**Waggener defeats Valley 72-70**

A last second hit by forward Alan Linker pushed Waggener to a hard-fought 72-70 victory over Valley last Friday night at Valley.

The climax came when Waggener trailed 70-69 with 15 seconds of play left. A foul on Valley sent Linker to the free-throw line where he managed to tie the score. The Wildcats rebounded with Linker sinking the decisive 10-foot field goal just as the buzzer sounded.

The lead changed hands throughout the game with the biggest leads being when the Vikings led 18-12 at the end of the first quarter, and when Waggener led 37-31 in the second quarter. The half-time score stood at 37-34, Waggener.

High scorer for Coach Roy Adams' Wildcats, now 12-3, was Buddy Morris with 28 points. Linker followed with 17.

Fred Copass was high for Valley, scoring 27 points. A 9-4 record is now held by the Vikings.

Also, Waggener's JVs, led by Dale Garth with 16 points, defeated Valley's JVs 43-36 in a three-minute overtime.

**Wildcats win again**

With a winning combination of torrid shooting and star Buddy Morris, Waggener ran over both Fern Creek and Davless County last week.

The Wildcats, under Coach Roy (Doc) Adams, dumped the Creekers 86-69 Tuesday night, Feb. 15, at Masonic Home. The Panthers of Davless County fell 69-55 last Friday night, also at Masonic Home Gym.

In the Fern Creek game it was a battle between Fern Creek's Mike Kuehr, the region's top scorer, and second place Buddy Morris. Morris outscored Kuehr 29-26 to lead the game scoring.

Waggener, hitting 52 per cent of their shots, led at half-time 41-25, and the Creekers never posed any real threats throughout the entire game.

Morris again led the Wildcats to the 69-55 victory over Davless County, scoring a career high of 31 points. Although the Cats were held at half-time to a 24-22 lead after a slow start, a third quarter surge of 26 points to the Panthers' 7 gave them a safe lead of 50-29 going into the final quarter.

Waggener hit 46.5 per cent of its shots against Davless County's 38.1 per cent.

Crowning of the 1965-66 Waggener Basketball Queen highlighted half-time ceremonies with Cindy Millspaugh winning the honor. Miss Millspaugh, a junior, is a member of the cheerleading squad. Waggener's Drill Corps also performed at half-time.

**Waggener's JV's win**

In JV action, Waggener rolled over Fern Creek 57-40, and defeated Iroquots 65-50, also in past week meetings.

The Wildcats, now posting a glittering 14-3 record is currently ranked 14th in the state.

**Waggener meets Westport in district tourney tonight**

It'll be a tight match when Waggener meets Westport tonight in the 26th District tournament's upper bracket. The game opens the tourney, starting at 7:30 at Eastern's Gym.

Westport, ranked 10th in the state, is a slight favorite over 13th ranked Waggener. Both teams have ended regular season play with fine records-- Westport 15-4 and Waggener 15-3. But, the Wildcats have handed the Warhawks two of their four losses, Dec. 18 when they won 72-69 and Jan. 11 when Westport fell 69-65.

The victor of tonight's game will meet the winner of the Seneca-Eastern lower bracket game played tomorrow night. The final will be Saturday night.

Waggener ended their regular season by stomping Durrett 78-59 Tuesday night, Feb. 22, at Masonic Home.

After exploding for 27 points in the opening period, Waggener was never caught by the Demons of Howard Stacey. They led 45-26 at halftime and 55-35 going into the final period.

The finale gave the Wildcats of Roy (Doc) Adams a happy ending in several ways:

A perfect 9-0 record was set in Seventh Region play. Star Buddy Morris hit a career high of 32 points to set the pace in region play with his best season average of 22.9.

It gave the Wildcats the championship of the Jefferson County Activities Conference, a league of 13 county schools.

A three game winning streak by Waggener's JVs was broken when the JVs of Durrett defeated them Feb. 22, 37-35.

## Record-smashing season ends for Waggener

"Waggener, Waggener, nobody prouder. . ." was the cheer heard from the Waggener bleachers at their defeat by Westport last Thursday.

