Special note from Harriet Micou Corum, Daughter of Elizabeth Micou

The following pages are clippings, photos, and items that my mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Micou, collected over the 40 plus years since we graduated from Waggener High School in 1960. My parents, Bill and Elizabeth, always had a love for teenagers that went beyond the norm. When we lived in Anchorage from 1950 - 1955 they were involved in the Presbyterian Children's Home, the Anchorage Children Theater, and Anchorage Presbyterian Church. They were youth advisors there and then when we moved to St. Matthews in 1955, they became youth advisors at Harvey Browne Presbyterian Church from 1955 -1960. Our home was always open to any teenager that wanted to stop by to talk, swim, play pool, ping pong, etc. They had such a passion for youth and were willing to do anything for them. They were both kids at heart.

My senior year at Waggener, 1959-1960, my mother was elected president of the Waggener PTA. Since we were Waggener's first graduating class her position as PTA President took on a different meaning and role to her. I believe she felt like a "Mom" to the whole class. Like any mother, she started a scrapbook of "all her children". As a professional secretary she knew the importance of organization. It is a shame she didn't have the advantages of a database back then. She began watching *The Courier-Journal* and *The Voice of St. Matthews* to find out all the news of our senior class. She made lots of phone calls to find out where each of the class members went during the next four years. Those 4 years of watching for news continued until she died in 2002. She would love to tell people about "her children" - how many had gone to college, business school, technical schools, had joined the military, which ones had married, and about their children. Unfortunately, as the years went on there were deaths to record.

I know she would be thrilled to know that her "children" and others were seeing all her time and hard work. She wanted the members of the class to know how important they each were and that someone cared about them. She wanted them to be remembered for their achievements and accomplishments as individuals as well as a class.


W.T. Micou Jr., 54, paper company executive, dies

William Thomas Micou, Jr., 54, of 322 N. Bonner Ava., owner of the Micou Special Paper Products Co. and a manufacturer's representative, died Sunday, Nov. 10, at 4:50 am in Kentucky Baptist Hospital.

Micou was employed by the Heynolds Metals Cn. and the Rowland Paper Co. before he opened his own business, He was past president of the fifth district of the international Association of Printing House Craitsman and of the Louisville House of Printing House Craftsmen.

Fifty-three percent of Waggener's first senior class, the Class of '60, will graduate from college by the spring of 1965.

Out of the 324 who are in the class, approximately 86 percent, or 280, entered college in the fall of 1960. From this number, 19 have already graduated from college, 116 graduate this year, and 35 will graduate next year.

One fourth of those who started college, but will not graduated, had two or more years before leaving to enter the armed services, marry, or work. At present, 16 members of the class are in the services, and 38 of the boys and 77 of the girls are married.

Statistics From College Compiled On First Waggener High Graduates

Waggener High School's first graduates, the class of 1963, surprised just about everybody aimed high.

There were 325 in that class. Now, four years later, the follow-up statistics are in.

Of the 280 who went to college as they planned, about 150 will receive degrees next month or by the spring of 1965 (some enrolled in fiveyear courses).

Figures Compared

The graduates represent 53 percent of the original 86 per cent who started to college Nationally, according to news service figures, 60 percent of college freshmen eventually are graduated.

Two years' college work was completed by 40 others before they dropped out to go into military service, to marry, or to go to work.

More than 20 of the 150 graduates-to-be plan to go on for postgraduate work.

The boys and girls have kept a steady stream of letters, notes, and Christmas cards coming to the Micou home that they now ad dress as "Waggener Alumn: House."

Enough of them forgot of where late with yearly news about themselves that Mrs Micou spent hours on the telephone, tracking them down.

"The class had a special closeness because the students shared so many 'firsts.' " Mrs Micou says. "They wrote the alma mater song, arranged Waggener's first senior prom, and began many of its tradi tions."

Eight of the 280 finished college ahead of time, Mrs Micou's records show.

Most chose to attend the University of Louisville or the University of Kentucky Two have applied to work

with the Peace Corps. One hundred (70 girls and 30 boys) of the 1960 class have married; 20 are engaged to marry. The married grad-uates have a total of 53 children.

Something akin to school sainthood, if such a title exists, should be award-ed to Mrs. W. T. Micou, Jr., 32? N. Bonner Ave.

