Dear dassmates.

All Ring called me the other day and we had a long chat about trying to organize a 50th reunion for our class. Marie VanHoose Sayre called Friday evening and we had a similar conversation. I had broached this subject earlier on our Yahoo groups site, but got little response. I'm very pleased that we now have some enthusiasm building for actually having a reunion.

So, the upshot is that I have volunteered to try to organize an initial meeting in Louisville of those of us interested in helping make a reunion happen. Marie took the first step by emailing us a list of those of you who have indicated you were interested (along with some others she couldn't reach yet). That's why you're getting this. Having said that, I know that some of you, such as Al in Arizona, won't be at this first meeting, but Marie indicated you would be willing to help from a distance. Also, I'm adding some more of you from Marie's list, even if she hasn't heard from

Since we need to get started as soon as possible, I would like to propose some specific dates and times, and then let you all tell me if they will work of if we need to revise:

This coming Saturday or Sunday (Feb. 5 and 6) at 3 in the afternoon. Or, the same time the following Saturday or Sunday (Feb. 12 and 13):

I know we all have obligations and limitations, so here are mine, and you can let us know what yours are so that we can find a good time. - 5. Find a hotel convenient to our venue that will offer a group rate for out-of-towners.

I'm so pleased that Al and Marie have taken the initiative to try to get this ball rolling. I was pretty much resigned to us not having a reunion. Having said that, I feel we're probably getting off to a late start, but I think we can overcome that. In regard to marriage, students differ widely. The majority feel that college marriage is strictly out because it causes too much strain for a young couple. However, a small number believe that if the people are completely sure of their love and are financially able it is "fine." A still smaller group says it depends on the ma-

Most students have a fairly good idea of what qualities they're looking for in a husband or wife. Girls favored humor, consideration, love of children, determination and understanding, while they stressed intelligence and kindness. Boys appeared to be looking for someone "romantic" and kind with a good personality, but honesty and intelligence were mentioned also. Neither sex demanded anything more than "pleasant" looks.

The most surprising results of the survey showed that almost 30 percent of the students interview-ed jelt that they had already met their future marital partner, while 22 per cent were not sure.

Waggener boys are very con scientious in regard to their military service. Sixty-eight per cent indicated they felt a personal obligation to serve in the armed services. Fifty per cent, desiring to serve as officers, intend to take B.O.T.C. in college. Thirty per

cent will enlist after college. Only 10 per cent plan to wait for the draft, while another 10 per cent are undecided.

The Navy and Air Force are the most popular branches of service, receiving 30 per cent of the votes apiece, followed by the Marine Corps and the Army with 20 per cent and 10 per cent respectively. Ten per cent wish to enter the branch which offers the shortest tenure of service.

Perhaps the most enlightening aspect of the survey was its re celation of the serious consideration given life by high school students. Their ambition to improve themselves and society is reflected by several points. Seventy per cent wished to better their standard of living, while over 52 per cent thought they would seek to opercome the prejudice that keeps others from success. Most recognized new frontiers to conquer, and 64 per cent desired to contribute to the progress of the world. Although some asked, What could I do?", and others betrayed a certain note of uncertointy and jear, the general picture was one of confidence and opei.





## Class Of '60 Advises Seniors

The students of Waggener High School's first graduating class have almost completed a full year of college. How do they feel about their high school preparation for college work? What helpful suggestions do they have to offer our student body and faculty? What comments do they have to make about college life?

A cross section of twenty of our graduates was polled, representalive of geographic locations, types of colleges, and general high

#### Writing, Reading Needed

In which areas do she graduatus feel that their education at Wag-gener was deficient? In almost all cases the stated deficiencies were writing skills, reading speed and comprehension, and atudy habits. comprehension, and study hants. They recommended that the Eng-lish classes include more concise, objective writing, creative writing, grammar, non-credit remedial courses, and coaching on how to take college-type emay tests.

How do the graduates find that oliege work differs from that of college work differs from that of high school work? Jim Retliff, at the University of Mississippi, sams, it up this way, "Everything is up to you. Nobody tells you what to do." Bobert Ling, at Princeton University, comments, "You your-self have to produce the initiative. You are given more material than the smartest kid in the class can leave."

#### English Proficiency

English Proficiency
The students feel that the colleges require the most proficiency
and quantity in all phases of English, in memorization and retenson, in languages, and in science
Jeanle Swann, at the U of L.
recommends, "a basic knowledge
of all fields."

Most of the colleges surveyed provide remedial courses in Eng-lish, speech, and speed reading

university provided "free tutors!"

Most of the students who have sersonal faculty advisors find petr advice to be either slightly refitable or very profitable. On-rone out of the sixteen surveyed finds his counselor extremely pro-fitable, and two find theirs no help at all.

A great majority of the gradu-ates feel that college sororities and fraternities are more worthwhile than high school clubs. Besides providing a place to out and sleep, they create lasting friendships.

#### Some Home Sick

Some Home Sick

Eleven of the sixteen students
are happy with the geographic locations of their respective colleges. Resones given for not being
satisfied are the weather condtions, transportation facilities,
home-sickness, or "sick-of-thehome-sickness, or "sick-of-thehome-sickness," The most difficult adjustments.

The most difficult adjustments that the students had to make were budgeting time and improving study habita. Linds Mayer, attending Wellesley College, comments that her most difficult adjustments were "getting tosed to speeding all of my time working and learning how to live with other people." Peggy Leahy, at indiana University says that the "realization of life is a serious proposition—adjustment in reliying on my own self — deciding what is important in my life and years in college, studies or social life — and people." that the students had to make

years in college, studies or social life — and people."

Four of the graduates have part time work to help pay for their education. Also four students have scholarships, one of whom claimed that his was not soffi-cient.

#### Time Budgeted

How many hours a week do the graduates spend on extra-curricu-iar activities? Social life? Study-ing? Hanging from zero to ten

extra-curricular activities is four Time spent on social life averages Time spent on social life averages fifteen hours, ranging from three to fifty hours. Studying averages thirty-nine hours, ranging from thirteen to ninety-eight hours. (The Eastern avy league colleges claim the ninety-eight hours.)

How do the alumnse feel about the time spent on extra-curricular the time spect of extra-currecular activities in high school? All sta-dents except one felt that these activities are worthwhile. Char-lotte McKinstry, at Centre, thinks that "extra-curricular activities devolop your personality and make you learn to live with other people. Aithough Robert Ling agrees with this, be comments that "Waggener is getting dangerously close to overemphasizing these activities."

#### Enjoy College

Do the graduates enjoy college nore than they enjoyed high achool? Ninety percent agree that they do. Freddie Neikirk, at Cen-tre, likes college better because 'Tm on my own and I can accomplish things without perental help." "You are given more re-sponsibility and given the chance to grow up and prove yourself," says Hariet Micou of Morehead State College.

What suggestions do our grad-uates have for high school stu-dents to better prepare them for college? They recommend doing a college? They recommend dong a list of writing, improving study habits, reading everything, and saything, taking hard courses in high school, and learning how to take motes. Sandy Menns, of Murray, says, "They should have a broader background and explore oroaner becaground and expore-verything that they find inter-esting." Pat liddings, a George-town students advises high school students to "learn to take good notes, Take hard courses in high school." Study hard!" is Judy Schuba's suggestion, a student at Bowling Green.