The 71-51 Westport victory bumped the Wildcats out of district and regional tournament play ending Waggener's 1965-66 basketball year.

Although all Waggenerites were disappointed, they were consoled by the fine achievements displayed by their Red and Gray in past months.

A 15-4 record, one of the best in Waggener's history was set. This included an over-all 9-1 in Seventh Re-

gion play.

Forward Buddy Morris led the region in scoring with a regular season average of 22.9.

Waggener's Coach Roy (Doc) Adams was recently named Coach of the Year.

Scoring records were smashed when the Wildcats hit 94 points against Pleasure Ridge's 65 on Jan. 25,

making the highest ever scored in Waggener's history. In that same game, junior Mike Lausman, subbing for Morris, poured in a record 37 points.

The Cats are sure to be heard from again next season. Morris, Bob Bolen, and Bruce Heentes are the only seniors who wound up high school play at Waggener.

# Waggener, Trinity to meet on gridiron September 2

The excitement of high school football returns next week, and the Wildcats of Waggener are expected to have a fine gridiron season this fall. Students as well as community fans are sure to welcome it after a three month lack of high school sports.

Approximately 75 boys, including junior varsity and varsity, fill the '66 squad under main coach John Stoll.

Practice began Aug. 8 and has continued twice a day, five days a week since then. Hard work has well prepared the gridsters for their opener against Trinity, Friday, Sept. 2.

Assistant coaches James Juett and Charles Kays return this year along with a newcomer to Waggener, William Evans. Coach Evans comes from Pleasure Ridge Park High School.

Returning from last year will be several outstanding grid stars. The touchdown runner of '65, senior Mike Simson, again will be quarterback, along with senior Keith Franklin and junior David Eerman, also at quarterback.

Operating at fullback will be senior Bill Gatti, who did a

great job last year. Gatti should prove to be one of Waggener's most outstanding fullbacks.

Fans will be watching for fine play from seniors Tierney Sullivan at end, Perry Bond at tackle, Tom Hariz at halfback, Howard Friedman at halfback, and John Chappell at guard. Juniors Mike Carter at halfback and Mike Meadors at tackle are also hopefuls.

Last year's Wildcats posted a good 6-3-1 win - loss -

tie record, including the 20-6 defeat of Seneca, last year's state champs. There are prospects for an even better team this year.

# Sophomore-packed Trinity team will face Waggener Wildcats tomorrow at 8

A sophomore-packed Trinity grid team opens the 1966 football season tomorrow night against neighboring Waggener.

The 8 o'clock game will be held on Trinity's home field.

Of the 36 players remaining on the Trinity squad, 17 are sophomores. Head coach Jim Kennedy remarked, "We're pretty young and inexperienced. Even some of our seniors have little varsity experience."

Asked how he thought the team would fare this season, Coach Kennedy said, "I just don't know yet. We may win just two or three or we may win six games. We'll just have to wait and see."

Coach Kennedy doesn't believe in the platoon system. He thinks there is no high school in Kentucky with enough good players to form two platoons.

"I don't think a team can play winning ball using two platoons," he said.

Leading the team will be returning lettermen Roger Grunelsen, Bill Giannini, Rick Hall, and Dick Clark.

Giannini, a quarterback last year, will start at quarter-

back. Grunelsen will be at one halfback position, the remaining halfback position is a tossup between John Miller and Junior speedster Paul Bufkin.

Fighting for the starting quarterback job are Alan Hennessy and Tom Domhoff. Domhoff, though inexperienced in varsity competition, looked sharp in last week's scrimmage with Westport. Hennessy, also inexperienced and but a sophomore, should be an asset because of his speed.

Domhoff's and Hennessy's chief passing targets should be seniors Dick Clark and Francois O'Connell, both returning lettermen.

Expected to see action on the line are Glenn Wilburn, Mike Gore, Paul McHugh, Jim Miller, and Hall. Wilburn, a starter on the team two years ago at center, has been switched to tackle. At 208 pounds he is the heaviest man on the team.

This year's team is coached by a practically all new staff. Head Coach Kennedy led Flaget last year to a 10-1 worksheet and the city championship.