The president of the PTA at Waggener High School in 1960, she has spent thousands of hours in the past four years keeping track of every single member of Waggener's first graduating class. And there are 324 of them! What's more, last week Mrs. Micou came out with 18 pages of a brochure listing every boy and girl in the class, telling what has happened to

them since the spring day in 1960 when they marched up to .receive the first diplomas given out by the new high school.

"And what a class!" says Mrs. Micou. "86 per cent of them entered college, a terrific average, and I couldn't even begin to keep track of their awards and honors. The entire project has been a big thrill."

More amazing even than keeping track of 324 youngsters scattered all over the United Sates during the past four years is Mrs. Micou's complete scrapbook. She's kept it right up to the minute with clippings of engagements, weddings, and all kinds of news items about the class.

She urges members to stop by her home which she calls "Waggener Alumni House" pick up copies of her records which the high school mimeographed, and browse through her scrapbook.

"This will give me a chance to see them all again, too," she said.

The Micous's daughter, Harriet, was a 1960 graduate, and her mother became interested in the group when they all formed the seventh grade of the school and stayed together for the next six years,

"It was a closely knit group," says Mrs. Micou, "opening up a new grade every September and facing the problems, Everything they did was "a first", like the first prom, with no experienced older classmen to advise them about pitfalls. They came through with flying colors."

Kids return cards

Mrs. Micoubegan her project when the class was in its senior year, asking the youngsters to return postal cards she sent them telling their plans for college and further education, such as schools of nursing and other fields in which they were interested. Like Topsy, the project grew. In fact, it mushroomed and has continued to do so for four years.

"It has been a real challenge at times," laughed Mrs. Mi-"but I've loved every cou, minute of it, I must add that my family has been very patient with me. I really have monopolized our telephone."

116 Waggener alums were graduated from college this June, three from Yale University, alone and 35 will receive diplomas next year because they entered five year courses.

One-fourth of the class who started college completed two years, which were interrupted by either the armed forces or marriage. (The latter is 100% girls.)

Most of the members now serving in the Army, Navy, Marines, or Air Force, plan to go back for their degrees. The majority of those who got B. A.s this year are going

on to graduate study. Some of them, like Charlotte Aull, now Mrs. Ralph Huffsey, who got a degree in 3 years already is an assistant pro-fessor at Florence State College, Florence, Ala.

Another teacher is Mel Borland, Centre grad, who has received an assistantship in economics at Washington University, St. Louis, for next year. Linda Fiene, who went to

Grinnell College, has received a scholarship at Brown University to begin work on her master's in teaching next September, Bill Moeller, a Yale graduate, now lists his address as Milan, Italy, where his parents moved last year with GE, He's over there this summer and will enter Dartmouth College's School of Business in the fall, Also heading for a MBA is Robert Ling, Princeton alumnus,

In Med schools

A number of the class will enter medical schools, in-cluding Stephen Mowry, Ron-nie Alt, Jim Felts, and Todd Gardiner.

Many of the girls also have an interest in medicine and already are graduate nurses,

One of them is Mary Louise Schansberg, an R. N. from Schansberg, an R. General Hospital, who now is living from crisis to crisis in General's emergency room. Other future careers for Waggener's class of 1960 are engineering (quite a few boys will finish up at Speed Scientific next June) and law. A number of grads start law school this fall, including Chuck Armstrong who'll enter Stanford University, Palo Alto, Cal., and Steve Wilson, who'll enroll at U. K.

Class interests really run the gamut, apparently from checking out Mrs. Micou's remarkable records. Several have become pharmacists, Albert Young, wants to one. get into foreign service, quite a few boys have majored in chemistry, others in art, and some in religious education like Marcia Roider, Westhampton College graduate. Gibbs Reese will finish his five-year course in architecture at UK next June, and Lols Miller majored in music education at UK. Another UK graduate, Robert Lich, has a B. S. degree in agriculture.

Two already have applied for jobs in the Peace Corps, . . Sandy Walker, who went to Mary Baldwin College in Virginia for two years, and Jim Thompson, who picked up his diploma at Yale last month. Speech therapy is the future career of Jeanette Caswell, now Mrs. Joseph Nunnelly of Jeffersontown, a UK graduate of '63. The class even has a future actress among its members, She is Ann Henderson, who took three years at U of L and will enter drama school this fail.

