

When Durrett reached the Wildcat three-yard line, they were not able to score on four attempts. Thus, Waggener ended the regular season with a perfect record.




Lyle Metcalfe defends against an Eastern receiver.






Ben Boone takes a jumper against Daviess County.




Tom Stigger goes high for a rebound.




Ben Boone eyes the basket as he prepares to shoot.

Butch Riley prepares to take a crucial free throw in the Fern Creek game.




Jim Talbott grabs a rebound as Butch Riley and a Daviess County man stratch.