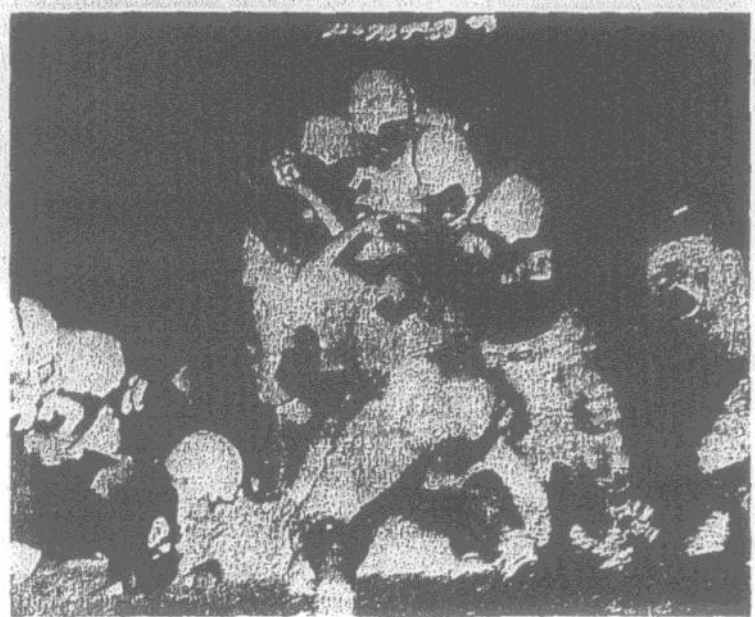
Also from Flaget are Tom Donnelly and Vince Searcy, end and middle line coach respectively. Coaching the line is Cliff Simms who coached in Alabama last year.

The only holdouts from last year's staff, Ron Holzknicht and The Rev. John Rueff, along with Maurice Baurice Brotzgo, will coach the freshmen.

# Shamrocks tame Wildcats

Sparked by the clutch play of quarterback Alan Hennessy, the Shamrocks rolled to a 20-7 victory over stubborn Waggener last Friday night.

Hennessy, a 5-11 sophomore with no varsity experience, pulled the Shamrocks out of a 7-7 tie in the fourth quarter with two scoring aeriels.

Taking advantage of a Waggener fumble, the Shamrocks drove from the Wildcat 23 to the ten-yard line. On the next play, Hennessy, confronted by two Waggener linemen, rolled out left. With the Waggener secondary men moving in to stop the end run, Hennessy found Grunelsen open in the end zone for the tie-breaking score.

The Shamrocks padded their lead just a minute later on a pass play from Hennessy to

halfback John Mulliner. Mulliner, with the aid of a downfield block by fullback Bill Giannini, scampered untouched for 73 yards and a touchdown.

Trinity opened up the scoring early in the game when Giannini intercepted a Keith Franklin pass and ran the ball 45 yards into the end zone. Waggener retaliated in the second quarter.

Waggener threatened earlier in the game when Hartz ran back a kickoff 84 yards. Catching him on the Trinity five was Hennessy, who rewrote the freshman record books in track last year.

The Trinity line, named by Glenn Wilburn, Tom Kinusing, Mike Gore, Rick Hall, and John Hess stopped the Wildcats cold and Trinity took possession.

The state champion Trinity

cross country team opened their season with a 10-43 victory over Providence (Ind.)

Pacing the Shamrocks to a 1-2-3-4-6 finish was senior Dennis Pohl. Finishing behind him were Donny Kelly, Stan Voelker, Ken Eilers, and Dave Daring.

