



The Waggener Wildcats logpled the highly ranked Seneca Redskins 41-39, last Friday hight.

A victory such as that one is enough to set a team on fire according to Waggener Coach Roy "Doe" Adams.

The Wildcats will be trying again tomorrow night in a home game against Southern, To be played at Masonic Home Gym, the game will start at a o'clock.

Southern, a sixth region team, has a record of 3-6 and is second in that region behind Thomas Jefferson, With a ranking of 65.8 Southerfi will go into the game tag-ged the underdogs. Waggener, with a 78,2 is picked to winby spine 12 points.

Seneca appeared to have wrapped it up again when sophomore David Bishop gave Senecs a 64-31 edge with two free throws and 15 secons left. But Waggener quickly came back with a pair of free throws by Thomas to make it 64-63, with five seconds remaining.

Mike Lawhon finally ended it by dropping two Seneca from throws to make the final margin of 66-63.

The victory gave sixth ranked Seneca its 21st against only two losses. Waggener, ranked 18th in the state, dropped its fifth game against 17 wins. Trophies were given to both teams in an after-game presentation.

Adams completed the past season with a 17-6 record, It was his 17th as a coach having previously been at Olive Hill, Anchorage and Eastern.












Co-captain Tierney Sullivan Estens as Coach Stoll points out new patterns.
















