Without Harvey Waggener suffers

After losing high-scoring guard, Sam Harvey, the Wild-cats are finding it difficult to avenge their already 3-6 record. Two of those six losses came last week as the 'Cats fell to Elizabethtown High 80-47 and to Seneca 77-61.

Waggener's next two contests will be at the Masonic Home gym where they will play Southern Jan, 15 and will battle the Butler Bears on January 22.

Harvey was put out of action Christmas Day when he received a broken arm in a informal wrestling match with a friend, Sam is expected to have his cast removed tomorrow and hopes to see action in the Eastern game Jan. 29, its absence has been sorely felt and his return will be gladly welcomed.

In the East Jefferson County Invitational Tournament, Waggener gave a strong opening bid when the Cats topped the Oldham County Colonels in the first round of action 60-42. With only two minutes left, Waggener trailed Thomas Jefferson by only four points but failed to close the gap and finally fell to the Patriots 59-47.

In the consolation game, only four hours after playing Thomas Jefferson, a tired Waggener team fell to the high-ranked Elizabethtown Catholic 53-39.

The L.I.T. bound boys from Elizabethtown High really poured it on as they crushed the 'Cats by a 33 point margin, 80-33.

Elizabethtown took a strong early lead and by halftime had more than tripled the Wildcats effort, outscoring Waggener 42-13. The third quarter proved to be Waggener's best as they scored 17 points while holding Elizabethtown to the same total.

Standouts for Elizabethtown were Doug Meredith with 20 points, Doug Gibson totaling 19, and Les Yates hit for 18 points. High scorers for Waggener were junior guard Robin Boden with 13, seniors Jim Taibott and Tommy Stigger, each with nine, and Wayne Aho followed for eight.

Waggener, looked as if they had recovered from the loss of Sam Harvey when they tackled Seneca last Friday night and were leading 19 to 18 at the end of the first quarter, and trailed by only six going to the locker room. The Redskins poured on the war paint in the second half, however, and finally topped the 'Cats 71-68.

Pratt Lyons of Seneca achieved his career high with 30 points. Larry Trunnel and Jesse Kirk hit for 17 and 15 respectively, and David Pflug had 13 points. Jim Talbott was the high point man for Waggener with 17 as Tommy Stigger and junior forward Bruce Heanies followed with 16 and 15 points.

Allen Linker and Tommy Stigger were high point men for Waggener, both with 15 points. Jim Talbott followed with 12 points.

Police said Harvey was a passenger in an eastbound car driven by William C. Tyler. Tyler's car hit a car driven by Norbourne Kelley, 37, of 1720 Jefferson Ave., Lyndon. Kelley was turning left into a drive-way, Police said.

Tyler and Kelley were not injured. However, Everett Stanley, 29, Lyndon, was treated at General Hospital for a cut forehead.

Harvey broke his arm Christmas Eve and had been out of many Waggener games. He scored 17 points Saturday night against Manual, which won 72-70.

Waggener's roundwall record fell to a 5-11 tally over the weekend as the Wildcats lost to Durrett Friday night 64-51 and succumbed to the St. Xavier Tigers by a 72-59 margia on Saturday night,

Against Durret Tommy Stigger and Robin Boden both accumlated 14 points and Jim Talbott totaled 12, Gary Paul was the leading scorer for Durrett with 17 points. Durret ended the first quarter with only a six point lead, but slowly stretched that margin to seven at the end of the third quarter, and finally topped the "Cats by an unlucky 13.

Thirteen proved to be just as unlucky for the 'Cats Saturday night when they fell to the Tigers 72-59, 13 points, Jim Talbott found his way to the top of the scoring column with 15, followed by Tommy Stage'r with 12 and Buddy Morris with 13.

High ranked Tom Hagan led the St. X Tigers with 26 points, Wayne Corby contributed 18 points. St. X jumped to a five point lead in the first quarter and held that margin through the half. The lead at the three quarter pole had blossemed to ten, and finally 13.

From the deak of the statisticians there are some facts that may make your roundball viewing micre meeningful. The Wildicas have everaged 61.8 points a game while the opponents have accumulated a 67 point average. Jim Talbott, and Tommy Stigger are both averaging 12.8 points per game. Talbott has outscored Stigger in rebounds, however, seven to six.

Talbott is also on record for scoring the most points in one game - 23 points against But-ler. The highest number of rebounds in a single game is also attributed to Talbott - 15 in the Southern game. Sam Harvey's season average is 14 points per game.

