favorite for the over-all title in Class AAA's County Region.

With so much at stake, a standing-room only crowd of 7,000 is forecast for the 8 o'clock kickoff.

Eastern, though, may be without the services of its best player, fullback Bob Baltzell.

He has a throat infection and is listed as doubtful for tonight's game. Baltzell has been Eastern's "Mr. Everything," being the team's top runner, blocker, kicker and an occasional passer. He has been an Eastern regular since 1960 when the Eagles last won the County title.

The Waggener-Eastern duel easily headlines a 12-game prep card which finds City Region leader Male High returning to action after a week's absence.

Male's visit to Shawnee will be only its second game this month since coach Charlie Kuhn's unbeaten Purples were idle the week before and after their October 12 date with St. Xavier. Male will be after its sixth straight win, including its fifth in regional play.

In other City action:

St. X. seeks its fifth win in six region starts when it takes on Central at Manual Stadium. Trinity entertains Bishop David in hopes of notching its first triumph and Atherton goes after its third straight win against Daviess County at Atherton.

Five other games are scheduled in County Region play, including two most important West District clashes.

Back to the Waggener-Eastern duel:

A Waggener victory would achieve two goals for the Wildcats, who are two-point favorites in The Courier-Journal's Litkenhous Ratings. Those goals are:

(1) To gain its first football title since Waggener began varsity play in 1958.

(2) To even its series with

Eastern at two victories apiece. Waggener won last year's meeting 14-7, but lost by 19-12 in 1960 and 21-0 in 1961.

Both coaches, naturally, have much respect for the other's team.

"Eastern has a strong line and two fine backs in Baltzell and Jerry Marksbury," says Waggener coach Marty Deim. "And Terry Holloway to Shannon Holloway gives them a good passing combination."

"Waggener is fast, quick and has everything that makes a good football team," claims Eastern coach Charley Hord. "But they won't hit harder than we will," he promised.

Although Waggener has four exceptionally fine backs, Hord has been impressed by halfback Ben Boone. "There's no better halfback around here," he said.

Defense Plays Deciding Role For Waggener

Waggener's defensive unit no longer is playing second fiddle in the Wildcat football victory march.

As a result Waggener today is only one game from its first unbeaten season and looks like a shoo-in for the county triple-A championship.

"We out-defensed them," said a Waggener player proudly last night after Eastern was defeated 14-7 and held to its lowest total of the season.

A crowd estimated at 7,500 by Waggener principal Earl Duncan saw the Wildcat defense get off to a rocky start by giving up a touchdown the first time Eastern held the ball.

But the Waggener defenders came back to force Eastern into a fumble to set up the winning touchdown and the homestanding Wildcats completely stopped the Eagles the second half.

WAGGENER coach Marty Deim credited a switch in strategy at halftime for the improved defense.

"We had been playing our ends too wide, trying to force their runners inside," he said.

"In the second half we played in tighter and tried to make them go outside."

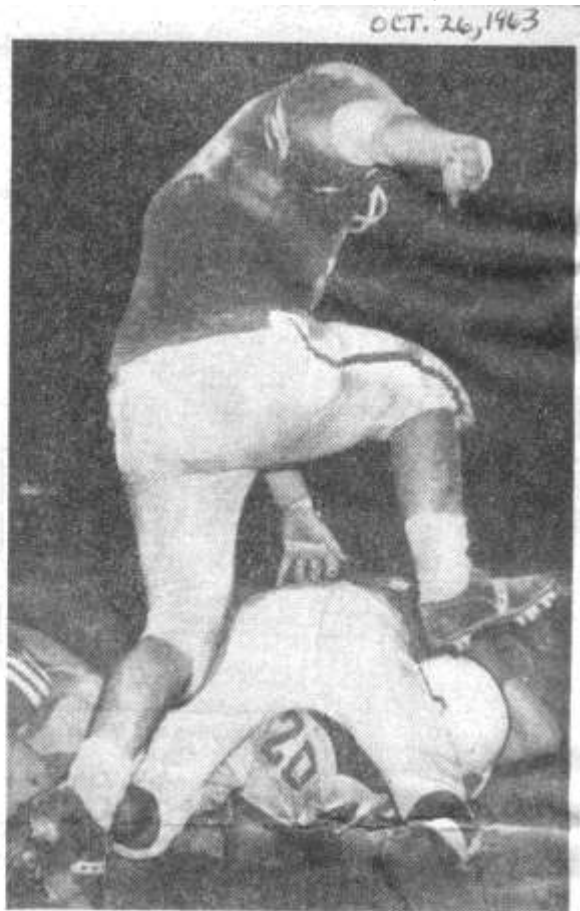
Early in the game Eastern runners, particularly Bob Baltzell and Jerry Marksbury, gained consistently through the gaping holes between end and tackle. After the defensive adjustment by Waggener they weren't able to get around the corner quickly enough.

Deim said his 190-pound senior end, Butch Riley, "did a fine job." Riley played on the open side of the field on each Eastern play to take pressure off the other end, Bill Freeman, who has had the flu this week.

EASTERN coach Charley Hord said, "The difference was we run out of time outs late in the first half when we were in scoring position. We could have punched it across but we had to pass to stop the clock."

It took Eastern only 10 plays to move from its own 37 for a touchdown after receiving the opening kickoff. On third down with the ball on the Waggener 4, Terry Holloway passed into the end zone. Waggener fullback Ted DeMunbrun deflected the ball and Scott Wallace caught it for the T.D.

A 27-yard punt return by Waggener's cat-quick quarterback, Gary McGaughey, to the Eastern 40, started the Wildcats to the tying touchdown. A 15-yard penalty helped push the ball to the 20. Five plays later McGaughey circled right end from the 7 for the score and Riley's kick tied it 7-7.

Joey Bloyd carried twice to the 2. DeMunbrun went off tackle for the score and Riley again converted.