Off on coast and geodetic surveys for the Department of Commerce has been Rodney Smith, who now is back at U of L and will obtain his degree next June,



In the Chit Chat, May 1961

The students of Waggener High School's first graduating class have almost completed a full year of college. How do they feel about their high school preparation for college work? What helpful suggestions do they have to offer our student body and faculty? What comments do they have to make about college life?

A cross section of twenty of our graduates was polled, representative of geographic locations, types of colleges, and general high school achievement.

Writing, Reading Needed

In which areas do the graduates feel that their education at Waggener was deficient? In almost all cases the stated deficiencies were writing skills, reading speed and comprehension, and study habits. They recommended that the English classes include more concise, objective writing, creative writing, grammar, non-credit r e m e d i a l courses, and coaching on how to take college-type essay tests.

How do the graduates find that college work differs from that of high school work? Jim Ratliff, at the University of Mississippi, sums it up this way, "Everything is up to you. Nobody tells you what to do." Robert Ling, at Princeton University, comments, "You yourself have to produce the initiative. You are given more material than the smartest kid in the class can learn."

English Proficiency

The students feel that the colleges require the most proficiency and quantity in all phases of English, in memorization and retension, in languages, and in science. Jeanie Swann, at the U. of L., recommends "a basic knowledge of all fields."

Most of the colleges surveyed provide remedial courses in English, speech, and speed reading. One student commented that his university provided "free tutors!"

Most of the students who have personal faculty advisors find their advice to be either slightly profitable or very profitable. Only one out of the sixteen surveyed finds his counselor extremely profitable, and two find theirs no help at all.

A great majority of the graduates feel that college sororities and fraternities are more worthwhile than high school clubs. Besides providing a place to eat and sleep, they create lasting friendships.

Some Home Sick

Eleven of the sixteen students are happy with the geographic locations of their respective colleges. Reasons given for not being satisfied are the weather condtions, transportation facilities, home-sickness, or "sick-of-thehome" sickness!

The most difficult adjustments that the students had to make were budgeting time and improving study habits. Linda Mayer, attending Wellesley College, comments that her most dificult adjustments were "getting used to spending all of my time working and learning how to live with other people." Peggy Leahy, at Indiana University, says that the "realization of life is a serious proposition - adjustment in relying on my own self - deciding what is important in my life and years in college, studies or social life — and people."

Four of the graduates have part time work to help pay for their education. Also four students have scholarships, one of whom claimed that his was not sufficient.

Time Budgeted

How many hours a week do the graduates spend on extra-curricular activities? Social life? Studying? Ranging from zero to ten hours, the average hours spent on extra-curricular activities is four. Time spent on social life averages fifteen hours, ranging from three to fifty hours. Studying averages thirty-nine hours, ranging from thirteen to ninety-eight hours. (The Eastern ivy league colleges claim the ninety-eight hours.)

How do the alumnae feel about the time spent on extra-curricular activities in high school? All students except one felt that these activities are worthwhile. Charlotte McKinstry, at Centre, thinks that "extra-curricular activities d e v o l o p your personality and make you learn to live with other people. Although Robert Ling agrees with this, he comments that "Waggener is getting dangerously close to overemphasizing these activities."

Enjoy College

Do the graduates enjoy college more than they enjoyed high school? Ninety percent agree that they do. Freddie Neikirk, at Centre, likes college better because "I'm on my own and I can accomplish things without parental help." "You are given more responsibility and given the chance to grow up and prove yourself," says Hariet Micou of Morehead State College.

What suggestions do our graduates have for high school students to better prepare them for college? They recommend doing a lot of writing, improving study habits, reading everything, and anything, taking hard courses in high school, and learning how to take notes. Sandy Means, of Mur-ray, says, "They should have a broader background and explore everything that they find interesting." Pat Iddings, a Georgetown student, advises high school students to "learn to take good notes. Take hard courses in high school." "Study hard!" is Judy Schuba's suggestion, a student at Bowling Green. 43 75



T was understandable that authorities would warn two young Louisvillians against making the vacation trip they had planned, for it was no ordinary summer jaunt.