Wildcats end worst season

The Wildcats finished their regular season play last Friday night with a 6-15 record as they fell to Shawnee 61-51 at the Masonic Home Gym.

The 6-15 record, the worst in Waggener's history, does not 'tell the whole story, however, of the injury ridden, Wildcat squad.

Shawnee jumped to an early lead and ended the first quarter with a lead of 17-14 which they never relinquished. In the second and third quarters the Indians outscored the Wildcats by only one point, but poured it on in the fourth when they topped the Wildcats 22-17 to end it 61-51. Shawnee sunk twice as many field goals as Waggener (28-14), but the Wildcats led 23-7 at the free throw line.

Both teams had only two men in the double figures. Jerry Matthews of Shawnee tailied 25 while teammate Caldwell scored 15. Tommy Stigger was high for Waggener with 13, followed by Robin Boden with 12.

During the half Miss Cindy Keeling was crowned the 1964-65 Basketball Queen by senior guard, Sam Harvey. The members of her court included Misses Joyce Edwards, Sue McMannon, Jan Pauline, and Avery Burke.

A 63-54 margin does not indicate the calliber of the game that the Cats played against the Patriots. With less than 6 1/2 minutes left to play in the fourth quarter Waggener trailed 48-45. With 3 minutes of action remaining the Patriots had only a 55-51 lead. Waggener hit 36 percent of its shots. Thomas Jefferson sank 34 percent from the field and achieved a 33-24 rebounding edge. Thomas Jefferson scored 17 points in every quarter except the third where Waggener topped the Patriots 14-12.

Trinity wins opener 28-6 over Waggener

Trinity, led by some slashing runs by Junior halfback, Roger Grunelsen, and Senlor fullback, Clint Walker, whallopped Waggener 28-6. The victory made Paul Gering's head coaching debut a successful one.

Grunelsen powered his way for 144 yards in 16 tries for an average of nine yards per carry, while Walker bulled his way for 70 yards.

For the first quarter both teams battled on even terms and at the quarter's end, neither team held an advantage. In the second quarter, though, successive runs of 15 and 12 yards by Gruneisen, and a 13 yard gainer by Walker set up the Shamrocks for their first score—a 14 yard pass from Quarterback Rusty Page to Juntor end Francois O'Conneil. The quarter ended as a Trinity scoring surge died on the Waggener three.

The Shamrocks started aggressively in the second half, Early in the third quarter, Trinity gained possession of the football on the Waggener 27. Walker pounded for 10 yards to the 17 and on the next play, Gruneisen picked up eight to the 9 yard line, Russ of '5 and' 2 yards by Walker brought the ball to the 2 yard line where Walker bulled over for the TD.

Two interceptions by Junior Jim Lintner set up the two remaining Shamrock scores. The first came midway through the third quarter and gave the Shamrocks possession on the 'Cats 33, One play was all that the Shamrocks needed as Trinity signal caller, Page, pulled of a "sleeper". - a shuffle pass to half-back Grunelsen.

Trinity kicked to the weary Cats and the defense held them back for the first three plays, bringing up a positing situation. Waggener back, Mike Easley dropped back to kick, but instead, Easley, who quarterbacked for the Wildcats last year, attempted a pass, which Lintner picked off and ran back to the Cat's 39 yard line. Two runs of 15 and one yard by Walker set up the final score, a 22 yard pass from Page to slotback, Mike Price.

Grundsen boosted his game scoring total to ten as he made all four conversions, Waggener's sole score came in the fourth quarter as Easley rounded end for 20 yards and a six pointer. The attempt for the conversion was smothered.

The defense, led by Senior Tackle, Dave Lambertus, led the rugged Shamrock defense which smothered all of Waggener's efforts until the fourth quarter, when the reserves took over.

Trinity's next football game will be against Chicago Mt. Carmel and is to be played on the newly seeded Trinity Field. After the game there will be a Sock Hop featuring the Specteres.

The cross-country team

started the season with a perfect 15-61 shetout of Providence of Indiana. The shamrocks, led by Senior Jerry Price, captured the first seven places. Behind Price, came Ken Ellers, Denny Pohl, David Dering, and Gene Kelty.

Waggener Wildcats win 19-7 over Butler

Coach John Stoll was "tickled to death" as Waggener "kept the pressure on" last Friday against Butler on the Butler field. Waggener won 19-7, The Waggener Wildcats

The Waggener Wildcats scored first in the second quarter when junior fullback, bill Gatti, opened the Butler line on a 3-yard run. The kick for the conversion was blocked. Later in the third quarter Waggener drove back to the Butler 6-yard line, and sophomore halfback, Mike Simson, scored at the start of the fourth quarter. Two conversions, a pass to Stan Peskoe and a kick by Mike Easley, were called back on penalties. Butler stopped the third attempt, which was an incomplete pass by senior halfback, Mike Easley.

