with a big "W". The color scheme of red and gray will be used.

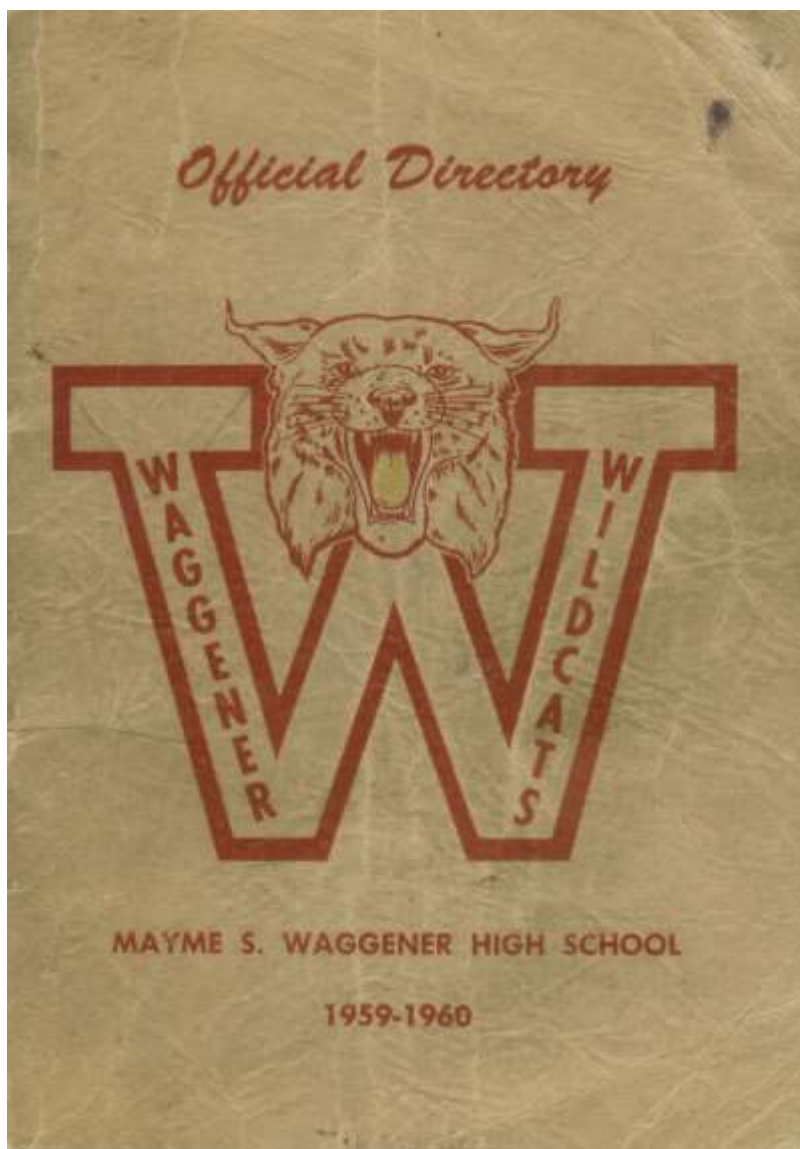
Fuller To Edit

Waggener High School Official Directory, 1959-1960:

HISTORY OF WAGGENER

Waggener Junior High School was named in honor of Mayme Sweet Waggener, a well-known and beloved educator in the St. Matthews area from 1916 until her retirement in 1946. She began her teaching career in the Louisville schools, transferring to the county's Greathouse Elementary School in 1916. In 1918, she became principal there and served in that capacity for twenty-eight years.

Mrs. Waggener died in 1953, and on October 26, 1954, Waggener Junior High was dedicated to her memory.

Waggener is located on a 22-acre site and the original cost, exclusive of land, was over a million dollars. It was the first completely separated junior high school in the history of the Jefferson County education.

In 1957, when there was a 10th grade for the first time, the school's name was changed to Waggener High School. Today, in 1960, our first senior class will graduate. They have been accommodated in new yearly-completed wings since 1957.

Mr. John B. Lowe was Waggener's first principal. In 1959 Mr. Lowe was succeeded by Mr. Earl Duncan, assistant principal. The growth of Waggener necessitated the appointment of two assistant principals and four guidance counselors.

As of 1959 the enrollment was 2,530 which is three times as many as in 1954. The faculty has also tripled along with the enrollment.

Waggener High School is an accredited secondary school, member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. It is an important part of the community of St. Matthews and gives promise of growing into one of the finest high schools in this part of the country.

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MR. EARL DUNCAN

Mr. Duncan was born in Georgetown, Kentucky, on August 21, 1920. He graduated from Oxford High School in Scott County, and received his A.B. in education from Morehead. He also has his Masters degree from the University of Indiana.