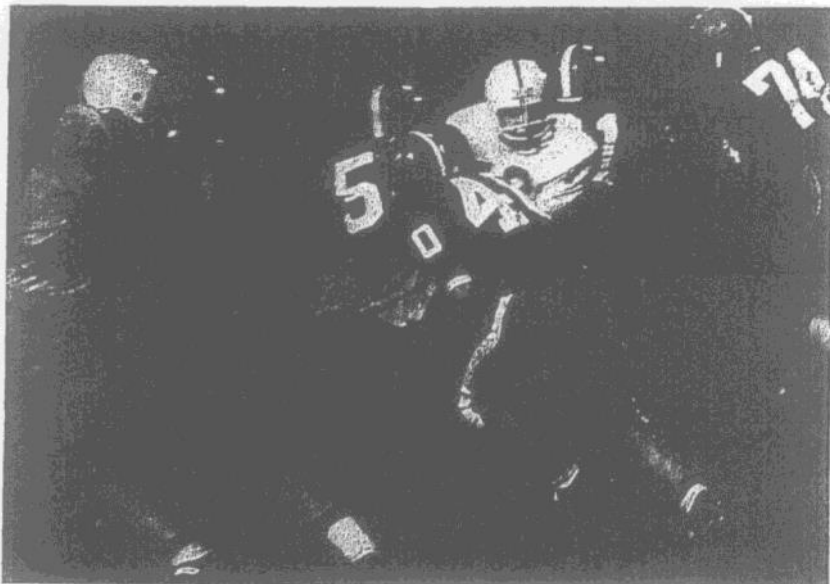
Let me remind you that Waggener students are proud of their team and any community support will be greatly appreciated.

# Wildcats will meet fairly strong Fern Creek tomorrow night

Last Sept. 17, Waggener and Fern Creek hit the field and fought to a frustrating 19-19 tie. It was the only tie game for both teams of that season.

Tomorrow night, the Wildcats and the Tigers will go at it again for the third game for each this season. Starting at 8 p.m., the game will be played at Waggener's field.

Both Waggener and Fern Creek have split two games since the season began Sept.

2. In last Friday night's play, Waggener defeated Butler 32-14, but Fern Creek fell to a powerful Valley squad only 12-7.

Opening games found Waggener being defeated by Trinity, 20-7, and Fern Creek stomping Fairdale 26-0.

Fern Creek lost only three seniors who played football last year, and nine returning regulars make for a fairly strong squad. The Tiger line averages about 210 pounds. Leading Fern Creek is coach

Ed Orick. Coach Orick is making his debut at the far east-end school.

The Wildcats improved greatly from the previous loss to Trinity in downing Butler. They spread their touchdowns out leading 6-0, 18-7, 25-7, and 32-14 at the end of every quarter. The Waggener defense was particularly strong, and the hard-drive running was too much for the Butler line.

The Bears made several threatening passes as expected, but only one panned out as anything.

Waggener coach John Stoll seemed quite pleased with the results of the game. "I feel a whole lot better after this game and feel we'll continue to improve."

In other Waggener sports,

Westport defeated Waggener 19-42 in cross-country last Thursday. Junior Mike Dixon led the Wildcats at the meet at Westport.

Coach John Stoll's Wildcats improved their record to 2-1 with last Friday night's win over Fern Creek 40-13. Atherton is winless in two games. They were defeated by Eastern 20-0, and by mighty Male, first in the state, 48-13 in the past two weeks.

Although Waggener is favored, it won't be forgotten that the Rebels downed them last year 21-13 in an upset. Atherton's win-loss tie record was 2-7-1 last year.

The Wildcat improvement shone at the Fern Creek defeat. Tremendous Waggener play was displayed, especially

in the final quarter, where the best defensive and offensive play this year was shown. Hard drive running was the factor most responsible.

Going into the final period, Waggener led only 19-13. With less than seven minutes left to play, a Wildcat interception boosted the score to 26-13. The pigskin was returned to Fern Creek who attempted a second pass.

Again, it was intercepted, leading to still another touchdown. With the extra point kicked by Perry Bond, the score jumped to 33-12. Then a last second 25-yard run ended the game with Waggener on top 40-13.

Waggener's Tom Hartz, Mike

Simson, and especially Bill Gatti starred. Gatti made five of the touchdowns and one conversion. The other marker was made by Simson.

Coach Stoll commented with a smile immediately after the game, "We tried to give it away but we just couldn't do it. We did everything wrong."

In girls' hockey at Waggener approximately 25 girls are working toward their first game, probably the first week in October. Fall practice began the day after school started and has continued every day since, except for rainy days. Practice is held at Seneca Park and is under the supervision of Miss Shirlee Bates.

Seneca's touchdown yardage proves the power behind them.