September 16, 1965

Later in the fourth quarter, Easley passed to junior end, Tierney Sullivan, for 6 points, and kicked successfully to place Coach Stoll's boys 19-7 in the lead, Butler's only score came in the third quarter when junior quarterback, Tom Holderfield, slipped through the Waggener line from 1 yard out for 6 points, and junior guard-tackle, Bill Byrne, kicked the conversion for the Bears.

In the first quarter of play both teams seemed to have strong defensive power and a weak offense, Senior tackle Don Williams, juntor end Chuck Anderson, senior guard Gary Veach, and junior back Craig Jones held the Bears' defense together.

The defensive stand-outs on the Wildcats were senior center Bob Stocker, junior end Tierney Sullivan, junior full-back Bill Gatt, and junior tackle Perry Bond, Waggener's main threat was the combination of offensive playing by senior halfback Mike Easfey and sophomore half-back Mike Simson.

Waggener pushed their record to an even one loss-one win by losing to the Trinity Shamrocks Sept, 3 and defeating the Butler Bears last Friday evening, Coach John Stoll said after the game that he hoped this victory would 'be the first of many,"







Season Below Average


Nothing seemed to go right for the Wildcats in their 1964-1965 season as the squad posted a 6-15 record. Plagued by injuries and fouls, the 'Cats often failed to get started in their games. However, many of the games were much closer than the scoreboard allowed for, since several games were largely undecided until the final min-utes of the fourth quarter. Sam Harvey, who in the preseason polls was picked to be a standout, is perhaps the most unlucky of the Wildcat roundballers. He was sidelined right after Christmas with a broken arm, and the night of his return after this injury he was involved in an automobile accident which kept him out for the remainder of the season. Buddy Morris missed several games because of ankle trouble. Jim Talbott fouled out in more than one game, further adding to Wildcat troubles. Alan Linker and Bruce Hennies had to adjust to varsity play and did not reach their full potential until the end of the season. 


Waggener 60 Pleas. Ridge 84








Track at Waggener generated much interest in 1964 especially among underclassmen. The large turnout could have been due to the fact that 1964 was an Olympic year or rumors about the new track. Whatever the cause the 1964 track team was one of the largest fielded by Waggener in many years. Experienced and inexperienced all ran together in practices and in meets.

It was just as well that Waggener had so many reserves because many of the experienced runners were injured in some way or another during the season. The first casualty came in the first meet with Pleasure Ridge when hurdler Dubbie Freeman pulled a muscle in his leg. The 'Cats were outclassed by both Pleasure Ridge and Seneca, but they found more of a match with Westport losing by a narrow margin. The thinlies picked up their first win over DeSales in a tri-meet which included Pleasure Ridge. In two more such tri-meets Waggener picked up two more wins over Thomas Jefferson. The other teams in the tri-meets were Valley and Eastern. In the Jefferson County Meet the Wildcats finished eighth in a field of thirteen teams. Individual stars for Waggener were Skip Poole who set a record in the mile and finished second in the half mile and Mike Rodgers who finished fourth in the discus. While Norman Fegel was in the lead in the half mile, his already injured ankle gave way with only a half lap left in the race. Skip Poole gave the winner of the race a run for the finish, but ended up with secand place. Norman Fegel was out for the rest of the season,







Waggener has always been fortunate in its golf teams. Largely due to the fact that the Waggener district has had so many public and private courses in the general area, Waggener usually has had a team of seven or eight qualified golfers. In the past two years the Acree brothers, Rick and Ron, grabbed the headlines on the sports pages either competing for Waggener during the golf season or competing on their own during the summer. Rick graduated in '63 but Ron was a decisive factor in the success of the golf team in 1964.

The 1964 golf team was no exception to the rule. The team had a 12-5 record with two losses to State Runner-Up St. Xavier. 

In the State Meet Waggener's Ron Acree finished third in individual competition with the team finishing fourth. Acree shot a blazing 148 while Boden shot a 164, Douglas a 166, and Silliman a 166. The team scores in the State meet of the first four four-man, thirty-six hole teams were as follows: State Champion Frankfort 610, State Runner-Up St. Xavier 631, Trinity 640, and Waggener 644.


