

### Youthful Gridders Salvage Two

The 1961 football season for Waggener was not one of great success. With a dismal record of two victories and seven defeats, the Wildcats look forward to a much better season next year. With the entire backfield and line with the exception of center Jim

Brunnhoeffer returning.

The Cats lost the first game of the season, a close one to Fairdale, 13-7, with Charles Mudd scoring the winning touchdown in the last 7 seconds of play. The two games the Wildcats played creditably but went down in defeat to superior play and experience 21-0 to Atherton and 28-7 to Valley. The Butler game was a disappointment to Waggener rooters. A poor Butler team held the dispirited Wildcats to six points to their own 13 until time ran out with Wildcats in the midst of a final drive. The DeSales game was probably one of the best if not the best our boys played this season, losing 6-0 in a close game that could have gone either way. The outstanding linebacker play of Rich Kippis helped thwart the Wildcat victory. After losing to Eastern 21-0, most of the Wildcat rooters felt that it was time that we won one. Their hopes came true as the Wildcats whipped a keyed up Pleasure Ridge Park

team 26-6 in a game that saw three Panther men go out with injuries due to hard play by the whole Waggener team. The second high point of the season was a victory over Durrett whom we had never beaten before. Although the final score was 14 to 13 the game was not as close as it may appear with the Cats ready to score again as the game ended. The team was ready for their tilt with arch rival Seneca but greater size proved too much for them with the end result 19 to 6 in Seneca's favor.

Though the season was not a winning one the Cats were benefited by fine play throughout the entire season by several of the team; backs Joe Bloyd and Ben Boone were ground gainers all year with the way being paved by the blocking of linemen Butch Riley, Orbin Greene, Phil Terry and Bruce Smith. On defense hard nosed Tommy Helfrich made many tackles and saved the Cats innumerable yards.

With almost the entire first team back, plus many of the juniors and sophomores who did not see action, the Cats are ready to win them all in the next football

year.







Waggener's baseballers had their most successful year in the brief history of the school, during the season of 1961. Led by the pitching of Kenny Lewis and John Thompson, the receiving of Bruce Martin, and the hitting and fielding of Don Spangler, Mike Patrick and Butch Riley, Waggener's nine was defeated only by Butler and Fern Creek during the regular season. In the post-season tourneys Waggener was successful in the District, and went on to represent the Seventh Region in the State Tournament. Winning their first two games behind the pitching of Thompson and Lewis, Waggener progressed to the finals to meet Caverna for the state Championship.

In the early part of the game, Caverna jumped to a one-to-nothing lead. The score remained the same, with no serious Waggener threat, until the last inning. With no one out, Steve Porter drew a walk, and Mike Patrick singled him to second. With two men on base Bruce Martin stepped to the plate and chopped a drive to short left field. The throw to home cut down Porter. One out! The catcher threw the ball to third to nip Patrick as he slid in. Two outs! As Patrick was trying for third, Bruce Martin was flying for second with all the speed he could muster. The throw from third beat him to the bag, and the tag was put on him. Three outs! With this spectacular triple play Caverna became the State Champions and Waggener the runner-up.

Although we are losing a great part of the team, we are confident that our hardballers will make the season of 1962 a success, with capable newscomers filling in the positions vacated by last year's starters.

Waggener had its most successful golf season to date in 1961. The Wildcats won their first three matches by a total of twelve strokes. Then Waggener posted easy victories over Country Day, Valley, Eastern, and Pleasure Ridge. The team had its worst day of the season when they met Seneca, losing by 19 strokes with Rick Acree soaring to a 49.

One week later the Wildcats entered regional play at Shelbyville. At the end of 18 holes the Wildcats were tied with

Seneca at 310 for the team lead. Seneca won the sudden death playoff when the Wildcats recorded three bogeys and a par on the nineteenth hole.

We gained our final revenge over Seneca in the state. Ron Acree recorded a 78, Phil Scherer a 79, Jack Burrice an 83, and Rick Acree an 86 for 326 strokes and a five stroke lead after the first day. The Wildcats fired a 325 the second day and retained the five stroke lead to win, 651 to 656.





Starting the season with a bang, the Wildrate defeated the number two ranked team in the state, powerful St. Xavier, by a score of 60-57.