Tom Ogle and Tom Grunwald, both 20, and their friend Mike Smith, 19, of Luverne, Minn., had charted a 1,500-mile canoe trip through rugged Canadian territory which experts termed virtually impossible to cross by canoe.

But the youths-who had worked during previous summers as guides out of a canoe base at Ely, Minn. -were determined to make the attempt "just for the sake of adventure and to prove it could be done."

They did try and they succeeded, arriving at the town of Churchill on Hudson Bay 55 days after, their departure from Ely, right on schedule-but it wasn't easy. They had battled strong currents, rapids, falls, winds, food shortage and even whales, the latter as they neared their destination on Hudson Bay.

Ogle is the son of the Frank Ogles, 409 Sherrin Avenue, and Grunwald is the son of Mrs. H. L. Cassilly, 4316 Kinloch Road. for Ely June 2, Ogle, who did most of the preliminary planning, received a letter in which the director of game of the Province of Manitoba warned:

"I would tell you that the main Churchill River is a very dangerous one to travel by canoe. It should only be traveled by large freight canoes (much too heavy for portaging any long distance) and by really experienced canoemen.

"There are canyons in the main Churchill River where the rapids are extremely heavy. The country is also definitely remote and if there were an accident involving the canoe, there would be no opportunity whatever of any help, and no communication with the 'outside.' In view of the above, I could not recommend this particular trip to you."

1,500 Miles Of Danger

Louisvillians and friend paddled canoe through Canadian wilderness for 55 days



More warnings came in other letters from Canadian officials to whom the boys wrote for maps and information.

One suggested an alternate route since Lake Winnipeg over which they had to travel "is an extremely large lake—over 350 miles long and about 75 miles across. This makes canoe travel on it, especially in a 17-foot canoe, extremely hazardous."

They hacked through dense woods

The upset forced the boys to make a threeday stopover at Fort Frances, 80 miles and two days paddling away. There Dr. Lester Dennis, an optometrist, not only made new glasses for Grunwald but took the three adventurers "under his wing." They made appearances at a Kiwanis Club meeting and before a high-school assembly to tell of their trip.

The adventurer's second biggest hazard came during the last half of the trip when they were navigating the treacherous Churchill River.

They camped one evening at dusk on an island just at the head of a caryon. Not until the next morning did they realize they had stopped only a short distance from where the river cascaded over a 25-foot falls.

The water was so swift about the island that their only chance to make shore was to launch the canoe and paddle rapidly, hoping they could make it before the rushing waters swamped them.

Within 25 feet of the island their craft was half filled with water and by the time they reached shore water was up to the gunwales. Had they gone over the falls they would have been swept into an eight-mile-long canyon of rushing cascades, with sides that were sheer, 150-foot cliffs.

They portaged around the deep canyon, spending two and a half days hacking their way through dense woods.

On August 5, the last day of their trip north, they were in for another big surprise.

As they neared the mouth of the Churchill River where it flows into Hudson Bay, they encountered a school of some 70 whales, most of them longer than the canoe. The whales apparently had come into the river's mouth with the tide.

It took a fierce battle with oars to keep the creatures from upsetting the craft although, according to Ogle, "they just seemed curious . . . they could have wrecked us easily had they wanted to."

The youths, who paddled at the rapid rate of about 35 strokes a minute, figured it took 1,948,000 strokes to take them to their destination. According to Grunwald, about the 40th day, "trail fatigue began to set in and it got mighty monotonous . . . we sometimes wondered if we'd ever see Churchill"

As the trip progressed the boys became even more proficient as canoemen. An entry in Grunwald's diary on June 16 says: "We learned something today. If the sternman quits paddling and merely holds water with his paddle as the waves come in, he can steady the craft very well," Continued On Page 22

Visit by Indians was disturbing

The boys noted that it was impossible for them to take pictures of their progress along the really rough rapids as "it took all three of us working hard to handle the canoe."

There were other adventures, not quite as hazardous as the rapids, the falls and the whales.

Shortly after the boys reached 350-mile-long Lake Winnipeg two days ahead of schedule on June 26, they were forced to camp ashore for two days as winds up to 60 miles an hour ripped the lake and tore down their tent. During this period they ate nothing except pop corn to conserve their dwindling supplies.