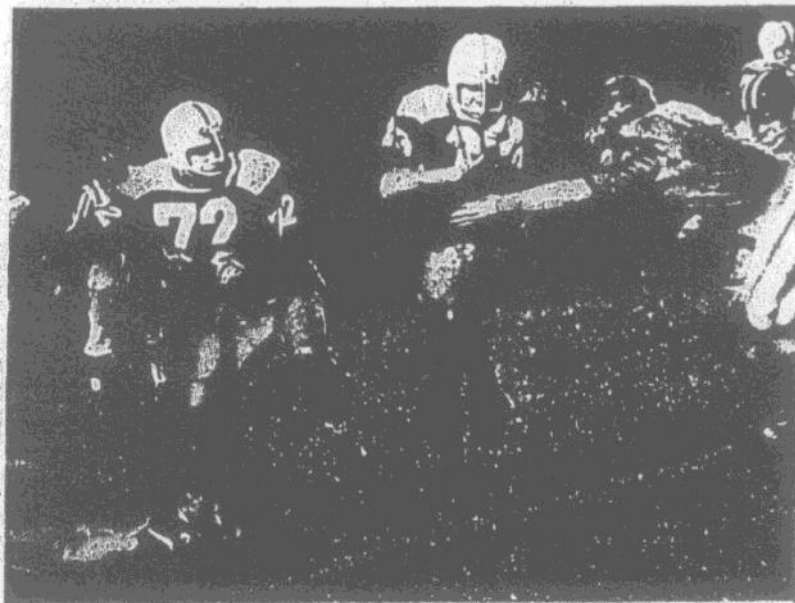

## Waggener hockey team splits games

Waggener High School's girls' hockey team has split two games - losing their first to Presentation 3-0 and winning over Holy Rosary, 2-1.

The team, about 22 in number, is in the Blue League, made up of Holy Rosary, Sacred Heart Team A, Presentation, Mercy, Ursuline, and Collegiate.

Most games are held Wednesday afternoons at 3:30, and all games take place in Sen-

eca Park.

Also for Waggener, Mike Lausman had 13 points to raise his season total to 90. Center John Hall poured in 13 points also.