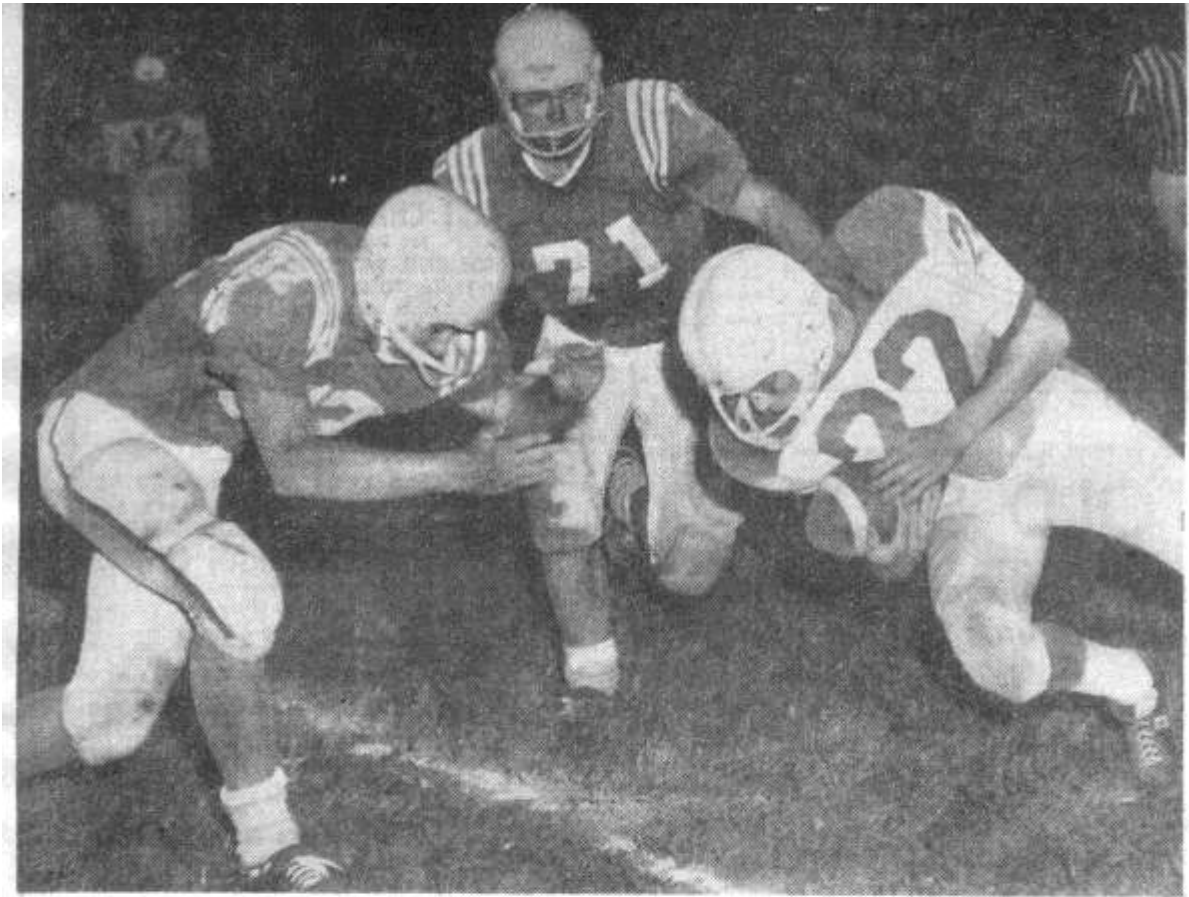
After that it was up to Waggener's defense to hold the lead. It limited Eastern to 31 yards the second half. Waggener's offense made it easier by controlling the ball.

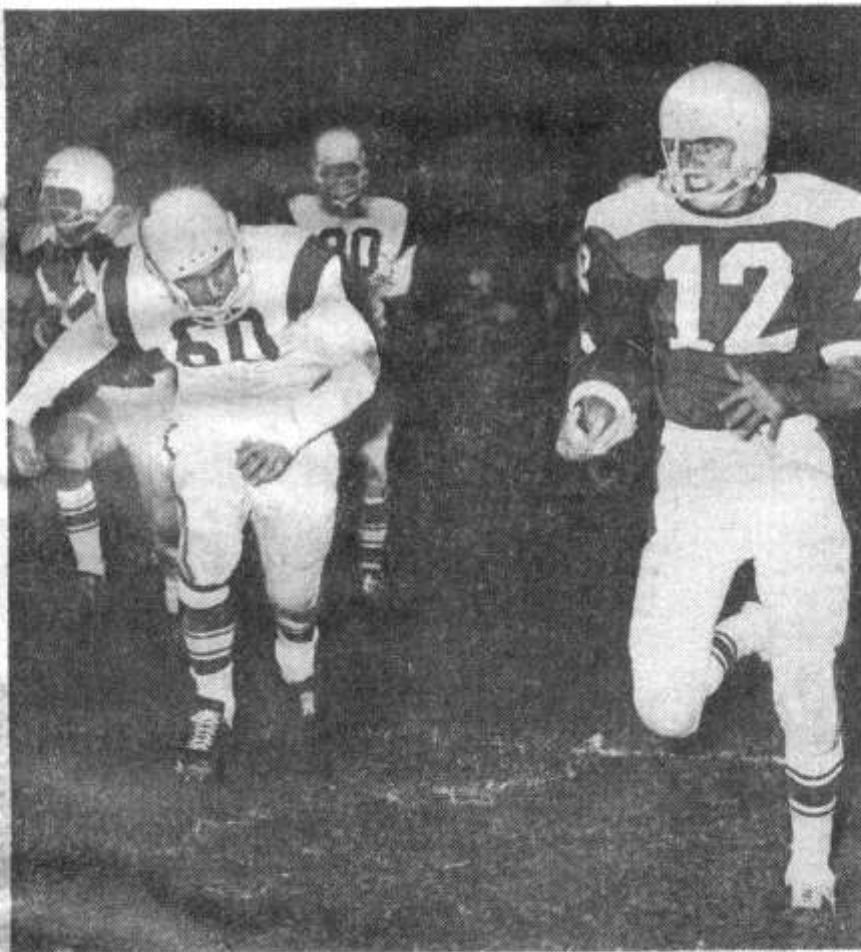
Central is in a three-game losing streak, the Yellow-jackets having dropped five of their last six games. Two of the losses were by one point.

Rutledge, who was in town to direct a Tornado win over Manual last night, has a "book" on Male that should interest Deim. The Tornado lost to the Purples 21-7 and a film of that match could be profitable.

Although Southern showed little offense, the Trojans of George Bertram contained the lightning Waggener attack for two quarters. The Wildcats led only 6-0 at half-time but Gary McGaughey, who makes a habit of playing "game-buster," cracked it open on the first play of the second half.

The Waggener quarterback hit and Charles Wood, who maneuvered behind Gary Rapp, with a 71-yard touchdown pass.

BEN BOONE wrapped up the county scoring title with a 14-point contribution to Waggener's 10th straight win. He now has 96, two more than the season-long leader, Seneca's Bob Wester.

Waggener piled up 318 yards—215 on the ground—and 10 first downs in overwhelming the Trojans.

Southern wound up with a net of 24 yards gained on the

ground. The Trojans lost 52 yards to the aggressive Waggener defense led by Mike Rodgers, Mike Karem, and Butch Riley.