When they reached Norway House, the Hudson's Bay Post, after 900 miles of traveling they were glad to have a two-day respite to pick up fresh supplies and prepare for the second leg of their journey.

Pushing ahead into even more rugged country, the boys were visited one evening at their campaite by a small group of Cree Indians who spoke no English. It was a peculiar visit, the boys said.

The Crees merely sat crosslegged around the campfire for some 45 minutes occasionally exchanging conversation among themselves but most of the time staring intently at the white men. Then, they silently got up and left.

"We tried to be friendly but to tell the truth the incident made us a little uncomfortable," Ogle said. What surprised many experienced travelers in the north country—but not the boys—is that they managed to keep so closely to their set schedule. How did they do it? "Good planning, mostly by Ogle and his dad," according to Grunwald.

"We had counted on 35 to 40 miles a day and allowed ourselves a percentage of 20-mile days," Ogle said. One day, however, in an effort to make up lost time, they paddled 60 miles in a 15-hour day!

After a reception in Churchill where they were met by Canadian newsmen and honored at a steak dinner (pre-arranged by Ogle's father) the boys returned to the Ely canoe base the easy way—by rail and car.

Back at the base, which is run principally for Explorer Scouts, the boys found guides were in short supply so the next day all three set out on separate nine-day canoe trips as guides for groups of Scouts,

Once again back at the base Grunwald hurried home just in time to enter his senior year at the University of Kentucky. Ogle remained longer to escort a second group of Scouts on a second nine-day trip.

And guess what! They already are planning another trip. This one through northwest Canada to the Pacific by canoe.

Some skeptics say it can't be done.

That ill-starred exploration of the rivers to New Orleans by two college canoeists may never be resumed. At best, not for another year or two.

At first Edwin Perry, Jr. (3717 Ed-mond Lane), and his Georgetown College roommate, Jack Willmoth of Bellevue,

Ky., were determined to finish the trip as soon as they could dry out and recoup their losses.

Perry has gone to Owensboro to see if their capsized craft can be salvaged. But even so, all their gear and provisions are at the bottom of the Ohio-450 pounds of food, tents, camping equipment, and clothing.

The youths set out February 29 from Cincinnati, bound for New Orleans, 1,300 miles away, camping ashore at night, but were plagued from the start. Rains set the Ohio to flooding. After a scare at Vevay, Ind., they "grounded" at Louisville for a month. Last Friday they managed

to paddle away again, only to encounter strong winds Sunday that whipped up waves which capsized their frail craft near Brandenburg.

Perry and Willmoth swam safely to shore but the canoe foundered. It reappeared 90 miles downstream and a Coast Guard cutter took it to Owensboro.

The boys had been roommates at Georgetown College, Willmoth was graduated. Senior Perry skipped this last semester to make the river trip. He will go to school to qualify for his degree in August.

Their boat is an 18-footer. Both boys are former Boy Scouts, Perry in the troop at the Broadway Baptist Church, where his father is pastor. He went to Waggener High.





R trospect Of First Decade Shows WHS Accomplishments

By Betty Baxter and Susan Hunter

As the seniors of 1964 move ahead, we take an retrospective look at the accomplishments and changes of Waggener's first ten years.

1954-1955 This first year the student body consisted of seventh, eighth, and ninth graders only. These students, having the responsibility of establishing new traditions, chose red and gray as the official school colors. Other highlights of this year were the Student-Faculty game, which the students won, and the Core Basketball Tournament.

1955-1956 This year the sophomores went to Eastern, as Waggener still had limited facilities. The school spirit and organizations.

1956-1957 By this time, the oldest class was the freshman, and with the composition of the official school song, they started the long journey to become Waggener's first senior class. Construction of a new wing got underway, making room for an additional grade, and our first television classes were begun.

1957-1958 This was an important year because it contained the births of many of our organized clubs. The first student council was established, the Beta Club was installed, the orchestra made its debut; the first year book, the Lair, was published; the first student directory, The Wildcat Book, was printed, and the journalism classes published the first printed issues of the Chit-Chat. The first class of Waggener was officially organized, and the first basketball and football queens were crowned. With the new wing completed, the enrollment jumped again.