In high school he was picked for the first all state basketball team picked by Earl Ruby in 1939. While at Morehead he became one of the best basketball players that has ever come from the state of Kentucky. One time he personally outscored the total opposition.

Mr. Duncan then entered the Marine Corps where he received his basic training at Paris Island and at Quantico Marine Base. He then went to Officers Candidate School. In 1943 Mr. Duncan transferred to Jefferson County as a teacher at Fern Creek High School. Mr. Duncan transferred to Jeffersontown High School for the year 1943-1944 where he was head basketball coach. In 1950 he was made head basketball coach where he coached two county champs. Mr. Duncan continued serving in this capacity until Waggener was opened in 1954. He became the boys' counselor at Waggener. In 1957 he became the assistant principal, and this year became principal.

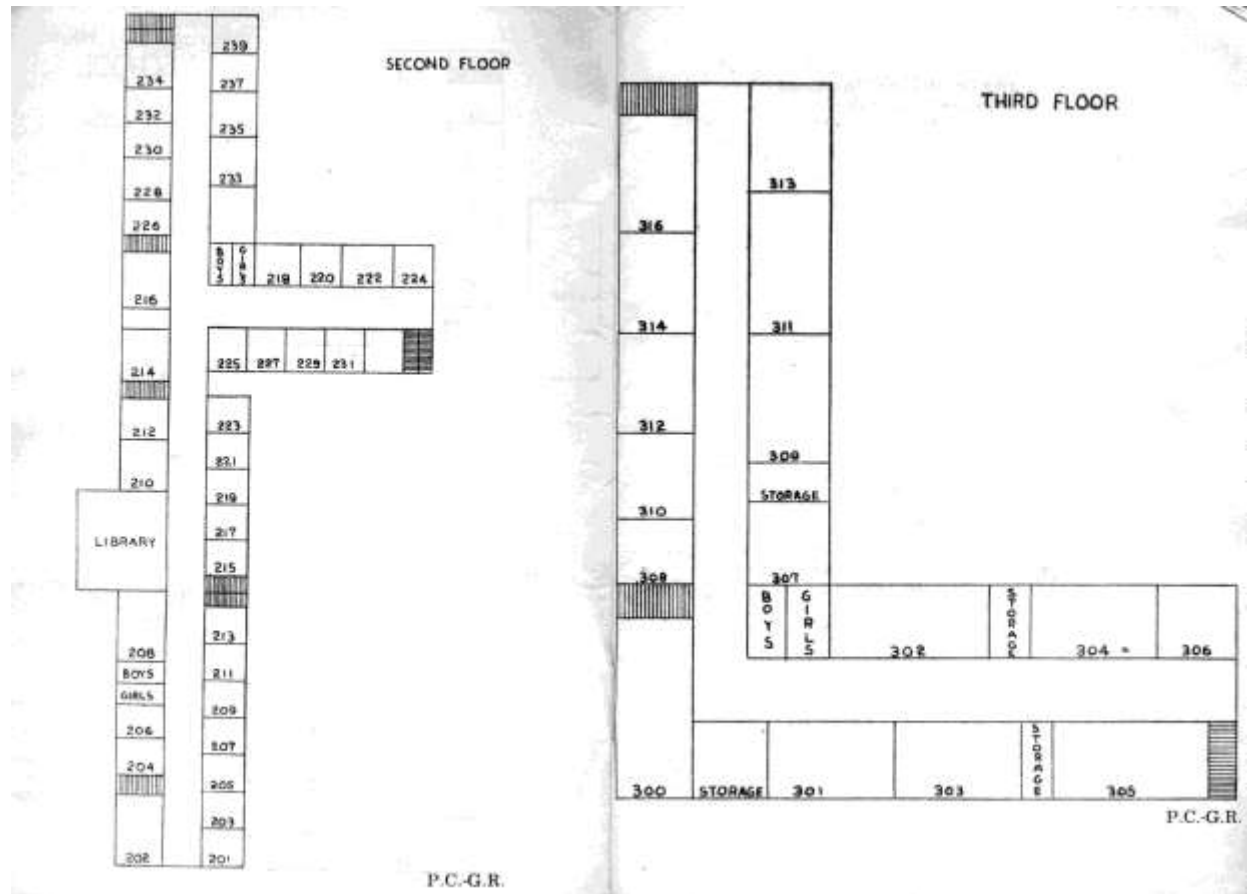
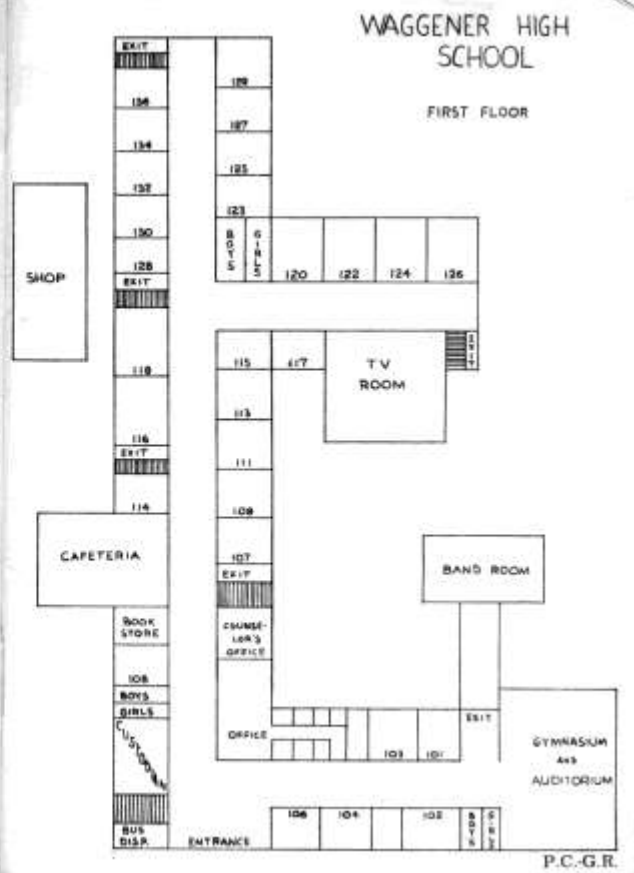
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General Information