Although Boone and McGaughey stood out in the scoring summary, Joey Bloyd of the Wildcats "pony" backfield made much of their success possible. The 145-pound jitterbug ripped off 76 yards in eight tries for the best average of the game, 9.5 per carry.

Waggener punched 86 yards on its second series for its opening touchdown, a 32-yard pass from McGaughey to Boone to the two setting up the first-period marker. Boone slithered over from the two but his extra-point kick was blocked.

McGAUGHEY'S 71-yard bomb early in the third was the back-breaker and smoothed the way for another touchdown 4 minutes later. James Stallings fumbled, Ted DeMunbrum recovered on the eight and Boone bolted over on the first try. He also added the extra point for a 20-0 lead. McGaughey opened the final quarter with a 45-yard spin down the east sideline for the closing points.

Waggener, Southern Meet For County Title

Waggener and Southern, two high school football teams which have never met before, clash tonight for the Class AAA County Region championship.

The winner of the 8 o'clock duel at Fairgrounds Stadium takes on the City Region champion—most likely Male High—for the Class AAA state title next Friday night at Manual Stadium.

Waggener, the East District king, breezed through its nine-game regular season schedule unbeaten and untied. That record—the school's best since beginning varsity football in 1948—makes coach Marty Deim's Wildcats the favorite by 19.2 points in The Courier-Journal's Litkenhous Ratings. Southern, too, has its finest record since 1958. Coach

George Bertram's Trojans have won seven games, lost one and tied one enroute to the West District crown.

Manual Seeks 5th in Row

In tonight's only other local game, Manual entertains Paducah Tilghman in its last outing before the annual Thanksgiving Day feud with Male. Game time is 8 at Manual Stadium.

(Radio station WENN will broadcast the Waggener-Southern football game beginning at 7:45 tonight).

Manual, an eight-point choice, seeks its fifth straight win and its eighth in 10 games. Tilghman has a 6-3 record, including a 21-7 loss to Male in September. However, the Blue Tornado has won its last four starts, including a 13-7 victory over archrival Mayfield last week.

Male can clinch the City Region title tomorrow by either tying or beating Central in a 2 p.m. contest at Maxwell Field.

Back to Waggener-Southern

Although his Trojans are primarily a junior club, Bertram thinks his team can win. "We'll need a good effort from everybody," he says.

"Our big job will be to contain their quarterback (Gary McGaughey) and his speed around end," Bertram explained.

"Southern's big and strong," says Deim, "and they have a hard runner in halfback James Stallings." Deim rates Trojan signal-caller Bob Buzarth "a threat on the rollout and a good passer."

Waggener Seals AAA Playoff Spot

Boone, McGaughey Star As Southern Falls 26-0

Waggener's Wildcats won the Class AAA, County Region high school football title last night—just like the coaches predicted they would—with a smashing 26-0 victory over Southern.

Coach Marty Deim's pre-season favorites thus gained a berth in next Friday night's Class AAA state championship game at Manual Stadium.

Their opponent most likely will be Male High, which can clinch the City Region crown with either a tie or triumph over Central today at Maxwell Field.

Boone Scores Twice

Offensively, halfback Ben Boone and quarterback Gary McGaughey were the standouts as Waggener posted its 10th victory in as many starts this season.

Boone, before a crowd of over 5,000 at Fairgrounds Stadium, scored two touchdowns, on runs of two and eight yards. He also booted two extra points. The total of 14 pushed him into the County's individual scoring lead with 96 points, two ahead of Seneca's Bob Wester, who has completed his season.

McGaughey, who directs the well-balanced Waggener backfield, scored the final touchdown on a 45-yard run, which came on the first play of the fourth quarter. The speedy senior could have matched Boone's touchdown total had his 70-yard punt return in the second quarter stood up. It was called back, however, because of the game's first penalty.

McGaughey's passing, too, played a big part in Waggener's impressive showing.

Pass For 71 Yards

Leading 6-0 at halftime, the Wildcats made it 13-0 when on their second play of the second half as McGaughey teamed with end Chuck Wood for a 71-yard scoring pass.

Tough in the clutch, McGaughey set up Waggener's first touchdown run when he passed 32 yards to Boone, who

raced to the Southern two-yard line after a vicious block by Wood. On that fourth-down situation, McGaughey had needed 14 yards for a first down.

Boone scored on the next play to climax an 11-play, 84-yard drive. Other key plays in that series were runs of 16 and 28 yards by halfback Joey Bloyd.

Intercept 3 Passes

Defensively, Waggener was also sharp.

The Wildcats intercepted three Southern passes, turning two of them into touchdowns.

McGaughey swiped a Bob Bozarth pass late in the third quarter and ran to the Southern 10. But four plays later, Boone was stopped at the one and Southern took over.

However, the hard-hitting Wildcats jarred the ball loose from James Stalling on Southern's second running play and Waggener fullback Ted DeMumbrun pounced on it at the Southern eight. Then, Boone scored.

Linebacker Mike Rodgers, who Deim says "is an All-Stater if anybody is," picked off another Bozarth pass on the third quarter's final play. McGaughey then opened the final period with his 45-yard run.

Bertram Disappointed

Southern, the County's West District champ, never threatened and made just three first downs, two of them the last minute of play.

"I was real disappointed in our showing," said Southern coach George Bertram. "Waggener made a believer out of me. I didn't think they were quite that good. They whipped us all over the field."

Can Waggener beat Male?

"They've got real good speed and if they can play tough football, they'll give Male a good game," said Bertram, whose team finished the season with seven wins, two defeats and one tie.

Waggener's 'Finest'

"This is the finest bunch of kids I've ever had," said an elated Deim, who watched the game in shirt sleeves while the fans huddled in topcoats. "No matter what they do from here on, they are the greatest."

Deim, in guiding the East District to its first County title, lauded his linebackers, Rodgers and Larry Ethridge. "And if there's a finer backfield than mine in the state, I'd like to see it," Deim concluded.

WAGGENER won 6, lost 2 and tied 1 in Deim's freshman effort and compiled a 7-3 mark in 1960. His only losing season was in 1961 with 2-7; last year the Cats won 5 and lost 4. His five-year record at Waggener shows 30 victories, 16 losses and 1 tie.

Deim is married to the former Jean Craig of Norfolk; they have two children, Ed 4, and Steve 3. He teaches senior English at Waggener

and also conducts a night adult education class in English twice a week.

Male To Ease Ticket 'Pain'

The \$1.50 price for student tickets to the Male High-Waggener football game Friday night for the Class AAA state championship raised some eyebrows here yesterday.

Male High principal Foster Sanders announced his school would underwrite by 50 cents each ticket sold to its students. Thus, a Male student will pay \$1 with the school accounting for the other 50 cents.