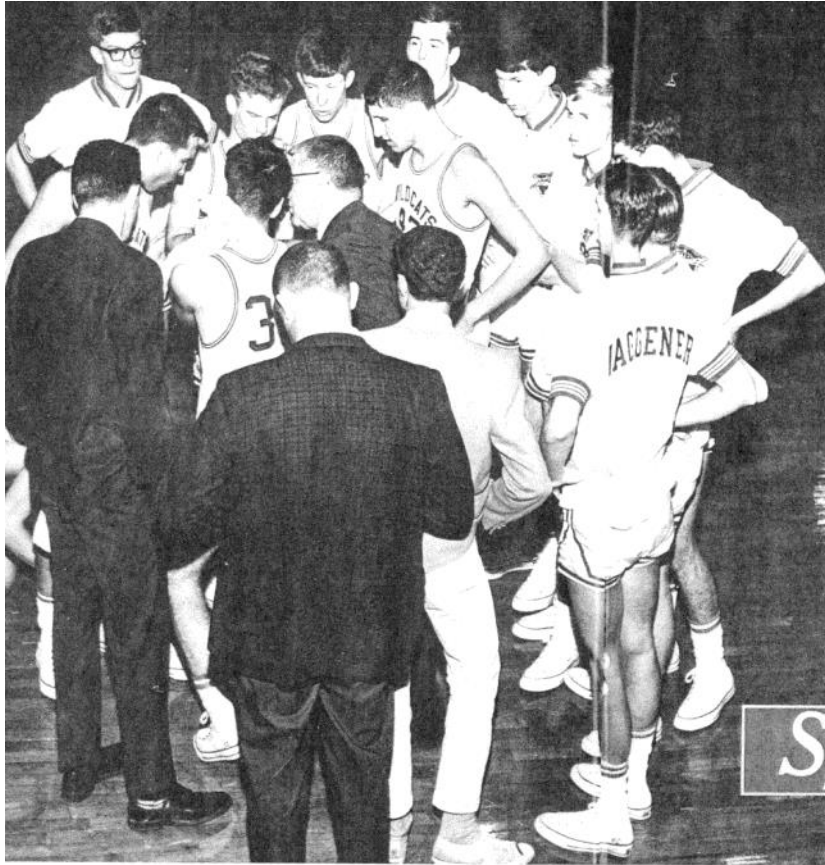

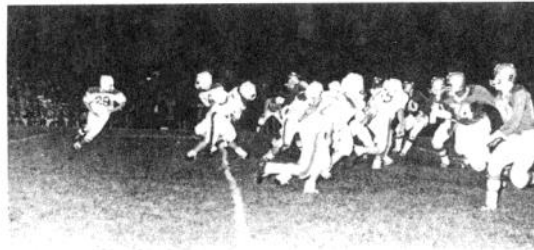
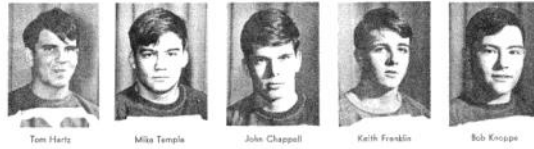
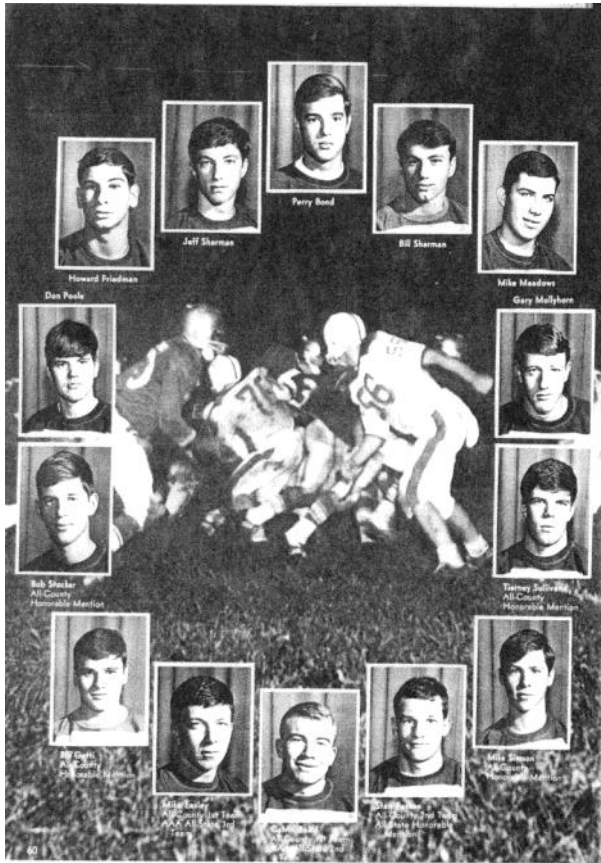


Coach Shell and Coach Keyes direct the team to victory.

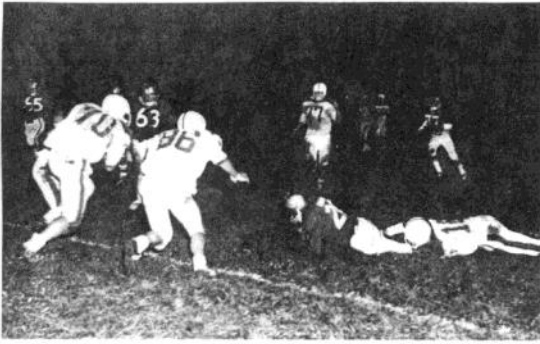

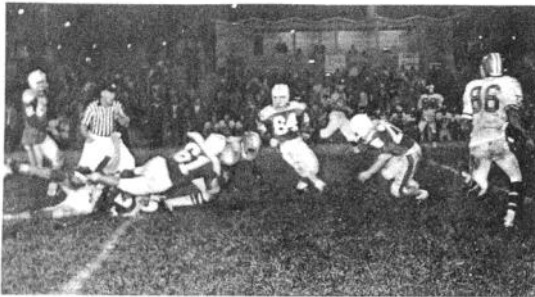

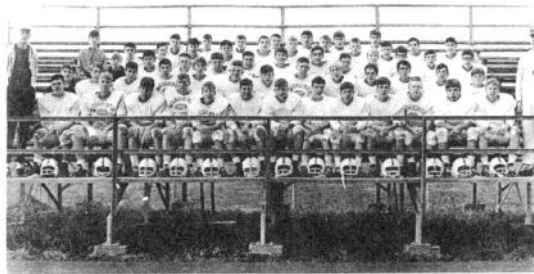


Mike Simon throws a block into a Seneca back.