ATTENDANCE

The pupil is held accountable for his absence and tardiness. Undue absence and tardiness will not be tolerated.

Pupils who enter the premises may not leave until the close of the day, unless excused through the office.

If a pupil arrives at school after 8:15, he must report to the office, otherwise he will be counted absent for that day and so reported to his parents.

HALL PASSES

Pupils must get permission slips before they leave their class rooms for any reason. A pupil must have this permission from his teacher at all times.

LOCKERS AND LOCKS

All pupils are assigned lockers. The locks for the lockers can be secured in the book store. Any personal locks will be removed if it is on someone's personal locker.

BOOK STORE

The school book store is open in the mornings for business each day from 7:50 to 8:15, and after school for 15 minutes. Books and school supplies are available at the book store.

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LIBRARY RULES AND REGULATIONS

In order to borrow books from the library, a student must present his library card. A library card is given each student at the first of the school year. The right to borrow books may be revoked at any time due to abuse of library privileges.

All books may be withdrawn for 14 days with the exception of reference books, reserved books, and magazines. A book may be renewed for an additional week providing the borrower brings the book to be restamped on the day it is due.

A book lost by a student must be paid for by the end of the semester or the student will not receive his credits for that term.

Waggener can never acquire an adequate library unless her students exercise care and consideration in the use of the books. Do not take any book out of the browsing area unless it is properly issued to you by a library assistant.

APPOINTMENTS

Appointments with the Principal, Assistant Principals, Dean of Women, and Dean of Men can be made any time during the school day. Teachers should be consulted during their free periods or at the end of the school day if possible.

BUS REGULATIONS

The right of all pupils to ride in this conveyance is dependent upon their good behavior and observance of rules and regulations. Any pupil who violates one of these should be reported to the school principal.

1. The driver is in full charge of the bus and the pupils.
2. Pupils shall obey the driver cheerfully and promptly.
3. Pupils should be on time; the bus cannot wait for those who are tardy.
4. Pupils should observe the following:
 - a. Never stand in the road while waiting for the bus.
 - b. Clean shoes before entering the bus.
 - c. Avoid spitting on the floor of the bus.

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LOST AND FOUND

Lost articles may be claimed at the Lost and Found Room off the main lobby. Bring to this room all articles that are found. They will be marked with the finder's name. The Lost and Found is open during these hours: 7:45-8:15, 11:30-1:00, 2:00-3:00.

SMOKING

Smoking is prohibited in the school building or on the grounds during the school hours. This is a state law, not merely school policy.

CAFETERIA

All students are required to go to the lunch room during the lunch hour. A well-balanced plate lunch, including milk, may be bought in the cafeteria for thirty-five cents. Extra milk may be purchased. Students who bring their lunches should leave them in lockers until lunchtime. Students are not permitted to leave the school grounds during the lunch hour.

PARKING

All automobiles, motor scooters, and bicycles must be parked behind the school building in the spaces provided for them. Do not park in front of the building. This space is for visitors only.

If a student is excused and has occasion to leave school in a car during the school day, he should do so quietly. The speed limit in the school zone is ten miles per hour.

The riding of motor scooters and bicycles is not permitted during school hours.

