Mike, Ramey and Brad lead Waggener to victory

Mike Gambill, Ramey Simpson and Brad Arterburn combined for 45 points to lead Waggener to a hard-fought 53-49 win over DeSales Tuesday night at Waggener.

It was a see-sawed affair thatsaw the Cats build up a lead, lose it, and DeSales build up a lead and also lose it.

The Wildcats jumped off to an early 6-0 lead, and behind the eye of Ramey Simpson, in-creased it to 13-6 at the close of the first quarter. The visit-ing Colts however, kept nipping at the lead and before any-

one knew what was happening, they were on top 22-21. A free throw by Arterburn knotted the count at 22-22, but DeSales went into intermission holding a 24-22 edge.

The half-time rest did not halt the Colt's rally as they zoomed out in front 34-28. The Cats fought back valiantly and behind Gambill's eye at the foul stripe, tied it up at 36-36 as the third quarter closed.

Arterburn and Gambill led the last quarter rally that spelled victory. With the score deadlocked at 38-38, Arterburn, Simpson and Gibbs Reese added fielders, putting Waggener in front 44-38, DeSales cut the gap to three points twice, but Gambill tossed in some clutch free throws for the final count.

Arterburn took scoring hon-ors for the Wildcats with 15 points. He was closely followed by Gambill with 15 and Simpson with 14. Reese added six and Kenny Lewis hit two to close out the scoring.

Wildcats bow 63-47 to Fern Creek

Waggener continued its hard luck ways, losing its fourth straight, 63-47 to Fern Creek Friday night at the Creeker's court. The Tigers, behind an 28-point performance by Jerry Lawson, were too much for the Cats.

The taller, rangier and more experienced Tigers pulled away in the second half and Waggener could never get back into con-tention. The Wildcats battled the opposition on even terms the first quarter, but then Lawson went to work, riddling the nets with uncanny accuracy.

With the tilt knotted at 14-14, Fern Creek's defense dug in. Limiting the Wildcats to five points in the second frame, the Tigers tallied 14 and sped to a 28-19 halftime margin.

Fern Creek remained in command the rest of the way, leading 47-33 at the end of the third stop, and coasting to victory.

Mike Gambill, Waggener's leading scorer, led the Cats with 13 on three fielders and seven from the charity stripe. Kenny Lewis followed with 11, and Brad Arterburn, turning in his finest performance this year, tallied nine.

Arterburn got off to a slow start this year, but he may have found himself. Other Cat scoring found Wally Adams with six, Glbbs Reese and Ramey Simpson | b with three apiece and Chuck Armstrong with two.

Waggener gets revenge defeats Durrett 43-40

Waggener's Wildcats, with revenge in their eyes, staged a heart-pounding rally to down rival Durrett 43-40 Friday at Durrett.

When these two squads get together, it is always a tight game and this one was no exception. Last year, Waggener took the measure of the Demons twice. This year, Durrett won an earlier contest in the Oldham County Invitational before bowing to the Wildcats Friday. Ironically enough, the games have always been won by three-point margins.

It appeared that the Cats had forfeited all as they were down at halftime, but with cold determination and courage, they rallied to win.

Waggener spurted to a 7-1 margin, but Durrett, not easily put down, cut it to 8-7. Kenny Lewis split the nets with a 30footer, followed by Ben Cundiff's free throw and Gibbs Reese's tap in, to push the Wildcats on top 13-7. Terry Rudolph countered with a lay-up for the Demons, cutting Waggener's first quarter lead to 13-9.

In the second chapter, the Wildcats could not get the ball down court, as Durrett persistantly turned Waggener errors into points. The Cats could not add a single point in this quarter while the enemy was gathering 14, pushing the Demons on top 23-13 at intermission.