Sanders' decision to underwrite each ticket came after his protest to Kentucky High School Athletic Association Commissioner Ted Sanford was turned down. Sanders, a member of the K.H.S.A.A. Board of Control, had asked Sanford to reduce the price to 75 cents.

"We can't make ends meet by charging any less," Sanford told Sanders.

At Waggener, principal Earl Duncan said his school "would be forced to sell tickets at \$1.50."

"This is the first I've heard of what Male is doing," said Duncan last night. "We've

already sold some student tickets and it would be impossible for us to contact all of those people who have already bought them.

"If I had heard of this earlier, we might have considered doing the same thing," Duncan added.

Prices for other tickets to the game at Manual Stadium are: \$1.50 for general admission and \$2 for reserved seats if bought in advance at the schools—and 50 cents more on each seat if purchased at the gate.

Deim A Popular Choice

Selection of Marty Deim of Waggener as Jefferson County's "Coach of The Year" didn't surprise anyone—least of all Richard "Puss" Greenwell.

He's Deim's former coach at Shelbyville High.

"Marty is a high-type person who is definitely interested in the work he's doing, and he's certainly deserving of the honor," said Greenwell.

Deim, whose Waggener team won the Class AAA, County Region title with a 10-0 won-lost record, was a near-unanimous choice in the balloting among his fellow-coaches. George Bertram of Southern and Robert "Bubber" Simpson of Fairdale were the only other coaches receiving votes.

Greenwell calls Deim "one of the better all-around athletes we've had at Shelbyville. He was quite versatile."

Deim played football, basketball and baseball there during the late 1940's.

"He always made the big play for you," recalled Greenwell.

"I remember one time when Paris had one of its better basketball teams (1948). Marty made a shot from beyond the mid-floor stripe to tie the game and sent it into overtime."

One other thing Greenwell remembers about his ex-pupil:

"Before every game, Marty would always take time to stop off at church for a few minutes. That shows what kind of morals he has."

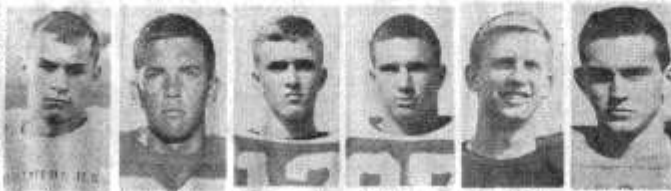
Keys—"Exceptional on defense, a fine blocker and a good student," Charley Hord says.

TOM ATWOOD . . . "Tom's quickness and size make him an ideal tackle," says coach Fred Clayton. Atwood picked up more speed this season when he trimmed down from 235 pounds to 210. He also possesses a talented toe, being in charge of kickoffs and extra-point chores.

A religious boy, Atwood is interested in Baylor University, But Vanderbilt, Western, U. K., Eastern, Murray and Morehead are all after him. Atwood's grades range between "A" and "B."

KERRY CURLING . . . Bowling Green coach Jim Pickens calls Curling the "best lineman in Kentucky." Clayton calls him "the finest lineman we've ever had at Caldwell County." Clayton, who has been at the Princeton school for 10 years, adds:

"He's versatile. On defense, he analyzes plays extremely well, is strong and likes to hit. On offense, his quickness makes him a terrific blocker."

What big colleges are after him? Kentucky, Illinois, Indiana, Florida, Vanderbilt, Ten-

DALE WOMACK . . . This youngster is just beginning to come into his own, says Kuhn. Despite an injury in early season, Womack finished strong, causing some Male observers to call him the Purples' finest blocker in recent years. Womack was first-string as a junior and is strong of defense.

He's a catcher in baseball. Colleges interested are I. U., U. K., Western and Eastern.

MIKE RODGERS . . . Shifted from fullback to center, Rodgers—as Waggener coach Marty

Deim puts it—"made us strong down the middle." Mike's a linebacker deluxe who hits and whose lateral movements are excellent. . . .

Rodgers is Waggener's first All-Stater. "He's the best player I've coached," said Deim. . . . A "C-plus" student, he participates in basketball and track. . . . Rodgers is being eyed by Auburn, Virginia Tech, Vandy, Tulane, Louisville and U. K.

HERBIE PHELPS . . . O.K. H.'s greatest athlete is a boy "who comes once in a lifetime for a coach," says Milton Graham. "Even when Herbie was a freshman, you could tell he had a world of talent."

So great were Herbie's football feats that the school will retire his jersey, No. 30. When, asks Graham, will O.K.H. find another fullback who totaled 605 points in his junior and senior years and gained 2,833 yards rushing this past season?

He also led the O.K.H. basketball team last season with an average of 21 points and 16 rebounds a game. In track, he's an outstanding hurdler and can high jump six feet. . . .

Can Herbie play big-time college football? "I have no doubts about that," says Graham. "He still does things that amaze me." A "B" student, Phelps has 50 schools interested. They include all Southeastern and Ohio Valley Conference schools. Alabama and Georgia Tech are making big bids, but he'll probably sign with U. K.

DICKY LYONS . . . St. X. coach Johnny Meihaus labels Lyons "the best all-around player I've had."

The "deep man" in St. X.'s "shotgun offense," Lyons handled the ball on most plays to utilize his extraordinary ability as a runner, passer and kicker. Against DeSales he booted a 27-yard field goal. In three straight games, he scored all of St. X.'s points and finished the season with 86, second highest in Louisville. . . .

"Dicky has outstanding poise," says Meihaus, "and a lot of natural ability. He also has a great pair of eyes." On defense, Lyons is tops, a "hard-nose" in Meihaus' book. Lyons' other sport is track, where he is a hurdler and pole-vaulter. He was a starter on St. X.'s 1962 Class AAA state football champs.

DON FAUGHN . . . "One of Murray's finest backs ever," says coach Preston "Ty" Holland of Faughn, who is his school's first All-Stater since end Dale Alexander in 1954. "Don is wonderful at following interference," says Holland. "He has tremendous vision and great ability to find the hole and cut." . . .

Faughn scored 160 points this season, mostly on long runs. Against weaker teams, he was used only sparingly. As a passer, he threw for two touchdowns against both Paducah Tilghman and Hopkinsville. One coach said "without Faughn, Murray would have been an average team." Murray's 1963 record was 10-1-1. Faughn plays baseball and runs in track. An average student, Faughn will probably attend Murray, U. K., Western or Tennessee.

HERB COVINGTON . . . Coach Fleming Thornton can't say enough about Herb. "He's the best running back I've seen this year and the finest power runner I've ever coached," says Thornton, who has been in the business 16 years. . . .