FIRE DRILLS

Fire drills are required once each month by state law. They should be conducted with such ease and efficiency as will prepare every individual in the building to meet an actual emergency.

Pupils must maintain absolute silence and move quickly and in an orderly fashion. Specific instructions as to route and exit from the building are given by the teacher. Each teacher accompanies his class to the campus, fifty feet from the exits.

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- a. Do not throw waste paper or other rubbish on the floor of the bus.
 - e. Do not mar or deface the bus in any manner.
 - f. Do not start for school when ill or when any member of the family has a contagious disease.
 - g. Avoid unnecessary conversation with the driver.
 - h. Abstain from the use of tobacco and profane or indecent language.
 - i. Keep arms and head inside the bus window.
 - j. Do not get on or off bus or change seats while bus is in motion.
 - k. Respect persons whom you pass on the route.
 - l. Report to the driver at once any damage to the bus.
5. Pupils who must cross the road after alighting from the bus should pass in front of the bus and not behind it.
 6. Should any pupil persist in violating any of these regulations, the driver shall notify the principal and after due warning has been given the pupil, he shall be forbidden the privileges of again riding the bus until permission has been granted to do so.
 7. Complaints of drivers, pupils, and parents should be reported to the principal.
 8. Should the conduct of a pupil on the bus endanger the lives or morals of other people and the offending pupil fails to cease such conduct when requested to do so by the driver, it shall be the duty of that driver to put the offender off the bus and report his action to the principal immediately.

WHAT TO DO IN CASE:

1. You must leave school before 3:00 o'clock.
If your parent wishes you excused due to a doctor or dentist appointment see the assistant principal and get a medical excuse blank from him to be signed by the doctor and returned to the office.

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2. You arrive at school after 8:15.
Sign the tardy sheet in the office lobby and get admittance slip from office.
3. You wish to be excused the last period to work.
You must present to your home room teacher letters from your employer and your parents granting you permission to work. Your employer must also give his telephone number. A pass will be given you to leave school by the assistant principal if permission is granted.
4. You become ill.
You should report to the teacher of your present class. He will excuse you to go to the sick room. If it is necessary for you to go home, you will be excused through the main office and your parents notified.
5. You are absent.
Absences are excused only for illness of student or serious illness or death in the family. The day you are absent the parent calls the office and gives you a note to be returned to school and given to home room teacher.

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GENERAL INFORMATION ON CURRICULUM

From year to year Waggener High School is constantly changing their program of curriculum. Revision and improvements are being made.

In order for a student to meet graduation requirements he must complete at least 18 units of work over a four year period (grades 9-12). Certain subjects are required of all students. Additional subjects will be required if a student wishes to qualify for a particular occupational field, special training, or college entrance. Beyond these requirements a student may choose as elective subjects any additional subjects which will help him to reach his goal or add to his personal growth.

- A. 18 units are necessary for graduation: 11 required and 7 elective.
- B. Required units must be in the following fields:
 - 4 units of English
 - 2 units of mathematics
 - 2 units of science
 - 2 units of social studies, one of which must be United States history
 - 1 unit of health and physical education
- C. 4 units are required for 10th grade placement.
8 units are required for 11th grade placement.
13 units are required for 12th grade placement.

A typical college program should include four years of English, at least two years each of science, mathematics, social studies, and foreign language. Major colleges and universities prefer four years of English, four years of science and four years of college preparatory mathematics, and they recommend two years or more of foreign language, and two years of social studies. Students should consult the catalogues of colleges of their choice for admission requirements.

Each student should plan his program around a core of subjects which apply more directly to a field of employment he plans to enter. All students in grades 9-12 are expected to enroll in 5 classes each year. Any student may combine four academic subjects with one of

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the following to make a fifth subject: choral music, orchestra, band, art, home economics, health and physical education, and industrial arts. Only those students having above average grades should enroll in 5 academic subjects.

TRACT PROGRAM

The Tract program plan of education was started at Waggener during the fall of 1959. Waggener does not have all of the programs that are offered. It has: the Advanced for the gifted students, the Superior for the above average students, and the Regular for the average and below average student. This plan of education was also started at the same time in most of the other Jefferson County Schools. The main purpose of this program is to enable a pupil with varying degrees of ability to find his proper level of achievement. Each student is enrolled in one of the programs that is designed for his interest and abilities. The teachers, counselors, and principals with the interest of the student in mind decide which program is best for the student. With hard work a student may move from one program to another one.

THE CORE PROGRAM

The seventh and eighth grade core program at Waggener is a type of organization to gradually change the student from the grade school program to the high school program.