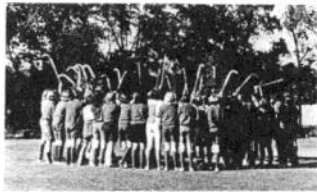

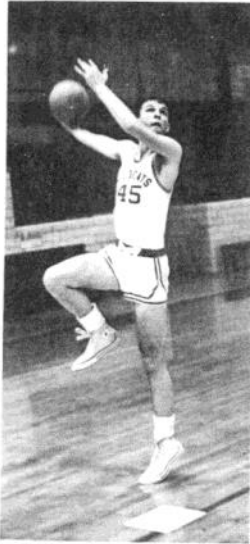

### 'Cats Have Perfect Record Against 7th Region Foes

Coch Roy "Doc" Adams stated before the Daviess County game that Waggener has "surprised everyone and I hope they continue to surprise me." The Wildcats then trounced Daviess County 69-55 for their first win over the Third Region power. Three days later the Wildcats won the County championship by defeating Dunnett 78-59. It was the 'Cats' fifteenth victory of the season and marked a dramatic reversal from Waggener's 6-18 record of last season. The victory also gave the team a perfect 9-0 slate in Seventh Region play.

The 1965-66 season has truly been one of surprises, records, and tense moments. The Bird and Gray opened the season with five straight victories, two of which got them to the finals of the East Jefferson County Tourney against Thomas Jefferson. The 'Cats then lost two games, one to TJ and one to Fifth Region powerhouse Elizabethtown; however, the 'Cats won ten of their next eleven games and achieved an eleventh place ranking among Kentucky's high schools.

This year's team has been the best shooting team at Waggener. As a team the Wildcats hit better than 52 per cent of their shots from the field. On three different occasions they hit better than 60 percent. Against Pleasure Ridge Park Waggener scored 94 points which surpassed the previous high of 91 points, also set this season, against Southern. In the Pleasure Ridge game Mike Lausan, starting instead of high-scoring forward Buddy Morris, poured in 37 points to break the single game scoring record formerly held by Paul Long, now playing at Wake Forest.

Way back in 1959 the Wildcats defeated arch-rival Seneca High School 47-40. Since then the 'Cats had lost eleven straight to the Radskins; however, the 1965-66 season started a new streak for the Waggener five. To help complement the football team's unending victory over Seneca, the roundballers took two straight from the 'Skins.

Seniors Buddy Morris, Rob Boden, and Bruce Hennessey along with Juniors John Hall and Alan Linker led the team to the District Tourney where they meet Westport in the first round. A victory over Westport would assume them a trip to the Regional and possibly a shot at the State title.

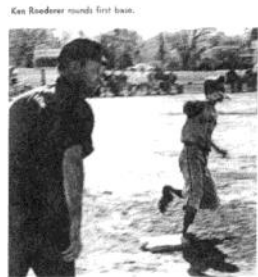

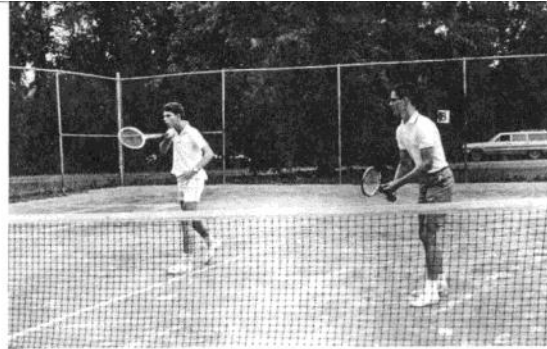