Covington exploded for 149 points on 23 touchdowns and 11 extra-points this season and gained 1,238 yards rushing in 200 carries. "He'll eventually play pro ball," predicts Thornton. Although all S.E.C. and O.V.C. schools have scouted him, plus Indiana and Illinois, Memphis State has the best chance for him. . . .

His other sports are baseball and track. Covington is Hopkinsville's first All-Stater since guard Charley Russell in 1947.

1962 ALL-STATERS . . . Three members of the C.-J.'s 1962 All-State team are on the U. K. freshman squad. They are end Ed Settle of Caldwell County, tackle Maurice Moorman of St. X. and guard George Withers of Versailles (now known as Woodford County).

End David Rivers of Richmond Madison is at West Point, guard Philip Hines of Somerset at Eastern as is Belfry quarterback Floyd Hatfield, Halfback Sammy Burke of Danville is attending Georgia Tech, halfback Terry Croom of Tilghman is at Murray and center Jesse McClure of Male is at Michigan. Tackle Eddie Kopple of Male attended Eastern, then dropped out.

DAVE MEREDITH . . . He can do it all and that's why coach Charlie Kuhn rates him as good as an end as he's had at Male. "Dave is a fine all-around football player," Kuhn says. Offensively, his talent on the

basketball court has made him an elusive pass receiver. Defensively, he's been a standout, at linebacker some, but mostly at halfback where he can pick off passes by his opponents.

Having started two seasons, Meredith is being sought by Indiana, Kentucky, Missouri, Western and Eastern. He is a "C" student.

"My kids aren't sure whether they're playing the last game of 1963 or the first game of 1964," a pessimistic Marty Deim cracked as his Waggener team got in its final practice licks yesterday.

The Wildcats, who steam-rolled nine season opponents and polished off Southern in the county title playoff, try for the big one tonight. They are matched with city champion Male, also unconquered in 10 starts, in the state Triple-A championship game at 7:30 p.m. at Manual Stadium.

The showdown for the top schoolboy football prize originally was down for November 15th but the death of President Kennedy forced a postponement. Since Male had a subsequent date with Manual on Thanksgiving Day, tonight was the first available date for the playoff.

"We haven't played in 20 days," Deim pointed out. "It may not be right to say it but this game will be sort of an anti-cimax for us. We've already played two basketball games."

MALE'S DECISIVE conquest of Manual last Thursday enhances the already considerable chances for the Purples to claim their second Triple-A crown. Kuhn's troops are regarded as two-touchdown favorites to expand the Louisville monopoly of AAA football.

Deim indicated that rust has accumulated on the idle Wildcat machine that spewed out 286 points in 10 games. "Our timing is off and we just don't have the spirit we had before the game that was set for the 15th. It's hard to keep them razor-sharp for three weeks," he pointed out.

Waggener's chances lie in the exceptional backfield speed of halfbacks Ben Boone and Joey Bloyd, fullback Ted DeMunbrun and quarterback Dave McGaughey. The latter is a slick operator whom Kuhn calls "one of the finest we've seen around here in a while."

Boone, whose father and Kuhn were teammates on a 1937 Male team that also was unbeaten, is the top scorer in Triple-A with 96 points.

All-State players will be out in numbers. They include center Mike Rodgers and end "Butch" Riley of Waggener and end Dave Meredith and guard Dale Womack of Male.

Waggener hasn't played since November 15 when it beat Southern 26-0 for the County title. "The layoff is bound to hurt our timing, and spirit," said coach Marty Deim. "And Male's riding high after beating Manual," he added.

Waggener was in a pep rally when it learned of Kennedy's death. That night, the team and Deim attended church together. "It was the

kids' idea and I thought it was a fine gesture," said Deim.

Both teams are unbeaten and untied in 10 games, but Male is favored by 15 points in The Courier-Journal's Litkenhous Ratings.

A Male victory will achieve three goals for coach Charlie Kuhn's Purples:

(1) It will make Male the first team to win two Class AAA state titles since the play-offs began in 1959. Male's first title was in 1960.

(2) It will give Male its first perfect season since 1952.

(3) It will clinch the Litrat-ing title for Male as the state's No. 1 team. Should Male lose, second-ranked Caldwell County will finish first.

Waggener can also notch a couple of firsts:

(1) A victory would make Waggener the first County Region champion to take the Class AAA state title. Manual (1959), Flaget (1961) and St. Xavier (1962) were the other City teams to win state titles.

(2) Waggener can end its season without a loss for the first time since it began football in 1958.

Kuhn Praises Proud Loser

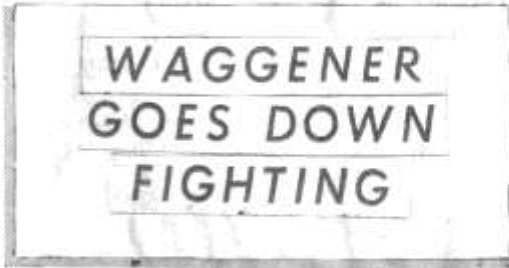

"You kids played your hearts out and lost. What more can I say? You've nothing to be ashamed of."

That was Waggener coach Marty Deim's valedictory to the best team in Wildcat history, a sobbing group that had just lost to Male 27-7 in a showdown for the Kentucky Triple-A football championship.

Purple coach Charley Kuhn, pleased but not especially jubilant, agreed with Deim. "They were as good as any county team I've ever seen," was his tribute.

For Kuhn the spectacular victory at Manual Stadium last night before about 6,000 was the climax of a decade of outstanding achievements at Male. It was the Purples' first perfect season since 1951 when Nick Deines compiled a 10-0 mark. It was Kuhn's second



Triple-A title, the first such accomplishment since the playoffs were instituted in 1959 (the Bulldogs also won in 1960).

The new state champions were undefeated in 11 games. Waggener's defeat was the first for the county titlists after 10 straight successes.

BOTH COACHES agreed that the turning point was a

Waggener fumble on the Male one-foot line late in the third quarter. The Purples had a shaky lead 14-7 with the Wildcats roaring with new life.

On third down on the three quarterback Gary McGaughey and fullback Ted DeMunbrun got messed up on an option play and McGaughey lost the ball virtually on the goal line.

Dave Meredith, a key figure in the Male win, scooped up

the fumble and Male was out of the woods.

Male ran up a 14-0 lead on a pair of touchdowns by Claude Smith but Waggener narrowed the count to 14-7 when Ben Boone scored after a 68-yard march. After the Wildcats' near thing on the fumble, Male added nine more points on a safety and a late six-pointer by Al Jordan.

"I'm sure the 13-day postponement hurt us," Deim said. "It wasn't until the second quarter before we found ourselves." Originally scheduled November 22, the game was postponed by the death of President Kennedy.