Under the core program all reading and writing subjects (literature, grammar, spelling, history, science, and health) are fused together in a three-hour period under one teacher. One major goal for the program is to provide the pupils with guidance and encouragement. This is on an individual and group basis, to develop their interests and initiative.

This program places emphasis on teacher-pupil planning, individual and group participation, evaluation, work habits, and democratic living.

A pupil receives one grade for all the subjects included in core. The other subjects: mathematics, home economics, shop, physical education, band, art, and music,

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are taught by special teachers of the subjects. The pupil receives separate grades in each of them.

This year, the seventh and eighth grades at Waggener have adopted a new plan called the Exploratory Program. It takes up a one hour period for the pursuit of further knowledge on a topic of mutual interest among the students. The teacher is usually the core teacher, although it is not a continuation of core.

These programs at Waggener seem to be interesting and informative to all students taking part in them.

WAGGENER HIGH SCHOOL GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT

Waggener High School has a very excellent Guidance Department. Through a carefully planned system of individual and group guidance, students are helped in making necessary adjustments to the school's organization, pattern of studies, and activities. Counselors and teachers help students to study themselves, to understand their problems, to be aware of both their strong and their weak points, and to work out appropriate plans for studies.

Our Guidance Department also includes a large library of college bulletins and guidebooks for students' use in choosing a college.

Waggener High School's Guidance Department Staff includes:

Mrs. Dawson for 8th, 10th, and 12th grade girls
Mrs. Hays for 7th, 9th, and 11th grade girls
Mrs. Goodell for 7th grade boys
Mr. Aspy for 8th, 10th, and 12th grade boys
Mr. Corey for 9th and 11th grade boys

These counselors alternate even and odd years so that they have the same groups of people each year. This system provides a better mutual understanding.

Such a program places added responsibility upon the student and parent to plan for the future and to use foresight in making intelligent and proper choices of curriculum and goals.

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HEALTH AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION

One unit of health and physical education, taken in high school, is required for graduation. Physical education is offered in the eighth grade but must be taken again in the ninth unless the student is physically handicapped. A student who enrolled in Waggener after the ninth grade and doesn't already have one unit of health and physical education must obtain this before graduation.

In Physical Education the boys compete in speedball, touch football, wrestling, tumbling, basketball, volleyball, track and softball. The girls compete in volleyball, soccer, basketball, group games, folk dancing, and softball. A physical fitness test is administered at the end of the course.

The health course at Waggener strives toward various objectives. Some of these objectives are contained in the following principles:

1. The educated person understands the basic facts concerning health and disease.
2. The educated person protects his own health and that of his dependents.
3. The educated person works to improve the health of the community.

WAGGENER'S MUSIC DEPARTMENT

Waggener's music department is under the direction of Mrs. Bernice Ely, Mrs. Eleanor Ritchie, Mr. Julian Dorsey and Mr. Carl Markert. It consists of general music classes, a junior high chorus, senior high chorus, a cappella choir, girls' chorus, girls' and boys' ensembles and also similar vocal groups. We have a beginning band and orchestra, as well as our marching band and fine symphony orchestra.

These groups regularly give concerts and play for assembly programs as well as bring honor to the school through outside presentations to local civic groups.

CHOIR

The Waggener Choir is directed by Mrs. Ely. It sings for both the school and the community. The choir is made up of students that are selected by Mrs. Ely. It meets for one period five days a week and offers one credit.

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Departments

ADVANCED ORCHESTRA

The Waggener Advanced Orchestra is directed by Mrs. Eleanor Ritchie. It plays for both school and community programs. The Orchestra is made up of students that are selected by Mrs. Ritchie. The Orchestra meets every day and you may receive one credit for taking it.

ADVANCED CHORUS

Waggener's Advanced Chorus is directed by Mrs. Ely. The members are senior high students that are interested in singing. The chorus sings for the senior high school programs and also community programs. It meets five days a week for one period and offers one credit.

INTERMEDIATE CHORUS

The Waggener Intermediate Chorus is directed by Mr. Julian Dorsey. It is made up of junior high students who like to sing. The chorus sings for the junior high school programs.

SENIOR BAND

The Waggener Senior Band is directed by Mr. Carl Markert. The band gives both school and community performances. To become a member you must be in at least the eighth grade and you must be able to play an instrument well enough to earn a position in it. The band meets one period every day. A student may earn one credit by taking it.

THE ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

English is the only subject in the curriculum that all students must take in grades seven through twelve. In the seventh and eighth grades it is taught as a part of the core program. In the ninth through the twelfth grades it is taught on a departmental basis and is grouped into superior and regular classifications. Speech, journalism, and dramatics are offered as electives within the English department.