1958-1959 This year brought other honorary organizations to WHS, with the Quill and Scroll Charter granted and 24 juniors tapped for the National Honor Society. The Wildcats participated in varsity sports for the first time, and with the help of the Development Association our football field was dedicated. The G.A.A. was organized to promote more athletics for the girls.

1959-1960 Former assistant principal Mr. Earl Duncan aby took over the position of principal, held by Mr. John B. Lowe since Waggener had opened. Further scholastic honors were received by WHS as several students attended U. of L. as Carnegie Scholars and the announcement of 14 National Merit Semi-finalists was made. The football team, only in its second year of varsity competition, was the unofficial county champion, the basketball team won the Jefferson County Invitational Tournament and was recognized as the County Champion, and the swim team claimed second place in the State Meet. Also during this time, Waggener added to the publications their literary magazine, the introspect.

1960-1961 The second senior class continued to gain honors with Richard Long becoming Waggener's first Merit Scholar. The Alma Mater was officially selected and a new tradition was routed with the girls' senior-junior football game, in which the seniors were victorious. The Thespians came home with two First Place trophies at the State Drama Festival.

1961-1962 This year 19 National Merit semi-finalists from WHS set a new school record, and the Chit-Chat won the Gallup award from Quill and Scroll.

1962-1963 This year brought a split in the junior high and senior high student body. Waggener was host to its first foreign exchange student, Masako Sato, from Japan. Waggener held its first homecoming with the crowning of the queen highlighting the dance. The faculty reversed the tradition by defeating the seniors in the Student-Faculty game.

1963-1964 This year, with Waggener's largest class, the traditions of the former years have been built upon and strengthened. Our athletic program has been out-

standing, with our football team becoming runners-up in the state. During the summer, WHS students were hosts to foreign exchange students who were touring the USA, thus developing the bond of friendship between students around the world.

Having looked back upon our first ten years in which our school's character has been established. WHS now looks eagerly into the future and the opportunities it holds.

He wrote his mother that if it hadn't been for two big food boxes from friends back home, the wounds very likely would have been fatal.

Fuller, a graduate of Waggener High School and Vanderbilt University, was riding in a jeep with three other officers north of Saigon. They passed two "peasants" working on a motorcycle-but the "peasants" turned out to be Viet Cong.

They lobbed two grenades. The jeep was blasted apart. One grenade hit near the rear, where Fuller was seated beside the two food boxes.

Fuller was hit by shrapnel in the left arm and left leg. He also suffered a concussion and punctured ear drums.


Canned Ham Pierced

But the food boxes took the brunt of the shrapnel, Fuller wrote. He said about 30 pieces of steel blasted into the boxes and a canned ham.

Fuller and the other officers had picked up the boxes and assorted mail shortly before the ambush. One of the food boxes was sent to Fuller from friends in Louisville; the other was one sent to another officer.

Mrs. Wells said her son has been awarded the Viet Nam Service Medal and the Purple Heart. He received the Expeditionary Forces Award for duty last May in the riot-torn Dominican Republic.

Fuller has been in South Viet Nam since November.

Upgrading of Data to Aid Ship Safety

The orders from the bridge of the Auxiliary Survey Vessel Marmer operating in Long Island Sound sound much like the orders from the bridge of many ships:

"Got your navigational fix?" "Yes, sir."

"Okay, drop the hook."

But the orders are bringing different results from the usual, results that will make pleasure boating safer and more pleasurable. The United States Coast and Geodetic Survey team on the 100-foot Marmer, for the first time in 30 years, is updating information on the tidal currents and velocities in Block Island and Long Island Sounds.

Nearly a half-million craft, mostly recreational, operate annually in the Sounds.

The "drop it" refers t_0 an anchor for a 10-foot, steel, boatlike raft equipped with electronic devices and under-water flow meters that will broadcast to this vessel at sea or in port and hour after hour the direction and velocity of the tides that affect the navigation of vessels of all sizes.

The information, published by the Department of Commerce on charts for 50 cents, is essential for pleasure and commercial boatmen trying to navigate accurately in fog and storm past dangerous shoals.