Male's superiority was clearly demonstrated in the statistics. The Purples led in first downs 13 to 10, in rushing yardage 253 to 143 and in passing 102 to 24.

Boone's 7 points gave him a season total of 103 and easily

won for him the county scoring championship.

A pass interception opened the way to the first Male touchdown with less than nine minutes gone. After a 29-yard pass from Garnett Phelps to Meredith put the Purples to the Waggener 19, Smith raced over from the eight-three plays later, Ronald Long kicked the first of 3 extra points.

Midway in the second quarter Male struck again after a 14-play, 63-yard operation. Smith caught the Waggener defense slanting the wrong way and raced over from the 16.

WAGGENER reacted to that barb with its touchdown thrust that covered 68 yards in 13 plays. The longest gain in the march was a 17-yard sprint by DeMunbrun. Boone closed it out with a 2-yard stab on 4th down.

After Waggener's disastrous fumble, Male picked off a McGaughey pass on the Purple 19 to start a lunge to the Waggener 1. The Wildcats held there but gave up a safety when Eugene Malone blocked Roger Smith's punt and the ball flew out of the end zone.

The game officials mistakenly allowed Waggener to punt (the rules specify a place kick or drop kick) after the safety. Male hammered to the goal-line again, Jordan scoring from the 4 on the 11th play.

Male Wins 2d State Title In Beating Waggener 23-7

Male High put the finishing touches on its greatest football season in 11 years by whipping Waggener 23-7 last night for the Class AAA state championship.

A chilled crowd of 6,500 sat in Manual Stadium and watched Male take a 14-0 lead, then withstand a Waggener rally and capture "all the marbles" for this 1963 season.

The victory gave Male these three honors:

- (1) The first school to win two Class AAA state titles since the playoffs began in 1959. Male won in 1960, also under coach Charlie Kuhn.
- (2) The title as the state's No. 1 prep team in The

one-yard line when Ted DeMumbrun grabbed Bill Green's bobble on Male's second drive of the last half. That march had totaled 83 yards and had been ignited by a 45-yard run by Green and a 29-yard pass from Garnett Phelps to Meredith.

But the drive did accomplish

one thing. It put Waggener in a hole and Male capitalized on it when tackle Eugene Malone blocked Roger Smith's punt in the end zone for a two-point safety.

On top 16-7, Male sealed the victory by going 59 yards in 11 plays the last time it had the ball. Albert Jordan, who

scored the touchdown on a four-yard run, picked up 41 of those yards in seven carries. Jordan's tally came with two minutes to play.

The loss was Waggener's first in 11 games. Coach Marty Deim's Wildcats won their first 10 games and had hoped to become the first County Region team to win the Class AAA crown.

Phelps Clicks On Passes

Although Male amassed 234 yards rushing, passes by Phelps set up the Purples' first two touchdowns. Phelps threw 29 yards to Meredith for the key play in Male's first-quarter scoring drive which totaled 58 yards and six plays.

In the second period, Phelps connected on a 25-yard pass to Green to highlight a 14-play, 88-yard drive. On the previous play, Male had been penalized 15 yards to the Waggener 39.

Phelps also teamed with Meredith for one other long-gainer. It was for 22 yards in Male's first drive which stalled at the Waggener 30.

There were four key plays in Waggener's scoring effort: (1) A 17-yard run by DeMumbrun; (2) A 10-yard end sweep by McGaughey; (3) An eight-yard pass from McGaughey to Boone; (4) A three-yard, fourth-down run by McGaughey.

As for Waggener's other scoring threat, McGaughey got it in high gear with a 12-yard dash and kept it going with a fourth-down pass of 16 yards to Butch Riley. But McGaughey's fumble was the turning point.

(3) An 11-0 won-last record, the school's first unbeaten and untied season since 1952.

Male, though, was hard-pressed to achieve these goals. After halfback Claude Smith had given Male a 14-0 lead on touchdown runs of eight and 14 yards, Waggener struck back and played the Purples on even terms until the last four minutes of the game.

Boone Sparks Wildcats

Following Male's second touchdown, Waggener drove 67 yards in 13 plays with halfback Ben Boone climaxing the march with a two-yard run with 52 seconds left in the half.

Behind 14-7, Waggener opened the second half by driving 83 yards to the Male three. However, on an option play around left end, quarterback Gary McGaughey fumbled and Male's Dave Meredith recovered on the one-yard line.

Male, too, lost a scoring opportunity on the Waggener

"They were tougher than I thought."

So said Male High football coach Charlie Kuhn following his Purples' 23-7 victory over Waggener last night for the Class AAA state title.

"Waggener has the best County team I've seen," said Kuhn. "I was real impressed with their backs. The whole team hit well."

One of the first persons Kuhn saw after leaving the

dressling room at Manual Stadium was Dr. Ben Boone, an old teammate at Male. "Your boy is a fine football player," Kuhn told Boone, whose son Ben scored Waggener's seven points.

Kuhn, too, was impressed with Waggener quarterback Gary McGaughey. "He may be small, but he gets a lot of mileage out of that team."

As for Male, Kuhn was just happy "to take all the marbles. I thought Phelps (Garnett) was tremendous in picking out his

pass receivers," Kuhn said of his junior quarterback who set up two touchdowns with long passes. "We moved the ball real well."

Waggener coach Marty Deim was proud of his County champs.

"Male was tough, we knew that. But our kids played well. This was the best effort a Waggener team has ever given."

Male's victory banquet is set at 6:30 p.m. Monday at the Elks Club.

Marty Deim Quits Post At Waggener

Waggener, which won the 1963 County high school football title, will have a new head coach next fall.

Marty Deim, who guided the Wildcats to a 10-1 won-lost mark and the runner-up spot for the Class AAA state crown, resigned yesterday.

On Monday, Deim begins a new job, as salesman for a paint manufacturing company. He was the St. Matthews school's second head coach since it began varsity football in 1958.

During Deim's five years at Waggener, the Wildcat football teams won 30 games, lost 17 and tied one. He had one Courier-Journal All-State player, Mike Rodgers, a center on the 1963 champs.

Deim's varsity assistant coaches were Gene Minton and Bob Hoppe, Jr. Another possible successor could be Wade Wearren, an assistant at Seneca.

Diem Quits Waggener Grid Post

Marty Deim, Jefferson County's "Football Coach of The Year" in 1963, has quit as Waggener High coach.

The 32-year-old Deim, whose Wildcats won the county title and barely lost a state championship to Male, will become a salesman for Jones Dabney Company, a paint manufacturer.

"It's too good an opportunity to pass up," Deim, a Shelbyville native, commented. "The future in teaching isn't too promising right now."