THE MATH DEPARTMENT

The Math program at Waggener High School consists of these courses: General Math and Advanced Arithmetic; Business Arithmetic for commercial students; Algebra I

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and II; Plane and Solid Geometry; and Trigonometry. The Special Math classes under the direction of Mrs. Ruth Pardon include these areas of mathematics: Plane and Solid Geometry; Algebra I, II, and III; Trigonometry; Calculus; and Analytical Geometry. Special reports are given in these classes the Junior year.

Waggener has the distinction of being one of the four county schools which have the advanced program under the Five Tract System. These classes are started in the seventh grade and run through the twelfth grade. All the areas taught in the Special Math classes will also be covered in the advanced program in addition to studies of other number systems, etc.

INDUSTRIAL ARTS

The Industrial Arts Department offers courses in general shop and mechanical drawing. A special building adjoining the school houses these classes.

General shop is primarily for seventh and eighth grades. Instruction in woodworking, leather, and metal tooling are given.

Three years of mechanical drawing are offered to high school students. In the first year, a student receives a general introduction, including work on three views, isometries, and architectural drawing. The second year is a detailed study of architectural and machine drawing. In the third year, the student specializes in his major intent.

The three teachers in the Industrial Arts Department are as follows: Robert Bauer, Dennis Ball, and William Hughes.

DRIVER'S TRAINING EDUCATION

This course, Driver's Education, is offered at Waggener as a one semester subject. Each student experiences two periods per week in classroom study and an average of eight hours behind the wheel and twenty-four hours of additional observation in the car. For this the student receives $\frac{1}{2}$ credit.

The following are the objectives listed for this training:

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Art I (General Art)—A good basic training in fundamental techniques and use of inventive ideas, and participation in a variety of creative experiences.

Art II (Advanced Art)—A continued development of technique and creative ideas with an emphasis on design, composition, color, and the graphic arts.

Art Appreciation—An academic course consisting of a study of the history of Painting, Sculpture and Architecture from Cave Man to Twentieth Century. (Excellent background for preparation for college.)

These High School courses are designed to give students basic experience for both the fine art and the commercial art fields. They are broad in scope and both specific and experimental with techniques and ideas.

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1. To develop in students attitudes, habits, and skills necessary to be safe and courteous drivers and pedestrians.
2. To create respect and understanding of the necessity and purpose of state and local traffic laws, rules, and regulations.
3. To help reduce the increasing number of traffic accidents and fatalities especially among high school students.
4. To provide students with practical driving experience through behind-the-wheel driving instruction.
5. To conserve life and property.
6. To acquaint students with the construction, function, and maintenance of motor vehicles.
7. To teach students the courtesies of driving.
8. To instill a safety consciousness in each student.
9. To establish understandings of and proper attitudes toward causes of accidents.

DRAMATIC CLASSES — .5 Credit (2 Classes)

The dramatics course is a combination of academic work and activities. We study the history of the theater, play production, and plays. We produce scenes from recognized plays, pantomimes, and a one act play.

ART DEPARTMENT

The Waggener High School Art Department is composed of Junior High Art for grades seven and eight, and the High School Art program for grades nine through twelve. The program for grades seven and eight is planned with utmost creativity, general background of appreciation and variety of experience as its major goals.

In the High School curriculum, the following courses are offered every day, and one full credit may be earned.

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Organizations and Publications

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THE STUDENT COUNCIL

"The purpose of this Council shall be to give the students an opportunity to make suggestions for and to participate in student activities, to co-ordinate the activities of the various home rooms so that a feeling of unity will prevail, to encourage high scholastic attainment, to promote good school spirit and sportsmanship, to encourage growth in good citizenship, and to provide an opportunity for training in government." This is the purpose of the Waggener Student Council as stated in the constitution. The Student Council does not act as a government of the students but rather as a link between the students and the administration.

During the year the Student Council has several projects which it does annually. These include the publication of this book, the welfare program for needy families, the selling of booster tags for football and basketball games and in general doing things around the school that need doing.

There are two Student Councils at Waggener, the senior high council and the junior high council. The senior high council is made up of students from grades nine through twelve and the junior high council is composed of seventh and eighth grade representatives. Each home room elects representatives on a democratic basis meeting the requirements of the Student Council Constitution.

STUDENT COUNCIL CONSTITUTION

Article I

Section 1. The name of the council shall be Waggener High School Student Council.

Article II

Purpose

Section 1. The purpose of this council shall be to give the students an opportunity to make suggestions for and to participate in student activities, to coordinate the activities of the various home rooms so that a feeling of unity will prevail, to encourage higher scholastic attainment, to promote good school spirit and sportsmanship, and to provide an opportunity for training in government.

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number of votes of the student body will be president and the candidate receiving the second greatest number of votes shall become vice-president.

The president and vice-president, along with the secretary and treasurer, elected by the council, shall be installed, formally, at the next school assembly program.

