



### Gridders Have Winning Season

The 1962 season was one of great promise for the Waggener gridders. The squad, which for the most part was made up of iuniors, ended the year with a five win, four loss worksheet.

The Wildcats opened the season with an impressive twenty-three to nothing victory against Fairdale's Bulldags. The Cats then proved that they were no easy touch by defeating city avail. Atherton twenty-three to thirteen. After losing to powerful Valley they were edged by both Butter and Mayfield by one point margins in hard fought battles. The Wildcats then becomed best with a vengeance by downing the Eegles of Eastern fourteen to seven. Then the Cats took their easiest victory of the year as they won the Pleosure Ridge game by forfeiture. They made if three in a row by defeating Durrett, but then the Wildcats lost their chance for the Eastern District Championship as they were defeated by Second by the score of thirty-three to six with Jim Swart scoring five touchdowns to leed the Redskins.



Waggener's final victory of the season was against Durrett as the Cats downed the visitors 21-7.



Waggener's Wildcats, under the direction of Coach Marty Deim, defeated defending county champion Fairdale to open the 1962 season. It was Waggener all the way as the 'Cats collared an early Bulldog fumble and converted it into a touchdown as quarterback Gary McGaughey tossed to Ben Boone for fifteen yards and a touchdown. Boone also contributed a twenty-five yard touchdown run, and Ted DeMunbrun pitched in with a four-yard scoring plunge. End Butch Riley converted all three extra points. Waggener's hard-nosed defensive line trapped a Fairdale back in the end zone for a safety and two points as the 'Cats rolled to a twenty-three to nothing shut-out victory.

In their next outing against Atherton, Waggener continued its winning ways. After the Rebels went ahead six to nothing in the second quarter, McGaughey threw a twenty-five yard touchdown pass to Butch Riley, who then converted the extra point for a seven to six lead. Atherton, however, retaliated with a touchdown to take a six point halftime lead. The Wildcats tied the score in the third quarter and scored the winning points in the fourth as McGaughey made three- and one-yard touchdowns, respectively.

On September 21, the Wildcats suffered their first loss of 1962 at the hands of Valley. The hard running of Larry Stringer, who scored all three Valley touchdowns, and the virtually impenetrable Viking line were too much for the physically smaller Wildcats. Only McGaughey's throwing accuracy saved the 'Cats from a shutout as he tossed to Riley, who carried it to Valley's twenty-five for a total of forty-nine yards. McGaughey later threw to

Boone for fifteen yards and a touchdown.

The next game was one of frustration as the 'Cats took possession of the ball on Butler's two-yard line but were held to one yard in four tries by a tenacious Bear defense. Waggener's only points came on a three-yard plunge by Boone as the 'Cats lost seven to six.

The Wildcats' losing streak was stretched to three games as they traveled to Mayfield where they were again defeated by a one point margin. Waggener's scores came on an eight yard run by McGaughey and a spectacular McGaughey-to-Chuck Wood pass play. Riley's fourth quarter extra point attempt, which would have tied the score, was blocked.

Against Eastern the Wildcats scored one of their sweetest victories. Boone scored on a first quarter thirty yard pass play from McGaughey, After Riley pulled an Eastern back down for a safety, McGaughey made a five yard touchdown run as Waggener terminated a scoring drive which had been set up by Lee Griffith's interception.

On October 6, the Wildcats took advantage of the excellent running of Ben Boone, who carried the ball ten times for 123 yards, and Chuck Friedman, who averaged six yards in fifteen attempts, as Durrett was defeated to set up the Eastern district showdown with Seneca, Waggener scored twice on McGaughey's passes, one a seventy-five yard play to Boone, the other a five yard pass to Riley. Friedman rounded out the scoring with a twenty-five yard touchdown run.

In the final game it was Seneca all the way as Waggener scored once, that being on a twenty-two yard McGaughey-to-Boone pass as the Wildcats lost thirty-three to six.





Boone scrambles after a loose ball.




The eight win-twelve loss record turned in by Waggener's Basketball team does not seem to signify a successful season. However, the success lay in the fact that the young team gained valuable experience which could be used to mold the best team in the school's history. Foun of the five starters will be returning next year with only two seniors, Barney Neal and Warner Maxwell, being lost.

The beginning of the season was very dismal for the slow developing 'Cat round-ballers. The opener was lost when a Henry County forward hit a last second shot. Then after a loss to Oldham County the 'Cats were victorious over Fairdale, After three successive losses Waggener again came out on the winning end against Shelbyville. Butch Riley was high with nineteen points. After a loss to Daviess County, the roundballers faced number one ranked Seneca. By using a stall they gave them a scare only losing 28-21. A loss to St. Xavier placed the team at its lowest point with a two and eight record.

At this stage the team began showing spirit with a fifty-five to forty-six win over Southern. In the next game the hustling 'Cats fought it out with highly rated Male losing only forty-six to forty-three. Then facing Eastern, Waggener got off to a 19-2 first quarter lead

and remained on top the rest of the game. It was late in the second quarter before Eastern scored their first field goal. After a loss to Manual and a win over Durret, denoted by Dave Pearlman's twenty-one points, the 'Cats reached their season high by defeating Butler 80-50. Ben Boone was high with twenty-six followed by Ricky Mitchell with nineteen. Following a close game with St. Matthews rival, Trinity, the 'Cats met highly ranked Valley and came out victorious. The season was ended with a win over Fern Creek and a close game, losing by four points to number seven rated Oldham County.


In the District tournament Waggener faced Trinity. After a slow start they were seven points down at half time. When the third quarter ended, the difference was still seven points. Then with a lot of determination the 'Cats caught up and forced an overtime, eventually losing 46-45.

Because of Waggener's slow start in the '63 season all ten juniors and seniors saw a good amount of action. It was not until the Butler game that an effective lineup was reached. This late season spurge enabled the 'Cats to wind up second to Senera in the County with an eight and three record.













The 'Cats halted an early season slump with a win over the Eastern Eagles as Jim Helm fired a five-inning no-hitter. The momentum rose as Don Lovelace pitched a three-hit shutout against Fern Creek, and Patrick and Neal held Durrett to one earned run as the Waggener bats slugged out eleven runs. They then fought to the district championship as Waggener hurlers Helm and Ransom allowed no runs and a total of only ten hits in three district games.

After playing Atherton, Seneca, and Butler in regular season contests, the 'Cats turned in another tournament success as they came from behind to defeat Shawnee four to three. However, in the final, it was the opposition who came from behind as eventual state champion Manual rallied to pull out a four-to-two squeaker.

The 1963 season promises to be even more successful with the return of the pitching of Ransom, Helm, and Lovelace, and the hitting of Bruce Smith, Butch Riley, Ransom, and others.