A four-year letterman in baseball and football at Centre College, Deim came to Waggener in 1959 after coaching at Danville, Ky., and Norfolk, Va. In five years his teams won 30 games, lost 17 and tied one, climaxing his career with a perfect record of nine victories and no losses last season.

The Wildcats defeated Southern 26-0 in the Triple-A county playoff and lost to Male 23-7 in the Triple-A state playoff.

His fellow county coaches recognized his impressive achievements by electing him coach of the year almost unanimously.

ALL-STATE football player at Shelbyville, Deim played minor league baseball three years in the St. Louis farm system before an injured arm ended his career. He was a

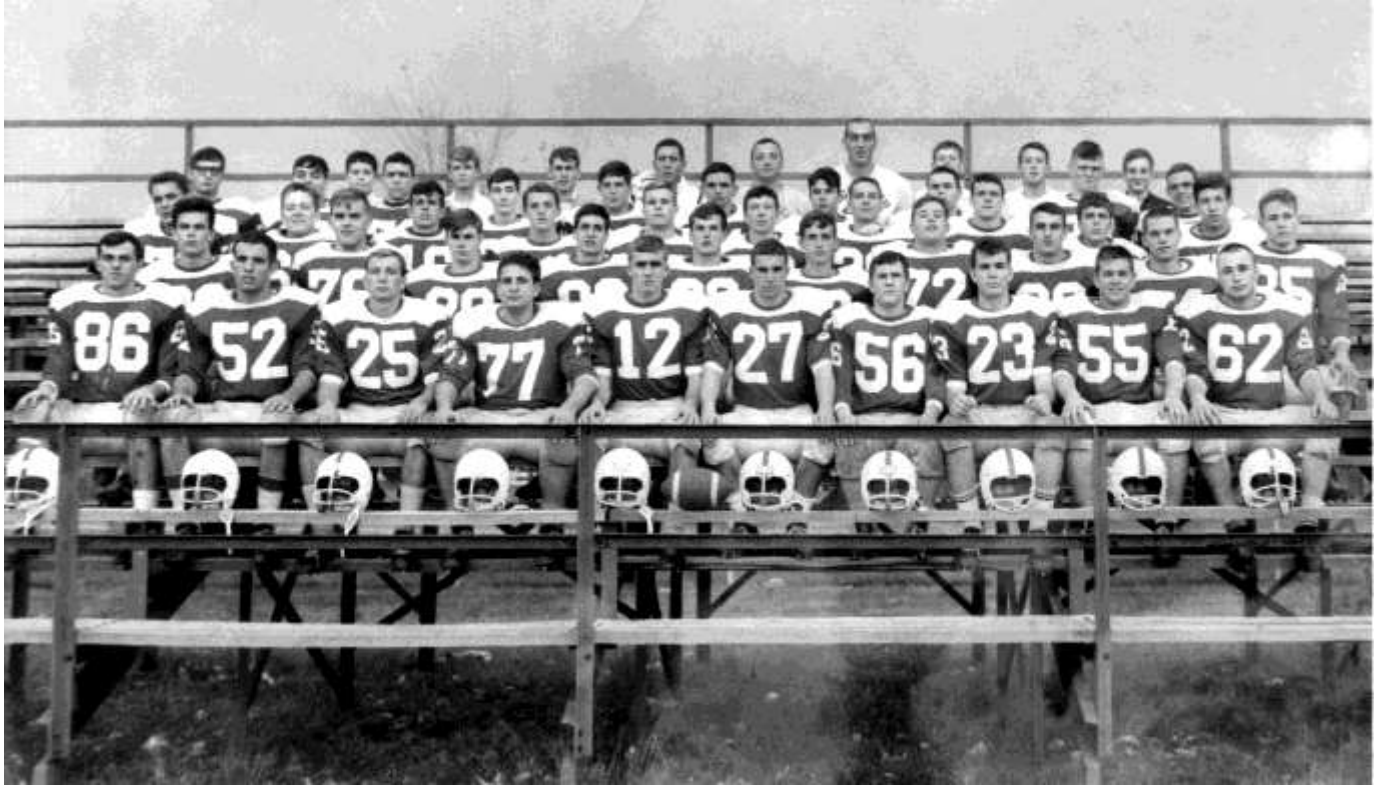

Boones Loom Boon To County Gridders

By JIM BOLUS

Left-handed Ben Boone, a flashy left halfback from Waggener, toted the football to the County high school scoring title last fall.

If you're a football fan, you probably know that Ben is the son of Dr. Ben Boone, a star tailback on Male High's 1937 undefeated, untied team.

And if you're a real football fan, you may recall that famous Male-Manual classic of 1937 when the right-handed Dr. Boone guided the Bulldogs to a come-from-behind 25-20 win . . . with the use of his good ole left hand.

A Courier-Journal account of that winning drive read:

" . . . He (Boone) was a ball of fire that just couldn't be smothered. . . . This boy had to play with his right hand strapped to his side because of a dislocation. Given the ball (late in the game), he forward passed it with his left hand to Wilbur Schumacher for 11 yards and a first down on the 23. . . ."

Moments later, Boone scooted across from eight yards for the winning touchdown before a then record crowd of 16,150 at Manual Stadium.

Same Determination

Ben, Jr., exhibited the same fiery determination last season in leading the Wildcats to a perfect regular-season record of 10-0 before they fell to Male 23-7 in the state AAA championships game at Manual Stadium.

160 that he maintained during his football days at Male in 1935-1937, admits that "seeing Ben play sort of makes me want to play again."

Looking back over his exciting career, the 44-year-old general surgeon calls that 1937 Thanksgiving Day game his biggest football thrill. After graduation from high school, he went to the University of Georgia with Male coach Wally Butts. There, a shoulder injury ended his career after two seasons.

Young Ben's record at the St. Matthews school is just as shining. He started 25 straight games, beginning midway of his sophomore year, for coach Marty Deim. His point total last fall was 103 on 15 touchdowns and 13 extra points, seven of those tallies coming against Male.

Ben, 18, holds his school's career scoring mark of 145 points. A versatile athlete, he averaged 12.2 points for the Wildcat basketball squad last season and ran track two years. "My biggest thrill was beat-

ing Seneca 34-6 last fall," Ben says without hesitation.

Come Wednesday night, the County stars will be shooting for a big thrill, too. With the aid of Ben Boone, they'll be trying to bag a big prey in the form of the City All-Stars.

It's a big undertaking. But you don't have to be a football fan to know of the hunting success the Boones have had in Kentucky.

Ben's heading to Centre this fall where he'll study pre-med and continue his gridiron activities. But he's got one more crack at a City team.