Section 3. Duties of Officers:

The president shall preside over all meetings of the council and shall be an ex-officio member of all committees. He shall appoint all committees, countersign all orders drawn by the secretary and treasurer, represent the council on public occasions, supervise all activities of the council and preside at all assembly programs or appoint a council member in his stead. The president shall not be considered a representative from any one home room but shall be a representative at large. He shall have a right to vote only in case of a tie.

The vice-president shall assist the president in all of his duties and shall perform his duties in his absence. He shall act as a member of the working committees. Committee chairmen will present all reports to him and will refer problems of organizations, indigent members, etc., to him.

The secretary shall be elected by members of the council at the first meeting of each year, and shall take office at that time. He shall keep the minutes of all meetings in an orderly and neat fashion for future reference. He shall be responsible for mimeographing the minutes of the meeting to be sent to each home room two days after the meeting. These minutes shall be read to each home room by the elected representative.

The treasurer shall be elected at the first meeting of the Student Council and shall take office at that time. The treasurer shall keep records of all receipts and expenditures of council funds, insure that the funds are properly spent and receipted for and shall verify the balance of funds with the school secretary the last day of each month. He shall be responsible for keeping a permanent ledger of receipts and expenditures to be used in the following years in setting up a budget. He shall notify the council at the beginning of each semester the required funds

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Article III

Membership and Election of Representatives

Section 1. Two representatives shall be elected by a majority vote from each home room. His length of service shall be for a year or until his successor shall have been elected. These representatives are eligible for re-election. Each representative shall be a good citizen, one who has the respect of his fellow students and teachers. Any member may be vetoed by a $\frac{2}{3}$ majority of the faculty.

Section 2. Each representative to the council must have an average academic grade of "C" and average grade of "C" in citizenship for the year preceding his election and must maintain that average during his period of service.

Section 3. An election for representatives shall be held within two weeks after the new school year or at a time set by the principal and faculty advisor.

Section 4. A faculty advisor for the council shall be appointed by the principal. It shall be the duty of the faculty advisor to advise the council and keep the faculty informed of council activities.

Section 5. The principal and the faculty advisor shall be ex-officio members of the council. They shall have no voting power but shall have the power of veto.

Election and Duties of Officers

Section 1. The officers of the council shall be a president, a vice-president, a treasurer, and a secretary.

Section 2. The president and the vice-president must be members of the 11th and 12th grade classes and members of the Student Council. These officers must have attended Waggener for at least one semester immediately preceding their election. Any 11th or 12th grade Student Council member meeting the requirements of citizenship and scholastic standing may file his petition to run for president in the office of the principal during the first month of the school year. The campaigns for candidates for office will be conducted during the first 6 weeks of school and will be climaxed with an assembly program in which the candidates will address the student body. The election for president will be held at a time designated by the council. The candidate receiving the greatest

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necessary for carrying out proposed projects and shall be responsible for all tag sales.

Each member of the council shall be responsible for setting a school wide example of good citizenship. He shall attend all meetings of the Student Council and report all meetings to his home room. It is the representative's prime purpose to discuss the minutes with the individuals of his home room, and to present their ideas to the council. He must remember at all times that he is a representative and is acting for his home room. In casting a vote he will to the best of his ability carry out the wishes of the majority of his home room.

Article V

Quorum

Section 1. Two-thirds of the membership of the council shall constitute a quorum for any meeting. If a quorum does not exist, the meeting shall be postponed until two-thirds of the members are present.

Article VI

Meetings

Section 1. Regular meetings of the council will be held on the second Wednesday of each month at a place determined by the president and advisor, 3rd-6th (9-12)

Section 2. Special meetings may be called at any time by the president with the approval of the advisor, or upon the request of five members of the council with the approval of the advisor.

Section 3. The president or the vice-president with the advisor's approval may hold an executive meeting of the officers.

Article VII

Parliamentary Procedure

Section 1. Robert's rules of order shall govern the parliamentary procedure of this council.

Article VIII

Ratification and Amendment

Section 1. This constitution may be ratified by a two-thirds vote of the council voting upon the instructions of their home room.

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Waggener High School Official Directory, 1959-1960:

Section 2. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds majority vote of the council voting as their home rooms have instructed them, provided that the amendment has been presented in writing at the previous meeting. The home room shall instruct the representatives how to vote by a majority vote on the issue.

Article IX

Recall

Section 1. The council reserves the right to recall any officer of the council who does not perform his duties properly. This shall be done by a two-thirds vote of the council.

Section 2. Any home room upon presenting a written petition signed by a two-thirds majority of the home room members of the council may recall their representative and hold a new election.