The situation looked dim for the Wildcats, but they quickly turned into a new team. Still trailing at 32-22, the Cats went

Brad Arterburn, who turned in a spirited performance, and Reese led the attack. Hitting with deadly accuracy, they shoved through 12 straight points, giving Waggener a 34-32 lead. Durrett cut it to 34-33, but Arterburn could not miss. He rippled the cords for the Wildcats remaining nine points.

Arterburn accounted for 21 points for the night, "Big Art" got off to a slow start this year, but has tallied nine, 16 and 21 points in his last three games and is always tough on the boards.



The Wildcats ability to stay with Eastern came at the foul line. The Cats cashed in 24 of 32 attempts, including 17 out of 19 in the last half.







"We need some of that same school spirit. As soon as we build up a football tradition, like St. X, we'll be all right."





The Cadets scored their only


The Cadets scored their only touchdown on a one-yard plunge by Frank Stalcup. The score was set up by a Waggener fumble on their own 21.







The Waggener Wildcats ended the 1959 football season by scalping the Seneca Redskins, 38-7, at Waggener Stadium on November 5.



The reason our Wildrats were ruled ineligible was for to a new system set up during the past spring and summer, known as the "Dickinson System." Under the rules of this arrangement every school is divided into regions and classes. Waggener was placed in the Jefferson County Region. She is considered a "Class AAA" school because of her population. In order for our Wildows to be eligible for the championship of their region it was necessary to play four games with other Class AAA schools in Jefferson County.

The Cate met five AAA teams, but only three of these were in County Region. Therefore our Wildcats were ruled ineligible.

For the present schedule to have been changed would have been somewhat dishonorable, since a contract had been made with the schools played this year in the spring of '58. At that time the present manner of dividing the schools was unknown and there was no set pattern for deciding a county champion. An appeal for an extra county game was made, however, but was turned down. It was ruled that Waggener had had an equal chance when the scheduling was done two years ago. It was also decided that it would be giving an unfair advantage to Waggener over other schools in a like position throughout the state. Oldham County, the number six ranked team in the state, took a 61-47 decision from Waggener's error-plagued Wildcats Tuesday night at Oldham Coun-



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



Our Purpose And Goal . . .

A GREATER WAGGENER FOR ALL OUR CHILDREN

EVERY parent and every relative of a child in Waggener High School has a devoted interest in the welfare and future of these children. And corollary to that interest is a responsibility to provide sufficiently for their welfare and future.

With that single aim, the Waggener High School Development Association, Inc., a not-for-profit corporation, has been organized to be the nucleus from which a program will be directed on a permanent basis to assure that certain fundamental needs vital to the welfare and future of our children are met. We are many in strength and strong in purpose. We have faith that our purpose will succeed.

The Jefferson County Board of Education has furnished our community and our children with the physical facilities which constitute one of the finest secondary institutions of education in the South. In five years, Waggener has grown from an enrollment of a few hundred in the seventh grade to around 1,850 students in 1958. Next year, when for the first time Waggener will have a Senior High class, enrollment is expected to be nearly 2,500 students.

Waggener is blessed with an excellent faculty and administrative staff who have labored diligently under hardships and shortcomings of finances and physical facilities to build a better Waggener step by step and grade by grade. They have been aided and comforted by an active and diligent Parent-Teacher Association, and by other outside groups.

Waggener High School Development Association has now stepped forward to perform, with the help and cooperation of students, parents, friends, faculty and others, what we might term "a third stage" in building a greater Waggener. It is the major purpose of the Association to solicit and obtain financial resources in this fine and growing community to build athletic facilities on the campus to provide adequate football, track and field, outdoor assembly and baseball installations so that in addition to the mental and moral development of our children they, likewise, will have full facilities for physical development.

We all know from experiences of other new schools established in Jefferson County in recent years that sufficient tax-revenue funds are not available to the Board of Education to furnish these facilities. It is, therefore, our responsibility to furnish them for our children.



These athletic facilities will be used by and for boys and girls alike, and for our splendid Waggener Marching Band. And also for the elementary school.