It's Wednesday night at Fairgrounds Stadium in the City-County All Star game. A vital member of the County team, Ben, who stands 5 feet, 9 inches tall and weighs 160 pounds, will be trying to direct the County to its first win over the City since a 13-12 squeaker in 1959. Game time is 8 o'clock.

The City holds a 4-1 advantage in the series which was resumed this summer after a two-year lapse.

Recalls 1937 Game

Dr. Boone, team physician of the County stars just as he was for Waggener the three seasons Ben performed there, remarks, "I checked the boys the other day and they're a great looking bunch. I think they can beat the City."

Dr. Boone, who today is at the playing size of 5-9½ and

Track Coach's Idea Merits Attention



At this time of year, between basketball and football seasons, other sports and their needs should be given attention.

Anybody who attended the Waggener home football games this year, especially the Seneca game, realizes that one pressing need is to find some way to keep down the dust caused by people walking on the track between the stands and the field. templated.

With a track of their own, the Wildcats thimble could have the recognition and support they deserve. The invitational could conceivably become an annual money-making project. Coach Monheimer said, "I think the track would definitely give spring sports, especially track, more emphasis and support."

The main obstacles are lack of money and lack of support. He realizes this, and plans to have a meeting of interested parents and others some time before Christmas in order to get backing for his venture.

This is a very timely and needed plan, and it would help many people throughout the school. It's a pity that such a good project should go down the drain because of apathy. All interested people should get behind it and help one of WHS's least-known sports gain some recognition.

One final note about football season. Waggener plays Male tomorrow night at Manual Stadium. Everyone has supported the team wonderfully through the season, but this is the game for the Wildcats, and that little extra something is needed behind them now.

Waggener's offense took control of the game in the second half and scored on a 71-yard pass play from quarterback Gary McGaughey to end Charles Wood. Boone kicked the conversion. The Wildcats marched again, but were halted on the Trojan 3 by a fumble. Southern took possession, but lost it when James Stalling fumbled to

Waggener's fullback Ted DeMunbrun on the 8.

Boone carried it over on the next play, kicked the conversion, and became the lead county scorer with 96 points. Seneca's Bob Wenter is second with 84.

Late in the third quarter center Mike Rodgers intercepted a pass on the Trojan 45 to set up the next touchdown. The quarter ended Waggener 26—Southern 0.

In the first play of the fourth quarter, McGaughey sprinted 45 yards for the score. The conversion was missed and the game ended Waggener 26—Southern 0.

Defense Was Good

The Cats' defense led by guards Larry Elbridge and Rodgers held the Trojans to 24 yards net gain while the Waggener offense gained a total of 318 yards.

Waggener will now face the Bulldogs of Male in the State Championship Triple-A contest Nov. 22 at Manual's Stadium.

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Martin Deim Named Coach Of The Year

His Waggener Team Undefeated In 1963

A Shelbyville native and former star athlete was honored this week when he was named "Coach of the Year" in Jefferson County.

Martin Deim, 32, the son of Mrs. Martin J. Deim of 526 First Street, Shelbyville, received the nomination after his Waggener High School Wildcats had won the football championship of Jefferson County last Friday by a convincing 26-0 score over Southern. The win was Waggener's 10th in a row and moves them against Male High of Louisville this Friday evening for the Triple A championship at Manual Stadium.

Contacted by the SENTINEL at his home on Tuesday evening, Deim, in the modest manner for which he is so well known and remembered here, expressed his deep appreciation to the coaches of Jefferson County who had picked him as the "Coach of the Year" for '63. He said that the game with Male's Bulldogs to decide the AAA championship would be a rough one because "they're big, fast, and know how to score."

Deim was a starter on the first Shelbyville football team ever to go undefeated and untied, and also played a leading role on the first local team ever to play in the Kentucky State High School Basketball Tournament. Deim was a guard on the 1947 football team which wound up as one of only three undefeated, untied teams in the state, and then, the following spring, his aggressive play helped spark the Red Devils to the 8th Region title.

Deim attended and graduated from Centre College in 1954. While at Centre he lettered four years in football and also won letters in baseball. Upon college graduation he served as an assistant coach at Danville before entering the Navy for two years. In service he helped coach the Norfolk, Va., Naval Baseball football team. Before taking over as head coach at Waggener in 1959, Deim was head football coach at Norfolk Catholic.

Deim, who has an outstanding record of 30 wins, 16 losses, and 1 tie in his five years at Waggener was such a good baseball prospect that he was signed to a contract with the St. Louis Cardinals after highschool graduation. A strong inclination toward coaching and teaching caused him to give up thoughts of a baseball career after a short fling in the minor leagues.

Deim is married to the former Jean Craig of Norfolk. They have two children, Ed, 4, and Steve 3. In addition to coaching football, he teaches senior English at Waggener and also conducts a night adult education class in English twice a week.

10 YEARS AGO Feb. 28, 1964

A proposed March 9 march on Frankfort by teachers was endorsed by the Louisville Education Association's representative council. The Action Committee for Teachers was planning the march to seek support from Gov. Edward T. Breathitt and legislators for tax bills that would help the financially ailing city school system.

Marty Deim resigned as head football coach at Waggener High School to go into business. Waggener had won the Jefferson County football title in 1963 and during Deim's five years as coach had won 30 games, lost 17 and tied one.

Three corner lots at Seventh and Walnut streets were bought by the City Urban Renewal Agency for \$152,500. It paid \$75,000 for the southwest corner, \$32,000 for the northwest corner and \$45,500 for the northeast corner.

25 YEARS AGO Feb. 28, 1949

Southern senators started a filibuster in the Senate to block an attempt by Northern Democrats and Republicans to change Senate rules so a two-thirds majority vote could limit debate at any time. Sen. Walter F. George, D-Ga., opened the filibuster. He said the rule change was

proposed to enable passage of President Harry Truman's civil-rights legislation.

Heavyweight Erzard Charles of Cincinnati won a 15-round boxing decision over Joey Maxim of Cleveland in the Cincinnati Garden.

The Milwaukee Clarks beat the Louisville Blades 4-3 in a professional ice hockey game in the Armory (now Convention Center).

Mayor Huston Quin appointed Col. Dan Carrell to the Board of Public Safety to succeed Joseph Selligman, who had resigned. Carrell was commander of Louisville's 138th Field Artillery Regiment of the Kentucky National Guard. (In 1933, as Republican candidate for mayor, he lost to Democrat

Neville Miller). Centre College lost in the final game of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association basketball tournament in Macon, Ga. It was beaten by the Mercer University team 32 to 20. Centre's players were Green, Kubale, Covington, Dooley and Tomasson.