Article X

Authority

The principal has the final vote in any decision made by the council and may ask the council to reconsider actions of the council which he deems not to be in the best interest of the school. The faculty advisor has also the power to veto in any decision of the council that conflicts with school policy.

Proposed Amendments to the Constitution of the Student Council

Article III

Membership and Election of Representatives

Section 1. The Student Council shall consist of one representative from each home room and the elected officers of the Student Council. An alternate shall also be elected in each room to serve in the absence of the representative. His length of service shall be for a year or until his successor shall have been elected. The representative and alternate are eligible for re-election. The representative and alternate shall be good citizens who have the respect of their fellow students and teachers.

Section 2. Special committees shall be appointed by the president as necessary.

THE NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

The main purpose of the National Honor Society is to stimulate the scholarship, leadership, service, and character of the students in secondary schools.

To be eligible for membership, a student must have been a Student at Waggener for at least one semester, and must have taken at least two college board classes each year. Eligible students are then judged on scholarship, leadership, service, and character by a faculty committee.

The main service project for the school this year has been a tutoring service.

BETA CLUB

The Waggener High School Beta Club is sponsored by Mrs. Zera Baird and Mrs. Dixie Gray. The purpose of the club is, "help teachers and students achieve the end and aim of all true education, mental enlargement and character development, and to encourage and reward creditable achievement." The requirements for membership are: must be a junior or senior, must have a B academic average or higher, must have a C conduct average or better. The Beta Club meets once a month.

THE NATIONAL THESPIAN SOCIETY

Thespians is a national educational honor and service organization of teachers and students, established for the advancement of dramatic arts in secondary schools. The aims of the society are (1) to establish and advance standards of excellence in dramatic arts and (2) to create an active interest in dramatic arts among the students. To become a member of Waggener's troupe, the student must earn at least ten points in some phase of dramatics, and be approved by the troupe sponsor. At no time is

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Section 3. The election of home room representatives and alternates shall take place during the third week of school, in the fall.

Section 6. The Junior Student Council officers are active members and have voting privileges.

Article IV

Election and Duties of Officers

Section 2. Nomination and Election:

- The officers must be members of the tenth or eleventh grades and have served on a student council one year and meet all other requirements. Two candidates for each office shall be nominated by a special nominating committee of the Student Council and presented at a Student Council meeting. At that time, additional nominations may be made from the floor by any student.
- The campaigns and election of candidates for office will be conducted the first two weeks of the last grading period. All nominations have to be made at the meeting the first week of the grading period. The eighth, ninth, tenth, and eleventh grades will vote. The twelfth grade Student Council members shall conduct the elections. At the last meeting of the Student Council there will be an installation of officers.
- A tally of votes and announcement of winners shall be made by the Student Council.

Article IV

Section 3. (Duties of treasurer.) The treasurer shall keep records of all receipts and expenditures of council funds, insure that the funds are properly spent and receipted for and shall verify the balance of funds with the school secretary the last day of each month. He shall be responsible for keeping a permanent ledger of receipts and expenditures to be used in the following years in setting up a budget. He shall notify the council at the beginning of each semester the required funds necessary for carrying out proposed projects.

Article XI

Committees

Section 1. There shall be the following standing committees:

THE LITERARY MAGAZINE — INTROSPECT

The Introspect was introduced for the first time this year to fill a need in the scope of journalistic activity and creative writing at Waggener.

The purpose of the magazine is to encourage creative writing at Waggener of the highest quality through the publication of such material in a high school magazine.

The types of writing which are acceptable are poetry, prose fiction, criticism, and plays. Art photography, drawings, and the like will also be considered.

The magazine is open to all Waggener students, the seventh through the twelfth grades.

The magazine is closely affiliated with, and was originated within, the Quill and Scroll Society. But positions on the staff in the future will be open to all interested seniors and juniors. Selection will of course be restricted.

THE FRENCH CLUB

The French Club was formed for the purpose of enriching the course. The members see movies and interesting information about France. Students who are eligible are third and fourth year students. Also, second year students may join at the end of the first semester, provided they have an A average.

THE LATIN CLUB

The Latin Club is for Latin students with an A or B average. The members are divided into Senators, Knights, and Plebians; first year students are slaves.

Meetings are held once a month and dues are 50c. Club activities include a Roman banquet and production of Greek or Roman plays.

SPANISH CLUB

Requirements for membership in the Spanish Club are met, first by being in a Spanish class and second, by paying

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fifty cents a year in dues. Students who took second year Spanish last year but were unable to fit another year in their schedules may also belong to the Spanish Club. Two parties and a Pan American Day exhibition are among this year's plans.

The executive board is made up of two representatives from each Spanish class. Each of the representatives is either the president or the secretary-treasurer of his Spanish class.