Up and Down Hill

A pleasure or commercial boat pushing against a tide is like walking up hill. One riding with the tide can be compared with trotting down hill. When navigating a boat in fogor blinding rain, knowledge of the tide is vitally important to keep from going aground.

The charts are used in conjunction with other charts that are the equivalent of road maps and that show the location of channels, shoals, rocks, islands, lights and reference buoys.

The trick in bad weather is to find them after taking into account the direction and velocity of the tide.

The Marmer, named for the pioneering oceanographer, H. A. Marmer, had a three-year-program to place the raft-stations in 156 positions in Block Island Sound, eastern Long Island Sound and western Long Island Sound.

The vessel, skippered by a 24-year-old forestry and satellite-tracking specialist, Lieut. R. Lawrence Swanson of Essex, Conn., works with 12 oftenmoved stations, and the crew works 10 days and then has four off.

Their bugaboo is the mischievous meddler who opens the hatch to the raft-station and lets salt water seep in and short-circuit the electrical systems. This means the crew must work on its weekends on their own time off to make repairs. Under the station rafts on cables are flow meters that look like weather vanes, and their turning impellers record the tide's direction and velocity.

An untampered raft station and equipment brings an excited shout: "Man, we've got a good one this time."







- Mr. Duncan requested help in the Book Store and this was turned over to Mr. and Mrs. Mel Borland, Chairman of the Sports & Recreation Committee. This committee was responsible for having one of our members in the Book Store each school day for two hours.
- "Great Decisions of 1960" The Marent Education Committee Chaimmen, Mrs. Morton Thompson and Mrs. M. R. Disborough, attended meetings and passed information on to members. Mrs. Chastain Taurman also attended the opening session on this.
- 3. The Board agreed to sponsor a student telephone directory and information booklet put cut by the Student Council. We were asked by the Student Council to do this and we offered to be of any help we would need. We had about twelve members helping them type up the lists.

h. - Mrs. Porter of the Home Economics Department requested help on the Football Banquet. The following ladies helped with serving and decorating:

- The Sports and Recreation Committee furnished chaperones for the Football Dance in the Gym and also the Basketball Dance.
- 6. A master mailing list was compiled from the students' cards in the office. Approximately 25 mothers helped on this project in typing. (list attached) Mr. Duncan gave us permission to use the typing room at night and this was completed in one session.
- 7. Mr. Duncan advised first-aid equipment was needed in the core rooms and also needed two stretchers for the 2nd and 3rd floors. Our Safety Committee and Civil Defense Committee worked together on this. The Board voted \$100.00 be used for this equipment. Mrs. Clark Crr, Jr. purchased this equipment and had it placed in rooms.
- 8. Membership At the first of the year a letter was distributed through Home Rooms regarding membership and subscription to the budget. The first part of February we mailed a letter to parents who had not joinged P.T.A. and by March 31, 1960, we had a membership of 2,302.
- 9. The "Youth Speaks" program for the County was held at Waggener on a Saturday. Whe P.T.A. Hospitality Committee loaned them their "Hospitality" badges. The Board voted \$25.00 for this program to be used as needed.

- 11. In March the Parent Education Committee checked with Mr. Duncan on a date for the Feeder School Meeting. This was set up for April 28. - withby the 6th Graders. This meeting has been set up for the first time to be held at Waggener at night. Members of the faculty will explain the various courses of the 7th Grade, etc. A tour of the core rooms will be given and refreshments served in cafeteria.
- 12. Mr. Henderson of the Waggener Development Association asked for seven mothers to help with the Season Ticket Drive. Mrs. James May was asked to head this up and she contacted our Home Room Representative Chairman to help with this project. The following are working on this -

- 14. Candy Sale conducted by the Music Committee to make money for the Music Dept.
- 15. The Senior Class asked if we would sponsor a breakfast for them after their Prom on May 31, 1960. This is being set up at this time - the Secretary of the Senior Class has written to the Session of Harvey Browne Presbyterian Church requesting permission to have this breakfast there. Mrs. Clyde Walker has agreed to be in charge of the purchase and serving of the food. The Senior Class will take care of all expenses.
- 15. "Career Day" for the Junior Class will be held on Monday, April 11. This has been planned by the Citizenship and Community Service Committee. Representatives of businesses and professions will meet with the students to advise and answer questions.
